THE
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RESOLUTIONS *unanimously adopted at the Annual Meeting of the Wesleyan Methodist Auxiliary Missionary Society of the Canada Eastern District, held at Quebec, on Monday Evening, May 20th, 1850. The Rev. Dr. RICHEY, in the Chair.*

After an Address from the Chairman, and the reading of the Report by the Secretary, the Rev. Mr. SCOTT; the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Moved by Rev. C. DEWOLFE, A. M., seconded by Rev. L. TAYLOR,

I.—That an abstract of the General Report of the Wesleyan Missionary Society be published, and that this Meeting devoutly acknowledges the goodness of God in continuing His blessing to the Wesleyan Missions throughout the world, and other similar Protestant and Evangelical Institutions.

Moved by Rev. M. McDONALD, seconded by Rev. HENRY COX,

II.—That this Meeting desires to express its undiminished attachment to the Wesleyan Missionary Society, and to those devoted and faithful Brethren who have for so long a period conducted the affairs of this great Evangelical Institution; and while the Meeting recognizes the Providence of God, in the prosperity and extension of our Foreign and Colonial Missions, it also purposes to increase its own exertions as an Auxiliary for the support of the Society's plans and operations.

Moved by Rev. HENRY LANTON, seconded by Rev. J. JENKINS,

III.—That this Meeting deeply laments, that so large a part of the world remains unvisited by the Heralds of the Cross, and earnestly prays that means may be supplied by the Church, and blessed by the Lord the Spirit, to the speedy conversion of all mankind.

REPORT.

THE events of the past year in connexion with our Missions have tended to remind us more forcibly than ever, that all our help is laid on One who is mighty to save, and whilst we have mournfully to record the death of many of our devoted Missionaries who have been called away from their toils and conflicts, we would make especial mention of the decease of the Rev. R. L. Lusher, who was honorably identified with our work in these Provinces, and after years of successful labor in the Lord's Vineyard, and then years of patient submission to God in grievous bodily affliction, made, last summer, a triumphant change of mortality for immortality; and of the Rev. Matthew Lang, whose devoted attention to the great duties of his office as a Minister of Christ, had justly endeared him to the many stations he had so honorably occupied in this district, and who was suddenly called last winter, literally, and, according to his own oft expressed desire, "to lay down his body with his charge, and cease at once to work and live."

"Our great cause has been exposed to the attacks of opponents at home in England and here in this land, but out of all the Lord has brought us by his love, and our friends in the mother country appear determined this year, relying on the assistance of Almighty God, to make strenuous efforts to advance the income of the Society to £150,000 ster. a-year—a consummation devoutly to be wished for, when almost every mail from our Foreign Mission stations brings calls for help, and when God by His providence is evidently preparing the way before us. O that we may have grace to know the day of our visitation, and wisely to improve the opportunities thus afforded to advance Christ's kingdom. The income of the Parent Society for the year ending December 30th, 1849, was £111,685 13s. 6d., being £7,558 13s. 11d. more than that of the previous year, and larger than that of any preceding year since our organization;

to God be all the praise. The income of this auxiliary for the year ending May, 1850 was £874 8s. 6d., £5 13s. 5d. less than that of last year, which deficiency is partly to be accounted for from the peculiar severity of the present commercial depression with which, especially, Montreal and Quebec have been called to contend, and in some smaller degree to a very unfounded and unjustifiable attempt made in certain parts of this District to induce our people to believe, that monies subscribed to the Mission cause are not devoted to the object for which they are solicited, but are appropriated in this country without reference to the General Mission Fund. This attempt to impose upon the credulity of the public and to stop the supplies in the District, has been well exposed by many of the Missionaries on their respective circuits, and to all persons capable of judging of ordinary transactions in business will require only a moment's examination, to appear in its true character. In the mean time we know that truth is mighty and will prevail. We proceed to give a detailed Summary of the progress of this blessed cause during the past year.

EUROPE.

Ireland has been the scene of disease—pestilence—trouble—misery and mortality, but the Word of God is less restrained than formerly, and our faithful Missionaries, amidst privations, and in perils of various kinds, have pursued their way, visiting the abodes of wretchedness and preaching from house to house, the Gospel of salvation.

France still remains in an unsettled condition, but it is hoped that the day of her regeneration is dawning, and that the Gospel will soon be permitted to exercise its sanctifying and elevating influence upon that great but unhappy nation.

Our Missionaries continue at the post of duty, and in the Journal of Mr Gallienne, we were much affected by the honor he enjoyed in being permitted to preach the Gospel to the descendants of the ancient Waldenses in the high Alps—and to traverse as an ambassador of the Cross the same places which have been rendered sacred ground, by the memorable labors of Oberlin and Neff. He speaks of preaching at Dormillouse. "At dark the church

bell rang and we proceeded to worship, lanterns seemed like large glow-worms spread over the paths, and showed that groups of peasants were coming from the various hamlets to the house of God—Dormillouse is one of those hallowed spots on which the mind rests with feelings of veneration. Here it was that the devoted Neff, especially, passed so many days in fatiguing toil, and afterwards witnessed such pleasant fruits of grace. With what varied feelings did I again enter his pulpit, and address his dear Alpine flock! There are many other interesting pages in the history of this village.

"Never has the Popish heresy found one single adherent here. Since the time when their ancestors left their sunny plains to live in wilds and deserts, rather than renounce their faith, neither the sword nor the mass has ever succeeded. The popish Bishop of Embrun had a church and parsonage built here early in the eighteenth century; and a priest of engaging manners and conciliating temper, was stationed at Dormillouse. But it was all in vain. Long ago the priests had altogether retired, wearied out and disappointed; while the Church has become a Protestant temple, and the parsonage the occasional residence of a Wesleyan Missionary. The Methodist Society in this village is still the largest and most deeply pious of any in the valleys."

At Gibraltar, the foundation of an extensive Spanish work, it may reasonably be hoped, is being silently laid, by the religious training of a large number of children.

ASIA.

In the Island of Ceylon a most gratifying increase of native converts is reported, making the whole number in Society to amount to 1214,—8 new Chapels have been built, and the truth as it is in Jesus appears to be exciting additional interest and inquiry among the idolaters.

In continental India, the Missionaries are steadily pursuing their work, and at the Mysore, are devoting much time and labor, in co-operation with the Missionaries of other denominations to a revised translation of the Scriptures in the Canarese language.

The AUSTRALIAN and POLYNESIAN Missions come next in order. The local Reports from the Stations in *Australia* communicate a great amount of encouraging information. It has been found necessary to enlarge the York-street Chapel, in the Sydney North Circuit, by the erection of a gallery. The Chapel now contains sittings for twelve hundred persons. The cause at Surrey-Hills has increased so considerably in importance, that it is deemed desirable to constitute it a separate Circuit. A large place of worship is requisite to provide for the rapidly increasing population....The general aspect of the work in the Melbourne Circuit, in the Colony of *Australia Felix*, or Victoria, is reported as "very encouraging.".....The Society's Missions in *South Australia* are rapidly rising in importance, and extending their beneficial influence throughout the Colony...In *Western Australia*, the Mission embraces as large a sphere as could well be occupied by a single Missionary.....The Hobart-Town and New-Norfolk Circuits, in *Van Diemen's Land*, are in a prosperous state.

The review of the operations of the Society's Mission, in *Neo Zealand*, during the past year, affords much gratification.

In every department of the work there is activity and progress. The Missionaries have been greatly cheered by the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher to take charge of the Establishment for the education of their children; and Mr. and Mrs. Reid have made a very encouraging commencement of their duties at the Native Training Institution, and the Central School. The influence of Christianity is more decidedly manifested among the people generally within the influence of the Mission, in the gradual enlightenment of their minds, and the elevation of their character; and, as a consequence, a growing improvement is taking place in their temporal condition. Nor do these views of the state of the work depend exclusively upon Missionary evidence. They are amply supported by the independent testimonies of others, who, from their position, have the means of examining the subject for themselves, and are placed in circumstances which shield them from the suspicion of allowing their judgment to be warped by any undue bias or partiality.

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The Mission-work in the important District of *Feejee* has suffered serious interruptions from the diminution which has taken place in the number of faithful labourers, male and female, chiefly by the visitations of disease and death. The Committee have made arrangements for supplying, in part, the vacancies which have thus been created, by directing that three new Missionaries should be sent, as soon as possible, from Australia to *Peejee*; but considerable time must necessarily elapse before they can acquire the language, and thus be able to enter upon the work in full efficiency. The brethren who have been left in the District, under the accumulated burden of cares and labours, which will continue to press upon them until they obtain adequate help, especially need all the aid which can be afforded by the sympathy and prayers of the friends of the Society. The official Reports from the District contain much information, which is thus partly of a painful character, but, on the whole, warranting the most cheering anticipations as to the ultimate triumph of Christianity throughout dark and cannibal *Feejee*.

The inhabitants of the town in which the Missionaries reside in the Nandy Circuit, and those of another town about three miles distant, are all Christians. Like all the other Christian Natives in *Feejee*, they highly prize such portions of the Holy Scriptures as they possess. "One of the young men," write the Missionaries, "to whom we gave a copy of the New Testament, pressed the blessed treasure to his heart, and literally danced for joy."

A letter recently received from the Rev. James Calvert, of *Vewa*, furnishes a most remarkable instance of Christian heroism displayed by two Missionaries' wives,—one of whom was his own wife, and the other, the wife of his colleague, Mr. Lyth,—in an attempt to save some Native females from destruction at a Cannibal Feast. Visitors had arrived at *Bau*, and, according to the native custom, human beings must be procured for their entertainment. A war-party was accordingly sent out, under the sanction of the Priest, and returned with a number of females whom they had captured. Mr. Lambert says,—

"Before their arrival, the report of their success had reached Bau. All was glee and triumph. 'Food is procured ! A great thing has been accomplished !' The canoes were awaited with anxious anticipation. In the meantime, the report reached Vewa also. Mrs. Lyth and Mrs. Calvert were all alone. 'Fourteen women are to arrive at Bau to-morrow, who are to be killed and cooked for the Butone people.' Female sympathy and female courage were excited and raised to the uttermost. They resolved to go ! A canoe was procured. Trembling from head to foot, they were poled along to the bloody city. As they went, canoes with streamers were seen approaching, muskets were fired in triumph, the shrieks of some, murdered as they were brought ashore, were heard ! 'Alas ! we're too late !' However, they urged their way. On the beach, they were met by a Christian Bau Chief, who dared boldly to join our wives, and urged them onward. 'Make haste. Some are dead ; but some are alive.' With a whale's tooth in each hand, they approached his cannibal Majesty, Tanoa, and besought him to spare the lives of the women. The unfeeling heart, one would think, felt then ; but that dark mind, it is to be feared, will continue grossly dark, and be cast into outer darkness. However, he issued his orders : 'Those who are dead are dead, but those who are still alive *shall live* only.' With haste, a messenger went to Nga Vinde, the chief of the fishermen, and speedily returned to report that five were still alive. Our wives, however, could not hastily return. They went to the house of the murderer. There he sat in state, in full dress, with an admirably dressed head of hair, but manifestly now ashamed of what no one dared formerly to reprove him for. Our wives reproved him and exhorted him. He vainly excused, and professed his love to the *lotu*. Many of the chief and other women blessed our wives for their efforts, even amidst the general rejoicings of Bau, on that, to them, festival day."

AFRICA.

The Missions in SOUTH AFRICA commence with the *Cape of Good Hope* District.

The Report from Cape-Town is very satisfactory. During the year a gracious visitation from above has been experienced, and the labors of the Missionaries have been attended with much success. A considerable number of individuals, having experienced the saving power of the Gospel, have become consistent members of our Religious Society.

A nett increase of ten Church-Members has taken place at Khamies-Bersg, in Little Namaqualand. From Nisbett-Bath in Great Namaqualand, the Missionary reports that they have had many indications of good in the circuit during the year. Some of the parents are endeavouring to instruct their children, and "train them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." A number of young persons are making pleasing progress in reading, and "evince a strong desire to be instructed in the things of God." There is consequently a great demand for copies of the New Testament, of a convenient size for them to carry in their pockets while attending to their flocks and herds in the fields; which demand the Missionary regrets he has not yet been able properly to supply.

The review of Missionary operations in *Albany and Kaffra* District, during the last year, is highly encouraging. The Mission-Stations which were suspended during the war, have been, so far as pecuniary means would allow, resumed under very auspicious circumstances. An influence appears to rest upon the minds of many of the Chiefs and people highly favourable to the Mission-cause. The promised blessing of the Great Head of the Church has, in a very marked manner, accompanied the use of the appointed means. The beneficial effects of the "Watson Institution," the Mission-Schools, and the press, are now becoming strikingly manifest. An improved Class of Native Teachers is rising up, and the whole country, embraced within the limits of the District, presents a more hopeful and inviting prospect than was ever before witnessed. Were an adequate number of devoted English Missionaries employed in the

direction of the native agency, and in the general management of the Missions, the anticipation of most important results might now be reasonably indulged.

IN WESTERN AFRICA, the important Mission at *Sierra Leone*, continues to enjoy much prosperity.

Through the blessing of God accompanying the appointed ordinances of religion, the work of religion both deepens and extends. There is an evident improvement in the tone of personal piety among our people, and there has been a nett increase of Three Hundred and Fifty-eight in the number of full and accredited Church-members during the last year. The most serious difficulty which is now experienced at this Mission has resulted from the rapid increase which has taken place ; in consequence of which there is not Chapel-room sufficient for the accommodation of the people, nor could a sufficient amount of subscriptions be raised upon the spot to erect large new Chapels to meet the exigency which has arisen. The number of Church-members and Scholars connected with the *Bathurst-street* Chapel at *Freetown* is Eleven Hundred and Seventy-six ; but the Chapel will not accommodate more than Six Hundred persons. The *Grass-Field* Chapel will only contain Seven Hundred, but the Church-members and scholars alone amount to Thirteen Hundred and Seventy-nine ; and the *Gibraltar* Chapel, also is not half large enough to contain the congregation. Exertions have been making for some time to raise a sufficient fund for the building of the proposed new "*Bunton-Chapel*," and the sum of Seven Hundred Pounds has been contributed towards it by the people ; but the amount received from all sources is not yet sufficient to meet the expense of the erection. The Missionaries write upon the subject with great feeling and earnestness, apprehensive that the work must eventually suffer, if sufficient Chapel accommodation cannot be provided for our religious Societies and Congregations. In the Education Department, progress is made. "We are using," the Missionaries report, "the best agency of which we can avail ourselves ; and, upon the whole, the Class of Teachers now employed are superior to any we have ever before had in the service of the Mission." The Missionaries refer to the Training Institution in a very encouraging strain. They

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say—"The young men of this and kindred institutions are our hope. We look to them as the future instruments under God, of spreading the knowledge of the Redeemer throughout this vast continent: and we trust that, by prayerfulness and diligence on our part, and with God's blessing on the work of our hands, they will be prepared to sow the precious seed of the Word in the hearts of their benighted countrymen, which shall spring up unto everlasting life.

On the *Gambia*, the promising state of things at *St. Mary's*, which Mr. Badger reported last year, continues to realize the expectations which were then formed. The work has advanced. There has been a decided improvement in the tone of piety among our people; and a considerable addition to the number of Church-Members has been made.

A very gratifying testimony in favour of the Society's Mission in *Ashanti* has been given by Sir William Winniett, the Governor of the Gold-Coast, in the Journal of his recent Visit to *Kumasi*, contained in a Despatch addressed to the Right Honourable Earl Grey, and printed by order of the House of Commons during the last Session of Parliament.

After describing the barbaric pomp displayed at his public reception by the King, in a large open space in the Capital, his Excellency remarks—"Immediately after the procession had closed, we repaired to the Wesleyan Mission-House where we found comfortable arrangements made by the Rev. Mr. Hillard, the resident Missionary in *Kumasi*, for convenient quarters during our stay. Greatly as I had been interested with the manner in which the King received me, the appearance of such a vast number of uncivilized men under such entire control, the new style of building exhibited, and its pretty contrast with the ever-fresh and pleasing green of the banyan-trees, I was equally interested and excited at the appearance of the Wesleyan Mission-house,—a neat cottage, built chiefly with the teak or edom wood of the country As I sat down in the airy, spacious hall, in the cool of the evening, after all the toils and excitement of the day, and contemplated this little European establishment, planted in the midst of barbarism, two hundred miles into the interior of *Africa*, exhibiting to thousands of untutored Pagans the comforts

and conveniences of civilized life, and the worship of the true God, I could not but think deeply and feelingly on the great triumph thus achieved by Christianity and civilization."..... In the subsequent part of the Journal, His Excellency, in describing a visit which he received from the King, observes—"He came to the street in the beautiful little phaeton presented to him by the Wesleyan Missionary Society in 1841; and I was pleased to observe, from the excellent condition of the phaeton, the great care which he has taken of so valuable and appropriate a present.".....Remarking upon a conversation with the King on another occasion, His Excellency adds—"Matters relative to the Wesleyan Mission in Kumasi were then referred to, and I was much gratified to find how completely the Mission has secured his confidence and esteem."

In the course of the last year, an arrangement has taken place which may have an important bearing on the cause of Christianity in Ashanti. John Ansah, a nephew of the present King, has been placed at Kumasi, the capital, in the character of a Christian Teacher.

This young man and his cousin were educated in England, and were sent back to Africa with the Niger Expedition. After spending some time at Kumasi, he went down again to Cape-Coast, where he became a regular attendant at our Mission-Chapel, and an earnest seeker of the salvation which the Gospel offers. Having at length experienced the saving power of Christianity, the public profession of which he had previously assumed, he became an Agent of this Society, and in the offices of Interpreter, Class-Leader, and Local-Preacher, has continued to give such proof of sincere piety and devotedness to the work of the Mission, that he has been sent, by the unanimous voice of the Missionaries in the District, as a Catechist to Kumasi. On his arrival there, in his new capacity as an Agent of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, "he was very kindly received by the King, his Uncle, and is now enjoying his confidence and esteem." An Extract of a Letter addressed by him to the Rev. Mr. Freeman, the General Superintendent, affectinglly indicates the spirit in which he has entered upon his new and important sphere of labour. "I feel my helplessness, and unworthiness of the present

position I am placed in respecting my connexion with the Mission. I look for help from Him whose promise is, 'According to thy day, so shall thy strength be.' I assure you, my dear Father in Christ, all my mind is, that my life may be spent in the service of Christ. The general aspect of the work here is encouraging. The people attentively hear the word of God. I preach in the public street every Sabbath-day, and they crowd to hear of the way of salvation, and I am encouraged to preach to them earnestly. The chiefs too, with whom I have had conversation, seem to be seriously impressed.

AMERICA.

The Society's Missions in the BRITISH WEST-INDIES continue to present an unfavourable aspect. The deteriorating influences which have been at work in these Colonies, since the alteration in the duties on sugar, still prove a serious counteraction to Missionary operations. Increasing poverty is injurious to the spiritual interests of the people, by absorbing many of them to such an extent in cares and anxieties respecting outward things, that they become negligent of the public ordinances of Religion; and, from the same cause, the pecuniary receipts of the Missions are so considerably diminished as to render it necessary to contract the sphere of Missionary effort just at the juncture when the peculiar circumstances of the people require for them increased, instead of diminished pastoral attention and care. The Committee have made as liberal grants towards supplying the deficiency in the Local Receipts as the state of the Society's Funds would allow, but they are not able wholly to meet the emergency of the case. In the Local Reports from the several Districts, there is much that is encouraging. In many places there is a gracious work in progress, and the efficacy of the Gospel Ministry in the conversion of Sinners from the error of their ways is delightfully apparent; but the good which has been effected has been so overbalanced by the oppressive evils which prevail, that a very considerable diminution in the aggregate number of Church-members in the British West-Indies is the painful result.

In British North America, the Missions are gradually, but steadily advancing in influence and importance, and bid fair,

in the order of the Divine Providence, to be largely identified with the spread of Evangelical Religion through these Great Provinces. The accounts from our Missionaries in the Hudson Bay Territory are of a highly encouraging character, and announce that the Gospel preached by them, has been rendered the power of God unto the salvation and civilization of many of the natives, and that it has not only guided them in life, but sustained them in death with a triumphant hope of eternal life.

CONCLUSION.

We would earnestly invite the prayerful attention of our friends to the following remarks which close the Report of the Parent Society:

"The position now occupied by the Wesleyan Missionary Society, it is evident from the preceding survey, is a subject which demands the most thoughtful and prayerful consideration of all its Friends and Supporters. The Society does not appear employed in extensive preparation for some novel and arduous enterprise. It is beheld as actually engaged in the execution of "a great work" of Christian philanthropy. The Committees have not the task of presenting a Report which might startle and captivate, by its announcement of arrangements in progress for commencing upon a large scale other Missions altogether new. It is theirs rather to point to an already-occupied sphere of effort, which not merely brightens with the promise of hope, but stimulates to persevering effort by the encouragement of a large amount of realized success. The examination of the actual position of the Society is important in a practical point of view, as it cannot fail to suggest what is its primary duty. The first point is to maintain the ground already won, and effectually secure the results of past years of labor and annual expenditure of funds. It would be desirable to enter other openings for usefulness among heathen people which the Society's Agents have not yet approached, but such a step could not be consistently taken without a due regard to existing claims and obligations. The Society has had its attention providentially directed in past years to an extensive portion of the moral wil-

derness of the world and its persevering endeavours to cultivate it, and turn it into "a fruitful field," have been marked with the Divine sanction and blessing, and most hopeful progress has been made; but the application of a certain amount of means is still necessary for the full attainment of the desired object; and were this withheld not only would the full attainment of that object be frustrated, but the half-cultivated region might fall back into its desert-state, and the whole amount of expense and labor which has been incurred would thus be thrown away. The task devolving upon this and other Missionary Societies, in the heathen countries which are the scenes of their operations is, to employ the instrumentality at their command in the planting of Christian Churches, which shall ultimately become the means of extending Christianity in the regions around, and of perpetuating it to generations yet unborn. But those Churches are not prepared at once to answer their providential designation. They require to be nurtured and sustained until the Scriptures shall be translated, the art of reading communicated, and a competent Native Ministry raised; and were the Missionary Societies to throw the Churches they have instrumentally formed too early upon their own resources, the danger would be that, unless Almighty God interposed as by a miracle, the light of Christianity might be again extinguished, or its truths become so debased by intermixture with heathen superstitions, as to lose their saving and elevating power.

"To support prosperous existing Missions, until they may be able to sustain themselves and extend and perpetuate Christianity in the countries where they have been respectively founded, is thus obviously the first care of a Missionary Society; and any plans which it may contemplate for the enlargement of its sphere of operations should be considered with due regard to the obligations which it has already incurred. Recognising this principle the Committee do not venture to recommend any new and extensive undertaking, until the present urgent claims of some of the Society's principal Missions be somewhat more adequately met. Opportunity ought to be taken of the present favourable crisis in the affairs of our South-African Missions to strengthen those Missions, and thus enable the Society to secure the van-

tage ground which it has won. The glorious openings in Western Africa, and in countries leading into the Central regions of that vast Continent, cannot be neglected without incurring criminality—especially when it is considered that the elevation of the Tribes and Natives of Africa to the condition of Christian and civilized people, would practically set at rest the momentous question, “How shall the slave-trade—that curse of Africa, and disgrace of civilized Europe—be suppressed?” The extraordinary work of Christianity and civilization in the country which, a few years ago, was only spoken of as savage and cannibal New Zealand, must not at this interesting juncture be left without adequate support. The importunate cry from dark and sanguinary Feejee, where a noble band of selfdenying Missionaries are sinking beneath the burden and heat of the day, and dropping one by one, worn down by excessive labour, into a premature grave,—that thrilling cry for help cannot be disregarded. The peculiar and touching appeal of the West-Indian Missions, in this the season of their deep suffering—a suffering which, beyond all doubt, has been greatly aggravated, for the present, by the fiscal regulations this country has been led to adopt,—surely will not be made in vain, and what can the Society advance as its justification, if it do not greatly strengthen its Missions in Ceylon and India, and take its proportionate share of the work of imparting Christianity to the Two Hundred Millions of Idolators in that still-extending portion of the British Empire, all accessible to Missionary effort and all possessed of the additional claim upon our liberality, arising out of the consideration that they are our fellow subjects? The Society’s path of duty, for the present, appears too obvious to admit of mistake. Strenuous and persevering exertions to augment the Annual Income are required; and when that noble spirit of liberality which the last year’s Income has exhibited shall have provided for the liquidation of the remaining debt, and afforded the necessary means for strengthening the existing Missions of the Society, then will the way be clear to enter upon some new and inviting field of Missionary effort; and the Society, in such circumstances, will advance with a firm and unflinching step, sustained by the conviction that it is not seduced by the

attractions of novelty into practical forgetfulness of existing engagements, but that it is following the guidance of that same gracious Providence which has hitherto safely directed its onward course, and honoured its practical responses to the calls of duty, with the encouraging sanction ever indicated by ultimate success.

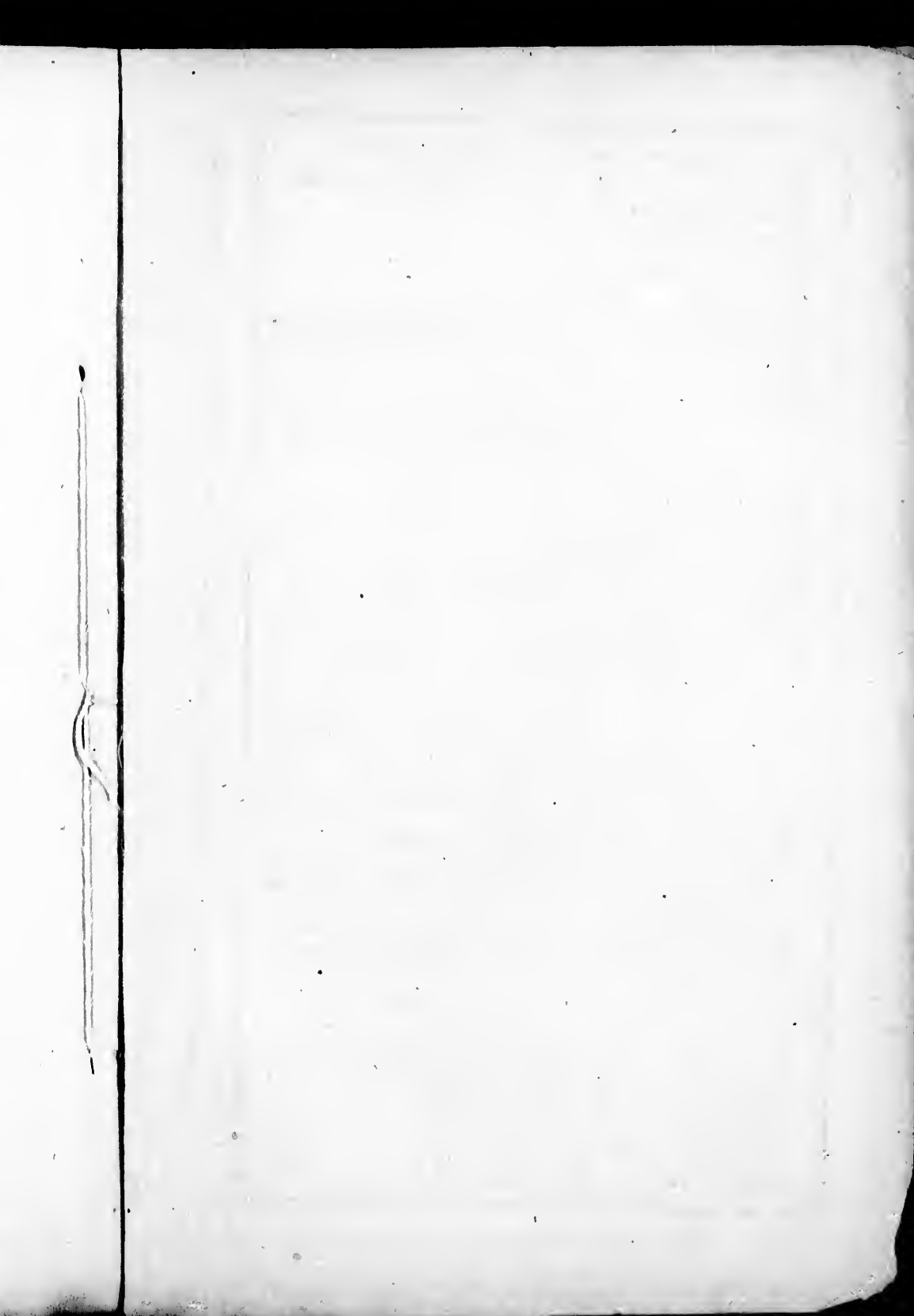
