THE GREAT CANADIAN

Ottawa, February 23—Talking about eggs, and Mr. Johnson, the Dunbar, the tinsmith, "I have just been looking into the question of the hen as a revenue producer. I find that there are about 14,000,000 hens in Canada. They yield about 20,000,000 dozen eggs a year. An average of a dozen the value is only 30¢, and the revenue derived by the federal government from taxation of spruce and pine, beer, malt and molasses is \$1,400,000 less than the value of the hen fruit. The yearly expenditure on taxation in Canada is \$1,200,000 less than the value of the product of our noble hens."
