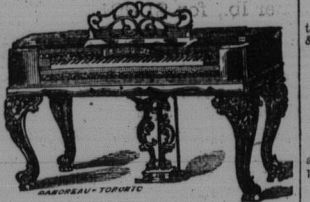

It is reported that General Cabrera, the noted Carlist, has appeared in Catalonia.

THE CONDITION of the national finances causes much anxiety. It is estimated that the expenditure will exceed the revenue by twelve millions.

BRUSSELS, May 9. - The senate has refused to pass a bill for the abolition of imprisonment for debt. Mr. Bata, Minister of Justice, has tendered his resignation for this reason. He is urged to remain in office but refuses to do so unless the senate is dissolved.

QUEENSTON, May 6. - The steamer Russia arrived.

FLORENCE, May 9. - A new cabinet has been formed as follows: - President, G. A. Mens Dera; Minister of Foreign Affairs, Minghetti; Minister of Interior Affairs, Ferraresi; Minister of Justice, Miabella; Minister of Commerce, Borghi. There will probably be no change in heads of war, marine or finance departments.

BERLIN, May 9. - A congress of German protestants is to meet at Worms on the 31st of May. The object of the meeting is to consider and frame a reply to the recent appeal of the Pope to Protestants.

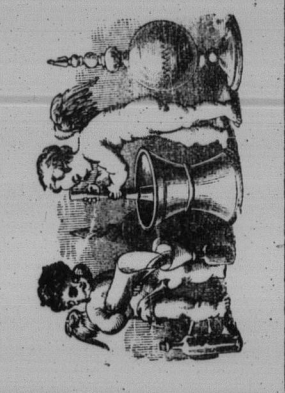

The Crowded Thoroughfares of London.

Among the many great improvements now going on in London to relieve the over-crowded state of traffic, and for opening up new means of communication, the Tower Subway is one which deserves especial notice.

It is a tunnel less than a quarter of a mile in length, access being gained to it by a shaft at each end. The depth of these shafts will be fifty feet and 60 feet respectively, in which it is proposed to have lifts for the transit of passengers, parcels, &c., and from the Subway, which will be about twenty-two feet below the bed of the river.

A weight-iron shield will be employed overlapping the tunnel, provided with doors in the front through which workmen can drive the heading, but which can be immediately closed on any appearance of water, and so render all water-tight; this shield will be propelled by powerful screws, and as it progresses the tunnel segments inserted. The Tower Subway was commenced on February 16th last, and as the shaft to the Middlesex side is also sunk to the depth of sixty feet, and the remainder of the work well advanced, it is expected to be opened to the public before the commencement of the year 1870.
