The aristocratic swindler to whom we alluded last week as the "Hon. Hugh Leslie Couston" deserves a fuller notice. This was the name under which he crossed the Atlantic in '75 and by which he was known shortly afterwards when put into Woodstock jail for swindling. He arrived in Buffalo about two weeks ago and stopped at the Royal one day, giving his name as the "Honorable F. O. Drummond Hay, son of the Earl of Kinloch." He next found his way to the residence of a well-known gentleman near town, where he wished to find something to do. The gentleman being very good natured, allowed the aristocratic stranger to remain over night, after which he, the honorable, seemed to think that he could invite himself to remain indefinitely. "Nearly forty-eight years ago, under the cover of the little town of 2000, my mother was buried. I was but two years old. I remember her as she looked in death. That sweet, cold face has kept my heart warm through all the years."
