Do Your Shopping Early.

The members of the Leamington Women's Institute at its last meeting decided that so far as they personally were concerned they would do their Saturday shopping before six o'clock, or carry their own parcels home, and thus relieve the delivery boys. This is but the entering wedge, the thin edge, but its influence will be felt, and we trust others will follow their good example. Frequently through neglectfulness or lack of system, several parcels are bought at different times during the day and evening and the delivery wagon has to make to the same house four or five trips in a day when one would have been sufficient. When speaking of the service of the delivery clerks, one cannot praise them too highly. They are careful, anxious to do right, deliver right parcels promptly, and if they made a mistake sometimes, it should not be taken too seriously. While the delivery boys are patient and long-suffering, what should be said of the clerks that begin work at 7.30 to 8 in the morning and continue until 10.30 or 12 at night. Every buyer who persistently puts



# New Regulations.

Copies of the new regulations and course of study, for Public and High Schools, have been distributed by the Education Department. An examination of these reveals a number of important

Changes.

Grammar is no longer on the course of the Public study for the third classes of the Public Schools and the course in this subject for fourth classes has been considerably simplified.

The course in geography for all classes in Public Schools has been radically changed, physical, commercial and ecomchanged, physical, commercial and ecomic geography is to receive much greater attention than it has received in the past.

An effort is to be made to adopt the course of study in each school to the needs and the special conditions of the locality. In schools with only one teacher the trustees may substitute for art and nature study, one receive of the follow. nature study, one or more of the follow-

ing subjects: Comestic science, manual training, elementary agriculture. Physical culture is obligatory in all classes of the public schools, and a manuel will shortly be issued by the Education Department for the guidance of the teacher in taking up the subject.

A two years' course of study is outlined for fifth classes. On completing the first year's course a pupil may take an examination which will entitle him to a junior graduation diploma: both these

an examination which will entitle him to a junior graduation diploma; both these examinations will be conducted by the Education Department and either diploma will admit a pupil to a High School. The character and scope of the entrance examination is unchanged but in future it will be known as the Junior High School Entrance Examination. This examination less much of its examination. School Entrance Examination. This examination loses much of its importance from the fact that there are three other ways of securing admission to a High School, namely, (1) by means of a junior graduation department, (2) by means of a senior graduation diploma and (3) by passing the senior High School entrance examination. The latter examination admits the candidate to the middle school of High School.

With a view of securing more favorable weather conditions, the foregoing examinations and also the examination for admission to the Faculties of Education and the Normal School are to be completed by the 30th of June.

Soak old potatoes in water. Never allow potatoes to stand in the

Always pour off the water as soon as one and remove the cover to allow the

done and remove the cover to allow the steam to escape.

Baked potatoes should be rolled in a cloth till the skins burst. This prevents the potatoes from cooking too long, which makes them sticky and soggy.

Potatoes should be simmered (not boiled.) It is a waste of fuel and spoils the potatoes. Too rapid boiling makes them a solid paste which is both unpalatable and indigestible.

Cook potatoes with the skins on as often as possible. They are more nourishing and palatable. Mashed potatoes are

ing and palatable. Mashed potatoes are delicious cooked in their jackets, peeled and mashed.

Potatoes may be kept warm a long time without soiling, if the skins are broken and the kettle well ventilated. Potatoes well ventilated while cooking are more wholesome and of better flavor.

By cutting off the tails of three generations of dogs, it has been found possible in Columbus, Ohio, to breed tailless dogs. The investigators are satisfied that by cutting the dogs' heads off for the same period barkless canines will inevitably result result.
