The incident occurred while the regiment was returning from camp at Moose Jaw; Sask. Two American flags on the Main Street were set upon by a score of youths and the Stars and Stripes soon trampled into dirty rags. Then a man was rolled in mud. Im-Then a man was rolled in mud. Immediately afterward an American attempted to raise the flag on the to of a lamp post. It was torn down and a free fight ensued. Earlier in the day fifty Americans waving flags attempted to march up Main Street. Fearing a riot the police turned them back to the hotel where they had been

celebrating the Fourth of July. Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day. There still has been no formal de claration of war, although it is report ed the Bulgarian Minister to Greece has been recalled and has not yet departed for Athens. Premier Venizole announced to the Greek Parliament that Greek forces won a victory at Kilkish and captured sixty guns. This appears to have been secured by the amazing swiftness of the Greek advance from Saloniki, which, according to various correspondents, took the Bulgarians completely by surprise. The Servians claim a victorious advance to Kptchana, but the Servian invasion of Bulgaria has been repulsed. Bulgaria reported executing a turning movement which nullifies the Servians advance.

JOHANNESBURG,

South Africa, To-Day, Complete anarchy prevails here as a result of a strike which started a few days ago The authorities were obliged to order troops to fire on the rioters who applied the torch to the tar newspaper office, another large building in the centre of the town, as well as to the Bramfontein Station. Mob rioters attacked Werner Biet's headquarters, where the police fired upon them and compelled them to retreat. They soon renewed the attack, however, whereupon dragoons charged and disposed of them. Intermittent firing took place in several parts of the city, and up to midnight thirty persons had been taken to hospitals. Four civilians were killed and fifty wounded in a midnight wounded in a midnight control of the city.

wounded in a midnight riot connected with the miners' strike. The cavalry made repeated charges against mobs and wild confusion continued throughout the night with most streets darkness, the lamps having been destroyed by rioters. The situation which arose here last night was never equalled in the history of this country. The mob which seized the railway station at Johannesburg and the Bramfontein sidings a half mile away were unrestricted masters of the situation and had the railway officials at their mercy while troops and police were engaged in other parts of the

Rioters held up all the outgoing trains. When the police got the upper hand an attempt was made to dispatch the southern mails. This was a signal for a savage onslaught by the mob with sticks and stones. Police within the building overpowered them and in the meantime enormous crowds had sathered outside ous crowds had gathered outside Mounted troops charged them three times and the rioters retaliated with stones and bullets. By nine o'clock the situation was extremely grave; Park Station was in flames and in-Park Station was in flames and incendiaries were setting fire to other large buildings. The Star building was ignited from front and rear and soon also was a mass of flames, mounted forces galloped up but found it impossible to take control; they were jeered when they called on rioters to stop their disorders. At first troops and police refrained from using their firearms but later fired over heads of the rioters; re-inforcements of dragoous by continued charges finally scattered the rioters,



Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I should like to direct the attention of the Farmers, Fisherof Newfoundland and Labrador to the great possibilities and profit of Fox-rearing, or as is is called in the No country is so well situated geo-graphically for the rearing of the very finest pelts. In no other coun is the food to be had so cheaply, try is the food to be had so cheaply, fish offal in summer, and whale meat stored for winter use, along with scraps from the table. A quarter of a pound of any kind of offal meatper day—is ample to keep one fox in good health. The building of the ranch need not cost a ten dollar bill, besides which, nearly every fisherman or farmer in this country has besides which, nearly every fisherman or farmer in this country has a spare bit of ground on which nothing will grow, but would make an ideal spot (provided it is dry) on which to build. One pair of foxes could be reared on a space of 8 x 20 feet meaning the feet or even smaller, and the cost of feed is given by some of those already in the business, at one cent per day. In this country it would be even less. It is pretty well known hat the fur trade of Newfoundland done puts more money in the pock-its of the poor man than the sealnery, and if properly practiced and no out-of-season skins sent to narket, the amount could easily be nore than doubled. Add to that, at price now ruling for live foxes all colors, and the large prices hat are offered for Otter, Mink, Mar n, Lynx, Muskrat for breeding pur oses, and you have unlimited pilities, as to the ranching of thos animals by our own people. noney made out of the venture, would all go out of the country to enrich the stranger, without benefit-ting the people of the country in any way. The fact is that strangers com-ing in here to ranch fexes would really become competitors of our own small fox ranchers who are as good a position to do the work for themselves as to do it for outside companies, with the added satisfac ion of reaping the fancy prices hemselves.

Very many valuable animals have been shipped out of the country in the last two years. Many of those were sold by fishermen who knew nothing of the value of live foxes, and who sold them for double the value of the skin or pelt, which in all cases, would really mean that they sold for less than quarter their real value. I think that it is a great pity that the public should not be given the information as to the valof the animals, and shown how easily they can be reared in captivity.


