NOVEL KIND OF WARFARE

Flanders Both Sides Are Burrowed Into Deep Trenches.

FORTS ARE STILL INTACT

Przemysl and Cracow Still Promise To Put Up Big Fight.

London, Dec. 5—12:30 p.m.—While reports continue to come into London that the battle of Lodz has ended in a Russian victory, any official confirmation is still lacking, and it is apparent to British observers that conditions in the north of Poland are today virtually the same as they were one week ago, after the German army had een saved from overwhelming defeat the brilliant operations of General

Details of the Lodz fighting are beginning to filter through, and they easily prove it to have been the most bloody struggle of the war. The Germans are cribed as fighting their way through the Russian lines over the heaped-up bodies of their comrades.

Berlin claims heavy captures of prisoners in this struggle, while from Kiev comes the announcement that the for-tress there is crowded with German risoners. Incidentally Kiev hat since the beginning of the war 130,000 soldiers and 2,500 officers have passed through Kiev as prisoners of war. The Allies have ceased claiming a tremendous victory in Northern Poand, but they do assert that the operations there have been a strategic defeat for Germany and a tactical victory for

An unofficial report from Vienna admits that the advance of the Austrians has been prevented by violent attacks from strong hostile forces covering the Servian retreat. No hint is given as to the identity of these forces, but the opinion is expressed in London that Russian aid has reached the sorely pressed Serbs. Berlin reports that such help will be no longer possible, for the reason that the blowing up of great tunnel near Tekija has blocked mmunication with Roumania and made impossible the passage of Russlan troop transports along the Danube.
