Afterwards Boyril was discontinued. and the animals fell back to the orishop filled with Christmas $cak \in s$, ginal weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white of egg, it

was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 21/2 to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect.
