



He does not believe these things are coming, but he thinks it unwise to disregard the fact that they may come. It is possible that Russia may yet be able to strike a great military blow this year. If that should happen, Mr. Simonds says, the war might be ended in 1917. Or, also, it might be ended this year, if the British and Americans together can sufficiently dispose of the submarine menace to convince Germany that Britain cannot be starved out of the war as Germany now





At last night's meeting of the Citi zens' Committee, Vice-Chairman W. A O'D. Kelly presided, the attendance being exceptionally large. The depution to the Joint Select Committee submitted their report, which was gone over by the Committee, after which the Secretary's report on the committee's findings during the past year were discussed. Mr. N. Andrews proposed and Mr. F. Gough seconded the following motion, which was passed unanimously: "That the Citizens' Committee make a recommendaion to the Joint Select Committee that no increase be made in the "City Tax" (water and sewerage) during the present war." The remainder of the report will be gone over on Wednesday night. It is rumoured that certain members of the old Civic Commission have some additional sections be added to the Charter.

STRANGE STEAMER REPORTED. 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

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
