FEARS EVEN FOR HIS OWN SEAT

Remarkable Admission That Fifty-Fifty Split Is Expected In Nova Scotia by Toronto Globe - Conservatives Concede 30 Ontario Seats to Liberals.

The Borden Government is calling frantically on Ontario to save the Government, feeling that the only hope of the party is in this province. The Globe, which has assumed the role of spokesman in Ontario for the Borden Government, is authoritatively informed that the Government leaders are counting on only four of the 65 seats in Quebec. The Globe continues: "Some sober predictions have been made by the friends

of Union Government as to their prospects in the Province of Nova Scotia, though It would seem almost incredible that the Premier will do no better than split even in Nova Scotia. James Seely, personal opponent of the Premier's in King's, is said to be a man of standing and popularity." PREMIER'S ELECTION UNCERTAIN.

It must be gathered from this statement that Nova Scotia is going strongly Laurier, so strong that the election of Sir Robert Borden is most uncertain. In New Brunswick, four seats are conceded to Laurier, by the Globe. Hon. F. B. Carvell has been given an acclamation, one Borden candidate. This newspaper expects two Conservatives to be elected in York and St. John-Albert. The four seats in King's-Queen's, Charlotte and Northumberland are considered doubtful by the Globe. From indications there the Laurier forces have the advantage of the certain

ridings, with a possibility that they will split at least even in the others. The Globe has a pessimistic outlook in New Brunswick, in spite of the acclamation of F. B. Carvell. Continuing the Globe says that in the four seats in Prince Edward Island there will probably be a division





Claim 6,000 Prisoners.

The German war office asserts that six thousand British have been made prisoner during their drive, and that one hundred guns have been taken from them. A large number of the guns already have been recaptured.

The four days' battle is described as the most sanzuinary one that has taken place since the days of Verdun and the first battle of Ypres.

"The amount of territory gained by the enemy in Friday's attack, at a loss of so many thousands of men is so trifling that it scarcely shows appreciably on the military map," so writes Reuter's correspondent in France.

"Tactically the situation may be said to remain virtually unaffected, owing to our troops' magnificent spirit and determination. The difference between our own recent splendid victory and the German reply is that we retain gains up to a depth of nearly six miles, whereas they were nearly everywhere beaten back to the point from which they started. Their Intention was to turn our line and pinch us out from our new line toward Cambrai. It was a test of respective fighting qualities with the numerical odds probably about three to one in favor of the Germans.

WHY UNITED STATES SECURITIES SHOULD DO BETTER.

[By B. C. Forbes.] The time when one most needs confidence, courage and optimism is when things go wrong. There are now many very important favorable features about the business and financial outlook. Here are some of them: America's crops until a few years ago never exceeded in value \$10,000,000,000. They are this year unofficially computed at \$20,000,000,000. Labor is showing greater disposi-tion to act reasonably. It can be accepted as a foregone conclusion that the Interstate Commerce Commission will grant the railroads higher freight rates. Price-fixing in the metal industries has progressed so satisfactorily that the industry can now give its undivided attention to production and the profits assured are reasonable. The great automobile industry, which has been undergoing a spell of uncertainty, has arrived at an arrangement with the Government which should enable the industry to play a very notable part in winning the war while permitting of rational earnings. The great textile industry is working to capacity and doubtless will continue to do so. Our banking machinery has given a demonstration of its efficiency by handling the huge payment on the second Liberty Loan withut causing the slightest disorganization in the money market. The Stock Exchange governors, by instructing all traders to report their short sales during each day, have at least done something tangible to check inconsiderate, not to say unpatriotic speculative activities. A steadier stock market should result. Not one financial failure has marked the drastic decline securities have suffered. Commercial failures were the lightest for any October in a decade, a wonderful record. Small investors and bargain hunters have been very active buyers of securities for several weeks. SAVE AND INVEST. The highest patriotism most of us can exercise today may be expressed in two words: SAVE. INVEST. It is our bounden duty not to use labor to produce things we can get along without, for the more workers employed on non-essentials the greater becomes the dearth of labor for shipbuilding, for steel manufacturing, for coal mining, for transportation, for munition plants and for the thousand and one activities engaged in producing sinews of war. Then every dollar invested in legitimate securities facilitates the financing of the war. It is preferable, of course, that the bulk of the savings of people of modest means should go direct into Government bonds, but money invested in other high grade securities indirectly helps the general situation, and also the flotation of war bonds, since those who sell corporate securities are able with the money thus secured to buy additional war securities as issued. Extravagance, our national besetting sin, is doubly condemnable under existing conditions. In my opinion we have probably seen about the lowest quotations for good stocks, railroads, as well as industrial. There are indications that such stocks as the Atchison and Union Pacific stamp will do distinctly better in the near future. The whole country are aware of the necessity for enabling our railroads to earn a living wage and the Interstate Commerce Commission will not dare to thwart an aroused public opinion. The country is not going to the bow-wows. The investment markets have lately suggested it was. Saner thoughts and actions are due,

BANKING AND FINANCE

For some time New York funds ruled at a discount, owing to the large favorble trade balance and the embargo upon gold shipments from the United States. The latter has, however, been relaxed at the instance of a committee of bankers which recently visited Washington. Arrangements were made to release \$10,000,000 in gold during November, \$10,000,000 in December and \$5,000,000 in January next, and, in addition, the gold held on account of Canadian banks in the United States may now be withdrawn. During the time of harvest and the period preceding the close of lake navigation the strain upon the financial resources of the country is at its height, and this is markedly the case this year. As previously indicated, the value of the field crops is \$400,000,000 in excess of that of any previous year, and there is, therefore, a corresponding increase in the value of the exportable surplus which is now being bought readily by Great Britain and her Allies. British payments under credits arranged in Canada do not, for the time being, affect the rate of exchange, but these credits cover only part of the Government purchases. There will remain a balance, usually large at this season and exceptionally so this year, which will normally be paid for in

For the three months ending December 31 last, exports exceeded imports by \$114,000,000 and in the corresponding period of 1915, by \$125,000,000. The September balance of \$37,000,000 as compared with \$21,000,000 last year, gives some indication of what may be expected during the following months. The moving of large crops, which have been greatly enhanced in value by Government purchasing, at a time when industrial activity is exceptional, has naturally created an unusual demand for money, and this renders desirable a freer flow of funds from New York, the exchange market through which the bulk of these

An increase in deposits of \$12,000,000 is shown by the September Bank Statement. The expansion of the note circulation from \$156,000,000 in August to \$177,000,000 in September, and the similar expansion of current loans from \$836,-900,000 to \$855,000,000 are evidences of the exceptional autumnal strain which showed no signs of relaxing during October.-Commercial Letter Canadian Bank

IS KEEPING A HOUSE BUDGET WASTING TIME?




