

OUR NEW STORY.

We will begin to-morrow another of those very popular stories which during the past few years have appeared in the MERCURY. The tale is entitled "For The King," and relates to incidents transpiring at the time "Bonnie Prince Charlie" attempted to regain the kingdom which his father's folly had lost to the Stuart Family. It furnishes many interesting facts in relation to the Scottish Rebellion of that year ; and it is full of daring adventures, instances of heroic courage and endurance, and descriptive scenes which charm the reader with their beauty and graphic power. This tale when first published created a great sensation in Britain, and 'it cannot fail to afford equal interest to all readers on this side of the At-

lantic. How Best to Fix the Tariff. The Monetary Times, whose views on questions of finance and other matters affecting trade are generally sensible and practical, refers in a late article to the difficulties which beset a Government when adjusting the tariff, and makes a suggestion with the view of remedying the evil, which is worthy of attention. It says : -- "It is not always that we are so fortunate as to find in our Cabin . ets a man who has had the political influence to command a place there and at the same time the needful acquaintance with the commercial requirements of the country to grap ple with the duties devolved upon a Finance Minister. The commercial interests of Canada have long been, in some measure, subjected to the vioissitudes of chance; and instead of adopting a settled policy in regard to foreign trade, our tariff has been

shifted about in a manner that does little credit to our intelligence. Of course we have the right to send deputations and prote '5, but only after the mischief has been partly done. Some means must, therefore, be found by which the knowledge of the commerce 1 community can be brought to bear upon our tariff legislation. That there are difficulties to be encountered in carrying this object into effect, we cannot deny; but they are not insuperable. Why could not a Committee of the House, sworn to secrecy, be empowered to deal with the tariff and make its rc port to the H e? Such a Com-mittee, if properly constituted, would give us someting intelligible at least, would be much more likely to reflect the general opinion of the country, and would relieve the Gov-enment of the day of one of the greatest embarrassments to which it is now constantly exposed."

In these ar States are produced all the wines of the country, excepting about one million and one-half of gallons raised in smaller quantities in the other States. H., con-structed a rude vesselpropelled by steam, and made a successful trip on the Con-necticut river, between Oxford, N. H., and Fairlee, Vt. Capt. Morely came to New York with a model of his boat and it is claimed by the lecturer that he had interviews with Follton and Livingstone, and that Fulton, aided by wealth and in-fluence, built a steamboat on the princi-ple of Morely's.



The Prevating Drought the Main Cause.

Conflagration in Toronto. LOSS ABOUT \$250,000.


