Roosevelt. St. Louis, Sept. 12—The twelfth conference of the Inter-Parliamentary Union opened today in Festival Hall at the World's Fair grounds. Two hundred and twenty-six legislators from Great Britain and practically every European Parliament, were in attendance. Congressman Richard D. Bartholdt. of St. Louis, presided.

The average municipal council is too unwieldy. and the members have not sufficient leisure, as a rule, to handle the details of civic government, or give important questions the study they deserve.

Against the plan of government by a small commission it is alleged that the safeguards against corruption are weakened by a reduction in numbers: but the tendency is toward smaller organizations, and in the majority of the cities of this Province the size of the councils and school boards has been reduced during the past two or three years. In Toronto a compromise has been found which may prove a pattern for other municipalities. The executive functions of the city council have been largely absorbed by a committee of five, called the board of control, whose members are paid one thousand dollars per year for their services. Formerly this committee consisted of the mayor and four aldermen elected by the council. Last year the board of control was elected directly by the people, the mayor being a member ex-officio. The board somewhat corresponds to the cabinet in our constitutional system, and the council to parliament. The controllers transact routine business, revise the reports of other committees, initiate undertakings and questions of policy, and make recommendations, subject to the review of the city council.
