

Chatham, July 8 .- The Grand Lodge of the Canadian Order of Oddfellows met here yesterday afternoon. Grand Master Alex. Thomson, of Hamilton, sels, was recently presented with a purse of gold and a chair by admiring friends. ly after the opening of the Grand Lodge, the mayor of Chatham and several aldermen visited the lodge, and in brief speeches welcomed the delegates to the city. 

B. H. Lepley, a former resident of London, and a reader of the "Advertiser." writes.

"I formerly lived in London, and was superintendent of the Bushnell oil refinery, but owing to the policy hopes your new Government will somewhat reverse the order of things. "It would seem that the proper policy to be adopted by your people concerning the oil industry would be to admit our American crude oil free of duty, and give your Canadian citizens the benefit of the refining business. This would supply the refiners who have no producing interest with the crude oil at a price which would justify them in running their works to their full capacity; doing the manufacturing at home not only of the oil, but also of the barrels to ship it in. That is now being done in the States.
