GLADSTONE AT DUNDEE. Dundee, the chief city on the east coast

of Scotland, the marmalade capital of the world, and the third in point of population and business enterprise in the northern division of the kingd om, honored itself yesterday in conferring the freedom of the city on the Liberal chieftain. Dundee is a city of no mean proportions. During the reigns of the Scottish kings it was one of their places of residence. In later days, it was known as "the second Geneva," because of the stalwart type of its Protestantism during the reformation period. It suffered much because of its zeal, for in 1645 Montrose besieged, took and plundered it, and in 1651 it was stormed by General Monk and a sixth part of its inhabitants massacred.

A people that passed through such ex-periences might be relied upon to develop into stalwart upholders of that which they believed to be right. Accordingly, we find Dandonians have ever been progressive in their opinions, and decidedly unfavorable to class legislation of any kind. The city is, in fact, a stronghold of Liberalism.

Though for many a long year its inhabitants have not been called on to suffer for their opinions, and their energies have been devoted to building up ever-increasing manufactures in linen, jute, ships and other staples, their type of manhood has not deand their city stands in the front rank of modern manufacturing communities. The population is now nearly 200,000, and is still growing. Its advancement has been steady, but by far the greater portion of its modern trade has been built up since the emancipation of the people from "pro-tection," or "oppression," as Mr. Gladstone very properly stigmatized the policy of high taxation. There was no need, therefore, for the Liberal leader to expatiate before for the Liberal leader to expatiate before a Dundee audience on the benefits derivable from untrammeled trade. They knew as well as he did how much their city owed to the policy which decreed that the British people should be able to buy and sell in the best markets presented to them. Mr. Gladstone, however, discussed the new United States tariff in a calm and dispassionate manner. He did not deny that the new restrictions on the trade be-tween Britain and the United States would injure the British, but he expressed the conviction that the higher taxation would inflict far greater injury on the country im-posing it. We in Canada can give proof of the righteousness of that deduction. Mr. Gladstone sticks to the belief that Britain will hold her own in the world's markets no matter what trade policy other countries adopt. He gives no comfort to the small section at home and abroad who desire that Great Britain shall establish a zollverein with the colonies. Such an arrangement would extend trade with the colonies, but it would restrict trade with the world,

and that would be a most inglorious policy.
While Mr. Gladstone plainly showed that the present restrictive policy of our neigh bors is not calculated to benefit Britis manufacturers, he deprecated any attempt to create ill-feeling between two nations so closely allied. He did not indulge in empty bombast or stupid bravado, as di Sir John Macdonald at Halifax. He di not point the finger of scorn at the States and hint that they were largely made up o the seum of old world nations, as the chie of the Canadian restrictionists so injudi-ciously did. Mr. Gladstone believes with us that in international affairs more is to b us that in international affairs more is to be gained by the respectful treatment of our neighbors than by indulging in sneers and jingoistic baiting. The great Liberal leader uttered no more noble sentiment than that much as United States commerce is to be valued, the friendship and record of be valued, the friendship and regard of our brethren in that country is of more value. Mr. Gladstone expresses sentiments that should be laid to heart by the men on this side of the Atlantic who, for their own this side of the Atlantic who, for their own selfish purposes, would fain keep the relations between this division of the British Empire and the United States in continual embroilment. Without the cordial relations for which the Liberal leader pleads, we would be always on the border line of trouble, and mayhap bloodshed. With friendly intercourse and a disposition to do everything to cement rather than runtum. everything to cement rather than rupture the many ties that now bind the two countries, much can be done and much no doubt tries, much can be done and much no noute will be done that must be to the mutual ad-antage of the people in both lands as well as to the great English-speaking race.

NEXT WEEK'S ELECTIONS.

One of the liveliest political campaign that has ever taken place in the United States will be brought to a close on Tuesday next, when voting for Con gressmen, Governors, and other Federal and State officials will take place. Apparently by mutual consent of both parties, the one controlling topic is the tariff of 1890. It is the chief subject of discussion in the newspapers, and the leading theme of the multitude of speeches that are delivered from hundreds of platforms. The Republican party being responsible for the increased taxation are placed on the defensive. They do not appear to have made a very successful defense so far, but by the vote alone will a clear decision be by the vote aione will a clear decision be reached as to the effect of recent legislation on the public mind. The supposition that the Republican party is united in the belief that the increased taxation is a good thing—its chief provisions have been passed presumably as a son to the agricul. a good sining—its case provisions nave been passed presumably as a sop to the agricul-tural community—is not warranted. Even so prominent a Republican newspaper as the St. Louis Globe-Democrat is forced to say: "It is true the advances which have been made in duties were altogether inexcussible, and will call for correction in the next Congress if the Republicans retain control of the House." And in the Eastern States the change wrought on the public mind by the logic of experience is even more marked.

Not only has every platform squarely indorsed tariff reform, but a good proportion of the candidates are men who are Democrats only because they are op-posed to "protection." In Massachusetts the Democrats have nominated for Congress four men who were Republicans until the tariff issue came to the front-Colonel Codman, George Frederick Williams, Sherman Hoar, and Dr. William Everett. Sherman Hoar is the son of Judge Hoar and the nephew of Senator Hoar. Dr. Everett is the son of Edward Everett, and the Master of the Adams Academy in Quincy. He is a doctor of divinity as well as of laws. In Connecticut the Democrats of the third district have nominated David A.
Wells, a distinguished free trader. In New York city, two candidates proposed by the Tariff Reform League have been accepted by the county Democracy, and one of them, Mr. De Witt Warner, has been ac-

cepted by Tammany also. These nomina-tions are significant, and show that the movement to abolish class legislation when nonestly faced is certain to gain friends. Under ordinary conditions the result would not be doubtful. but the Republican leaders have determined to make a supreme effort to return the author and perfecter of the new Tariff Bill, and are spending enormous sums of money in furthering their views. They have also imported every speaker of note on the Republican side. If McKinley is defeated, it will not be because they have not used the "means."

A Georgia Assassin Hanged for Murdering Nino Porsons.

Perry, Ga., Oct. 30.—Thomas G. Woolfolk was hanged here yesterday for murdering nine persons, all members of his father's family, on Aug. 10, 1887. The doomed man alept well the night before execution. He got up at 8 o'clock and had a long interview with a party of newspaper men, with whom he conversed for half an hour, laughing and exchanging jokes and seemingly absolutely undisturbed by his approaching death. After the departure of his visitors he bathed and shaved and put on a new suit of clothes. He was then visited by several of his relatives, whom he bade farewell without betraying any emotion. Later he was closeted for an hour with his spiritual advisers, to whom he professed his belief in his salvation and his perfect hopes for a future life, telling the ministers that he hoped to meet them in heaven.

THE EXECUTION.

Seven or eight thousand people swarmed the hillsides around to watch the execution. On the galiows Woolfolk was cool and composed. After the ministers had prayed he himself prayed fervently declaring his innocence in his invocation. A written statement signed by Woolfolk was read in which he gave as his declaration that he was innocent of the crime for which he was being executed. At 1:31 the drop fell. The fall falled to break his neck and death resulted from strangulation.




