

The extent to which this effect takes place may be verified by placing a gas lamp close to a celling without any provision for interfering with the up-rushing air currents. The charred particles which collect imme-diately above the lamp are the re-mains of dust particles. Actual experiments have shown that the burning of gas lamps in rooms previ-ously containing bacteria, resulted in absolute sterifization of the air.
