

The development of the trade will be gradual, and the line is not likely to pay a dividend for some time, and even if the Government pledged its credit, that does not stand sufficiently high to make it likely that the money would be forthcoming on easy terms. The line will be fully 4,300 miles long, and the pretiminary estimate is about £28,000,000. The cost of construction per mile ought not to be very great, as the country traversed is mostly flat and well timbered, and there are few broad rivers to cross.







Apple Custard Pie.—Ingredients: Three cups of stewed apples, one small cupful of white sugar, three eggs, one quart of milk, nutneg to flavor. Let the sweetened apples cool, and add yolks of eggs beaten light. Add the nutneg, then gradually stir in the milk, beating as you go. Add white last. Bake in one crust.

Lady Cakes .- Ingredients: Two cups of Lady Cakes.—Ingredients: Two cups of sugar, one cup butter, four ounces blanched almonds cut in scrips, one and a-half dozen eggs (whites), one grared lemon, two cups flour; beat the sugar and butter to a cream; add the frothed white of eggs; mix together with other ingredients. Line jelly cake pans with greased paper; put in batter, sprinkle almonds over the top, dust with fine sugar and bake.

Old Dutch Waffles.—Ingredients: One quart milk, one quart flour, two eggs, one

Old Dutch Waffles.—Ingredients: One quart milk, one quart flour, two eggs, one tablespoonful butter, one-half yeast cake. Dissolve the yeast in a little warm water; mix the flour and milk gradually, then add the yeast; beat the eggs separately, and let all rise from four to six hours. Heat the waffle irons, and grease with melted lard. When the waffles are baked dip in melted butter and hot water. Sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon.

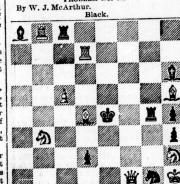

Jelly Cake—Ingredients: Two cupfuls of sugar, one-half a cupful of butter, three-quarters cupful of milk, one large table-spoonful of baking powder, two and a-half cupfuls flour, eight eggs (whites); beat butter and sugar to a cream, then add the milk. Mix thoroughly the baking powder and flour, lastly the whites of eggs. Bake in papered jelly pans, and when cool spread jelly between. When I use recipes that call for the whites of eggs only (as do the last two given), I make custard of the yolks by using a little constarch, to do the work of the whites, and sweet milk, or simply scramble the yolks for the next meal, taking care not to cook too long, but keep juicy.
