





Apropos of the exposure of food for sale bylaw, which the council has in hand, will you permit me, through the medium of your very valuable daily, to point out that, although an excellent measure, it is of little importance, compared with other matters which could with advantage be taken up by the board of health, for example, a more thorough system of inspection of meat and milk supplies for the people. The present system in Ontario is only of use where meat is exported. Home consumers are left practically unprotected.

Steps should be taken to make certain that no tuberculous cattle and hogs are slaughtered, and their meat placed on the market, or that milk from tuberculous cows does not find its way to the baby's bottle or the diningtable.
