If the Bill Introduced in the Legislature Is Made a Law By the Government Would Prove a Big Boon To Lawyers and Litigants of This District.

Prominent members of the local bar who were interviewed today by The Advertiser stated that there was no reason why the act should not become

EXPENSIVE METHOD. At the present time, whenever anyone in Middlesex, Kent, Lambton, Huron, Essex, Elgin, Perth or Oxford counties has a motion to bring up before the high court he is compelled to do so at Toronto.

This is not only in most cases a very expensive method of procedure, but apparently an unjust one. Recently a local attorney went to Toronto to argue a motion before a

high court justice, and was compelled to wait two days before he could be granted a hearing. Naturally the costs, in such instances, run rather

MUST BE HEARD IN TORONTO.

Under the present act it is compulsory that all high court cases of the counties named, outside of the city of London, be heard at Toronto. If the new act becomes law it will be optional to try a case either here or at Osgoode Hall.

Mr. T. G. Meredith, the well-known barrister, was asked if he thought that more than one day a week would have to be devoted to the high court here if the new act was made law, and replied that he thought that at least two days a week would be required.

There was no limit on the days to be given over to the court, he said OF GREAT BENEFIT.

"Where the work is, the legal machinery must besupplied," Mr. Meredith continued, "and I think that the new system would be of great benefit to the people of the counties, as well as the local attorneys."

County Court Clerk Weld had nothing to offer on the subject, beyond the fact that he thought it would be a good thing for everybody, except perhaps the Toronto attorneys who are now getting a number of cases which would otherwise come to London lawyers. Of course there would be more work, with no additional recompense,

for the clerk, but then such things were to be looked for. MIDDLESEX BAR BEHIND MOVE.

Toronto, Feb. 20.-The New York Herald prints the following London

cable "Mr. Charles Frohman will have 'The Morals of Marcus,' translated into Esperanto, and announces that he expects to present Miss Marie Doro in the international language version of that comedy in Berlin next August. This will be the first play to have the distinction of translation and presentation in Esperanto.

For Esperanto, you must know, was invented and built up by a little Warsaw eye-doctor without assistance from any other source.
