shipped supplies and ammunition to Soviet Russia, according to a correspondent of the London Times, who insists that Leon Trotzky, Russian Bolshevik minister of war, visited East Prussia, in spite of official denials of reprussia, in spite of official dentals of re-ports to that effect from Moscow, "The retreat of the Bolshevik armies from the gates of Warsaw," declares the correspondent, "may be explained by the fact that they lacked ammunition. Trotzky foresaw the need of munitions during the frantic effort made to capture the Polish capital, and made plans accordingly, but was too late. He crossed into Germany and reached an agreement with representatives of the German Covernment, by which it would supply ammunition to the Bol-

shevikl.

"The ammunition has been paid for in part, out of the soviet "jewel fund," which includes the crown jewels. It was the intention of the Bolsheviki to reserve this fund solely for propaganda purposes in the east, but Germany insisted upon cash payment. The second object of Trotzky's visit to East Prussia was to prevent munitions from reaching Poland and to accomplish this object to employed Germans at Danzig with employed Germans at Danzig with money from the same "jewel fund." Although 2,000 horsepower can be generated during peak load periods by a dam at Springbank, the net revenue would be sufficient only to pay for a power house and machinery, and would not defray the cost of the dam itself. E. V. Buchanan, general-manager for the public utilities commission, said today. In his opinion the only method of financing such a proposition is to submit it to the people and to pay for it out of the general tax rate.

"If a dam were in existence there now we could build a power station and develop 2,000 horsepower without any additional cost to the city," he said. "The revenue, or saving, which is the same thing, would pay for the interest, sinking fund, depreciation and operating costs of such a plant, but the cost of the dam would have to be met in some other manner."

A plan suggested by Commissioner Philip Pocock was that the surplus from the hydro shop be used for this purpose. The legality of this method is questioned by some of the other commissioners. They claim that the hydro shop surpluses can be used only for the purposes of the shop, and in support of this argument they point out that they are not allowed to maintain Springbank Park with the revenue from the waterworks department but are compelled to provide for it out of the half-mill rate allowed for parks purposes.

The possibility of a vote oeing taken on the project at the next municipal election is by no means a remote one in which case the advantage of the plan will be fully set forth by its advocates. The Torrens system of land titles, which has been partly in use in this province, is again under discussion. It is in use in the North west almost universally. It can be introduced older country. cost than its introduction under the law would render necessary. Our plan would be to have the Registrar with legal assistance, examine and certify to every title in his office and let his certificate be the equivalent of a crown patent. In many cities and counties the registrars are quite competent. The present registrar of London, Mr. Hubert Dignan, can probably point out every flaw. honors, each nation having won nine firsts The United States was far ahead in second places won with 12, and was second to Sweden in thirds, having won 9 to 10 for Sweden. Of four world records established, the United States athletes made three, the fourth going to Finland. The games just closed were notable in the fact that only three athletes were able to win two first places. These

These were Firegirio, the Italian walker, who took the 3,000 and 10,000 metres events; Hill, the English middle-distance runner, who won the 800 and 1,500 metres, and Nurmi, the Finn, who was first in the 10,000 metres run in the cross-country race today, which, it is admitted was considerably short of the adverthised ten kilometres.
