Legislative Assembly.

Prince Edward Island Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be nominated. The Private Bills Committee on whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

Sermons On

Catholic Worship

"The Gospel," the thirteenth of the series of Sermons on the general subject of Catholic Worship," is here appended. This Sermon was preached by the Rev. Michael Pirnat, Pastor of Holy Saviour Church, Meadville, Mont.

THE GOSPEL

In the preceding instruction we spoke of the Epistle, Gradual and Tract, or Sequence. Today we shall dwell on the Gospel. Upon the completion of the Tract or Sequence the Mass Book is moved to the other side of the Altar. This is done for a two-fold reason, historical and mystical. To understand the historical reason we should bear in mind that the early Christians contributed to maintenance of divine worship by offering the bread and wine for the sacrifice. These were placed on the Altar before the Offertory, on the left hand side. To make room for these the book was carried to the other side of the Altar. Though this historical reason has ceased to exist, the custom of moving the book to the other side of the Altar has been maintained for the following striking mystical reasons: The first lesson of Scripture, or the Epistle, is read on the left hand side of the Altar, which represents the Jews, because the word of God was first preached to the Jews; the book is then taken to the right hand side to signify that when many of the Jews had failed to accept the message of Christ, that message was transmitted to the Gentiles. Towards the end of Mass the book is brought back to the Epistle side to signify that, at the end of the world the Jews will recognize Jesus Christ as the true Messiah in accordance with the prophecies of Isaiah. (LIX, 20, 21) and St. Paul (Romans XI, 25-27.)

The word "Gospel" is used here not in its broad sense of "good tidings," but in its strictest meaning of one of the four gospels. These extracts from the Gospels are read, not only to put before the eyes of our mind the living picture of the person of Jesus Christ and to be instructed and edified by His words and actions, but also to pay religious veneration and homage to the truth of God, to God Himself present in His words.

The priest about to read or sing the Gospel, is mindful that God has said to the sinner: "Why dost thou declare my justice and take my covenant in the mouth? Fearing lest this reproach of God should fall upon him, the priest bows deeply before the middle of the Altar and asks God to cleanse his heart and lips as He cleaned the lips of the prophet Isaiah with a burning coal. Isaiah, indeed, had protested that he was a man of unclean lips, and therefore unworthy to praise the Lord. Whereupon one of the Seraphims had flown to him and had touched his mouth with a living coal, which he had taken with the tongs from the altar of holocausts offered for the forgiveness of sins, saying: "Behold this hath touched thy lips and thy iniquities shall be taken away and thy sins shall be cleansed." The priest then asks God likewise to cleanse his heart of sin and inclination to sin, and his lips of all the stains of idle, worldly, sinful talk, that he may be able worthily to proclaim the Holy Gospel. Having thus prayed for purification of

heart and lips, the priest now asks God to bless him, saying: "Give me Thy blessing, O Lord. Then, as the representative of the Church, as the ambassador of God, the priest pronounces on himself personally the Divine blessing, saying: "The Lord be in my heart and on my lips, that I may worthily and in a becoming manner announce His Holy Gospel. Amen." The priest having thus prayed for union of heart and distinctiveness and power of utterance, proceeds to the book to read the Gospel. The book is placed diagonally towards the corner of the Altar so that the priest while reading the Gospel is half turned towards the people.

THE SALUTATION.

The opening words comprise the mutual salutation and the announcement of the Gospel. The salutation, which the priest and the faithful address one to another, is, "The Lord be with you," and "With thy spirit." With these words the priest and the faithful ask God to enable them to understand the word of God aright, accept it with humble faith and carry it out in their daily lives. The Gospel then is announced in simple words, "The beginning of the Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew," or one of the other evangelists, or, if an extract be read, "The continuation of the Holy Gospel," etc. The server answers, Glory be to Thee, O Lord," to praise God who has revealed to us and to millions of others these good tidings. The priest then imprints with his thumb a cross on the first words of the Gospel, then on his forehead, mouth and breast. The sign of the cross made on the book expresses that the whole Gospel, the whole doctrine and the whole work of salvation is contained in the mystery of the cross. St. Paul calls the Gospel "The word of the Cross." The mystery of the cross is to the world foolishness, but to us power and wisdom. The cross is our teacher; from it we learn the Christian virtues of self-denial, humility, obedience, faith, patience, hope, love of God and of our neighbor. The priest and the faithful also sign themselves with the sign of the cross to express that they preserve the doctrine of the cross in their minds, on their lips in their hearts, and they are not ashamed to proclaim it and are ready to suffer all things, even death for the faith of Christ.

THE SYMBOLISM.

At Solemn High Mass the reading of the Gospel is marked by the splendor of lighted candles and the sweet odor of incense. During the singing of the Gospel two acolytes hold lighted torches and stand on each side of the book. The light symbolizes Jesus Christ, "The sun that knows no setting." Christ the light of the world, leading men from the darkness of superstition to the brightness of grace and truth. The psalmist exclaims, "Thy word is a lamp of my feet and a light to my path." The lighted candles admonish us of the words of Christ: "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father, who is in Heaven."

The faithful here are admonished

to be not only hearers of the word but doers as well.

The incensing at the Gospel has also a very special meaning.

The book is incensed at the Gospel to signify the profound reverence due to the word of God.

The clouds which encircle the book call to our mind how by the announcement of the Gospel is spread the good odor of Jesus Christ.

The sweet smell of incense reminds us of how pure and virtuous every Christian should be.

After the reading of the Gospel the acolyte answers in the name of the people, "Praise be to Thee, O Christ." The priest then kisses the first word of the Gospel, saying, "By virtue of the word of the Gospel may our sins be blotted out." The priest here means venial sins, for the remission of which attrition is sufficient. This sorrow for sin may easily be evoked by the reading of the Gospel. The kissing of the Gospel symbolizes the love and reverence of the priest for the teachings of the Master.

In conclusion, let us thank God for His holy doctrine, and let us always show ourselves worthy followers of our Divine Teacher, Jesus Christ.

Cardinal's Gems Found

Jewels that at one time belonged to the late Cardinal Newman, which had been stolen from the Cardinal's former residence, have been recovered by the police of Birmingham, England. A man named Taylor was being tried at Smethwick on a charge of house-breaking, and when the police were searching his home for evidence against him the jewels were found. There were six articles in the lot, a gold amethyst ring bearing a Latin inscription, a gold watch chain and pendant and three old fashioned seals, one of which was heavily embossed and was set with a crystal. The jewels had formerly been kept in a glass case which stood in the library at the oratory in Hagley road. When officers showed them to the Father Superior there he at once identified them as having belonged to the late Cardinal.

Land Regulations

The sole head of a family over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or an subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicants must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead an acre and cultivate 70 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a house worth \$300.00.

When Dominion Lands are surveyed or created for entry, return of soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

The Grand Trunk
Railway

(Ottawa Journal.)
In 1920 the Grand Trunk Railway was on the verge of bankruptcy. The gulf between its earnings and operating expenses was widening; its liabilities dwarfed its assets; it was unable to meet its maturing obligations. Only Government intervention saved it from the hammer, from hopeless, complete liquidation.

Country and you have a combined situation which is enough to shock even the most light-minded of the community. It avails nothing to say, as so many are going, thoughtless people do say, that England and European Countries are worse off. There is little satisfaction to us in that. We must attend to our knitting and let the other peoples attend to theirs. We must work out our own salvation; other peoples will not help us much along that line.

Co-operation of the best minds of the country is necessary to save the situation, otherwise we will continue to drift until calamity overtakes us. Has it occurred to you, friend reader, that in our weakened financial and commercial strength, the weight of numbers and the trade policies of exclusion of the United States may gulf us, unless the situation be boldly and firmly gripped.

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Canadian Trade

General and foundationless criticism of the Government leads nowhere. 

At Victoria, B. C., 1,600 men registered as out of work. When the call came for help from the prairies only 600 of these men volunteered. Those who did go were evidently in earnest and deserve all the help and consideration that can be given.

Twenty-five persons were injured, among them several women and children, when a bomb was thrown on the 7th into a bathing establishment at Varazze, near Genoa, where hundreds of persons were on their summer vacation. Two persons have been arrested in connection with the explosion, which is believed to have been the work of an anarchist.

Stepping from one track to another in front of a fast approaching engine, Thomas Parks, of Napanee, an employe of the G. T. R., was fatally injured near Ernestown, Ont. The unfortunate man had a premonition that death was near, for in the morning he remarked to his fellow-laborers that he would not be with them in the afternoon.

The schooner yacht America set out on her last voyage on Sept. 10th. The boat which went to England 70 years ago and brought back the cup that has since become the classic trophy of yachting competition the world over, is bound for Annapolis, Maryland there to be turned over to the government for preservation at the naval academy.

The mountain village of Molterno, near Trent in the Italian Tyrol, has been destroyed by fire. Seven hundred persons were made homeless. The flames were carried along by a cold wind added to the discomfort of the women and children, who already had suffered much from exposures to the frigid mountain air. Tents and other relief materials have been sent to the scene by the Government.

Under date of Sept. 8th from Dundee, Scotland, comes the following: For the third successive night a mob of unemployed engaged in window smashing. The entire police force and a body of special constables had difficulty in dispersing the mob, but small parties continued the campaign of destruction. Scarcely a shop window in some districts was left untouched. The damage amounts to many thousands of pounds. Numerous arrests were made.

In a statement issued at Montreal on the 8th on behalf of the dining car departments of the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk and Canadian National railways, announcing cuts in prices for meals on trains, it is explained that the reductions will be substantial and will affect practically the entire menu. Further reductions as circumstances justify are promised until normal is reached. The cuts go into effect on September 15.

Local and Other Items

The Delegates to the second assembly of the League of Nations have decided to reduce all social activities to an absolute minimum. It has been decided to hold no official banquets, and to abstain from all exchanges of cards. This is in marked contrast to conditions prevailing at the first assembly held last year, when extensive entertaining was done by all the delegations. Economy was given as the reason for this year's decision, which was made at the request of the secretary.

The question of changing the seat of the League of Nations was brought up on the 8th in the financial committee of the assembly. Delegates alleged that the cost of holding the sessions were excessive. Transfer of the seat to Fontainebleau, Turin, Brussels and Vienna was discussed. The Swiss delegates protested, but several of the other members, including M. Noblemaire, France, strongly supported the suggestion.

Fire Destroys

Digby, N. S., Sept. 7.—Advices received at ten o'clock tonight from Annapolis Royal, 20 miles away, were to the effect that a fire, which broke out there early this evening was under control after having wiped out approximately one-third of the town, including a large portion of the business section.

Scenes of the utmost confusion prevailed as scores of people carried furniture and moveable property to safety through the smoke-filled streets, while others hauled water from the Annapolis River, and tried to prevent the spread of the conflagration by blowing up houses in its path with dynamite. Families rendered homeless by the disaster are tonight being housed by their more fortunate neighbors, and at the little village of Clementsport, seven miles away.

The fire started in the Queen's Hotel stables, from a cigarette stub. It spread very rapidly, due to lack of water, and the fact that the town was without pumping apparatus with which to utilize water from the Annapolis river, flowing little more than a hundred yards from the scene of the outbreak. A heavy fog settling on the town shortly after nightfall helped to check the flames, however, at the open space near St. Luke's Church on the one hand, and at the fireproof building of the Royal Bank of Canada on the other.

Land Regulations

The sole head of a family over 18 years of age, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta

applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency in District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead on said and cultivate 70 extra acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and a house worth \$200.00.

When Dominion Lands are directly used or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agents' Office (not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holder of entries may count time of employment as farm labourer in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
