OVER MARINE COLLISION

Steamer Larchmont Bound From Providence to New York Goes Down in Night.

SCORE OF BODIES HAVE BEEN WASHED ASHORE

Big Boat Had Nearly Two Hundred Passengers on Her List and It Is Feared the Majority of Them Have Perished.

Block 'sland, R. I., Feb. 12.-The Joy Line steamer Larchmont bound from Providence to New York collided with the schooner Knowlton in Block Island Soun I last night and sank. Many bodies have been washed ashore, and It is feared a great marine disaster has cocurred.

Captain George McVey of the steamer Larchmont said at noon today that he had on board between 150 and 200 passengers when the collision occurred, and only eight of these escaped with their lives. At the time he made the statement 18 bodies had been washed ashore, making only 26 out of the total passenger list accounted for.

The passengers met their death ir. various ways. Some of them attempted to launch lifeboats and were frozen to death on the decks of the foundering steamer. Others were drowned in the attempt to escape before the vessel went down, and still others, who were successful in launching a lifeboat, were frozen to death before the small craft reached shore.

Captain McVey said he could not estimate the exact loss of life. His estimate of the number of those on board agrees with that made by the Joy Line officials at Providence, who said that the Larchmont carried about

FORTY YEARS

Death Claims Missionary Hero of New Hebrides.

Attempt.

London, Feb. 6.-The death of the Rev. John Gibson Paton, the missionary apostle to the New Hebrides, in his 83rd year, was reported by cable

from Canterbury, Australia, yesterday. For ten years Dr. Paton was a Glasgow City missionary. In 1858 he decided to go to the New Hebrides, because he felt that "in a religious sense, it was the darkest place in the world." For 49 years he worked among the natives of the islands, and few men have had a career so full of thrilling adventure, hairbreadth escapes and

dreadful tragedy as his. Tanna, the island on which he first landed, was inhabited by cannibals of most feroclous description. At first he had the companionship of his young wife and their little son, but a few months after their arrival both died of fever, and he was left to fight for his life and his religion alone

Hostile Natives. Forty times the natives attempted to till him, and forty times they failed. Six other missionaries who went to assist him in his work were murdered. The islands were visited by British warships and other vessels, and many times Dr. Paton was urged to leave Tanna and seek refuge on some other island where Christianity was beginning to make headway, or in New Zea-

But he always refused. To him the howling cannibals who at times were literally thirsting for his blood were "his dear benighted Tannese," and with a heroism remarkable even in the missionary field he remained at his




