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SEVEN CHILDREN SIDE BY SIDE.—Mr. James Summerville, who owns a house and lot here, carries on the lighter business in New York Harbor, has brought to this place, from time to time, and intended in his cemetery plot five of his eight children, and in early August he brought the others here in a feeble state of health. Two of the three died of an attack of scarlet fever, and the remaining one has partially recovered.

A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY. A terrible tragedy recently took place in Chicago whereby a man named Joseph W. Gladden, of Oklafoos, Iowa, ended his own existence, and also that of a woman who had come to the house claiming to be his wife. The two had been cloistered together some time, when the chambermaid, in passing the door of their room, heard a loud cry, and a moment later was horrified at beholding the woman emerge from the room with her throat cut. She was followed by Gladden, whose throat was also cut, and who fell upon the woman when both expired. As they were being carried from the building on the way to the Morgue the covering of the woman's face was accidentally lifted and a bystander with horror depicted upon his countenance exclaimed: "My God, that's my wife!" It proved to be so. She had left her husband a short time ago and followed her lover to Chicago. Her husband, who is a banker, man on the Iowa Central Railroad, had just arrived in the city searching for her, and was accidentally passing the house when he made the terrible discovery.

NEW BRUNSWICK POTATOES FOR ENGLAND. The Bathurst notes of the St. John Freeman has this item, which will be interesting to our farmers and exporters.

Mr. John E. O'Brien is now loading his new vessel with potatoes for Liverpool. Up to Tuesday evening over three thousand barrels had been put on board, and it is expected that the full cargo of nine thousand barrels will be on board by the end of next week.

A vessel from Tahiti in San Francisco brings news of the death of Queen Pomare, of the Society Islands, on September 17th, of heart disease. Her eldest son, Arxane, has been proclaimed king.

A servant girl named McFarlane, employed by the Sergeant-at-arms of the House of Commons, committed suicide by cutting her throat from ear to ear with a carving knife. No cause is assigned for the act.

A sad incident occurred at New York on Tuesday, when in a number of a boy named James Reilly, who had been arrested for burglary, almost instantly died upon being informed of her son's arrest.

Portland, Maine, harbor was filled with small fish, a day or two ago, evidently herring, which were pursued by a large number of whales, measuring thirty or forty feet in length. At one time three whales were seen blowing at once.

American beef can be obtained in Liverpool, England, for from 15 to 18 cents a pound, English beef selling for about 21 cents. The American article is pronounced to be of a superior quality, and raised by many of those who purchase both.

A marvellous escape from death by lightning was that of a member of the Suisun Valley, Cal., the other day, when a bolt struck the buggy in which he was riding, tore the top completely off, twisted up the iron work of the vehicle, killed both of his horses, and tore off two panels from the fence in front of them. Mr. Vest himself was stunned for the moment, but entirely unharmed.

MONKTON METHODIST CHURCH.—\$10,480. In the H. T.—Monkton's Methodist church was dedicated last Sunday by Rev. D. C. Currie, Rev. John Prince, and Rev. Dr. Ives. The collection amounted to the liberal sum of \$10,480, the contributions running from \$400 to the amount given by Mr. Stephen Humphrey, to \$5. The collection pays off the debt, buys an \$1800 organ, and carpets the church. Well done, Monkton Methodists.—St. John News, 23rd inst.

THE NORTHERN LIGHT.—The extensive preparations to this boat are now almost complete. A portion of her deck has been turned into a ladies' cabin, and the narrow berths on both sides of her cabin have been replaced by wider and more spacious staterooms. Four heavy beams have been placed immediately above her machinery. Her bow has been coated with iron plates, and the rudder gear replaced by very strong fixings. Her machinery has undergone a thorough repair and was tested yesterday.—Charlottetown Examiner.

General despatches from Rome as to the state of the Church, by the Pope's order, has expelled from the Society Father Crucio, editor of the Civita Cattolica, who both as a sacred orator and writer, was heretofore regarded one of the brightest ornaments of the Jesuit Order and Roman Church.

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
