Thirty-one patients in a Russian hotspital have recovered from stab wounds of the heart. wounds of the heart. Dr. Zlider says the patients were put under the influence of teser very soon after an injury, part of the chest wall was removed, the heart the stitches chest wall was removed, the neart lifted from its bed and the stitches quickly introduced between pulsa-tions. The bony chest wall over the heart was not put back in place, heart was not put back and only by skin and muscle. This was done to give the heart room to expand and to prevent adhesians from embarras-sing the heart's action. Several of the patients have resumed their usual employment.
