

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7. The Governor-in-Council shall have power to appoint Trade Commissioners or Government Agents, to act in any country or place in the interest of this Colony and its trade, and shall have powers to prescribe their duties and fix their salaries, which shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. The Minister Marine and Fisheries shall have power to authorize and direct the carrying on of research work in connection with the fisher ies of the Colony, the cost and expense of which shall be payable out of the revenue of the Colony. All fees paid under the pro-visions of section four of this Act shall be collected by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and paid by him into the public treasury.


8. Sections 3 and 4 of this Act shall have effect as though they were included in Chapter 22 of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled "Of the Customs", and the provisions of that Chapter, and of any Act amending or extending that Chapter shall apply accordingly; and if any person ships, or attempts to ship, codfish in contratention of any rules made under this Act with respect to exportation, he shall be liable to a pen-alty equal to the value of such codfish including the duty thereon. aug17,21,24,28,31,sep4,7,11
