Bless the ministry of Thy servants the Clergy; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign, and the labors of those Missionaries who are proclaiming the same in this Province. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

O MERCIFUL GOD, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made, nor wouldest the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live: have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. CONSTITUTION.

I.

The Society to be called the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said meeting.

III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

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V.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same a Member of the Society. Provided, that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such meeting.

VI.

OFFICERS.

1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, if any, shall be the Senior Vice-Presidents; and any Life Member, may, at any meeting of the General Committee, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of death, resignation or removal from the Province of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled by the Executive Committee at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he sees fit, call a special meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following members, viz:

The officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee,

provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in January; on the day next following the Annual Meeting; on the first Wednesday in March; on the first Wednesday in June; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following, the aforementioned days, as may be approved by the President, or, in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but, so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate and property whatsoever, which now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, *ex officio*.

2. Five Clerical and Seven Lay members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee, together with one Clerical or Lay representative chosen by each Deanery, and resident within the same, whose name shall be certified to the Committee by the Secretary of such Deanery, as having been duly elected at a regular meeting.

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3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation and disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-law or Regulation of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

OBJECTS.

The Society shall embrace the following objects and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships, and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such books and tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or securities as special Trusts.

11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of Clergy.

12. The establishment of Missions to seamen, and other Missionary work.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary service without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

LOCAL COMMITTEES.

1. The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Parish, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to elect two Lay Delegates and two Substitutes at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have

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the right to elect two Lay Delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the said Delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said Delegates, upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as, members of the General Committee.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and St. John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year, unless the place of such Anniversary Meeting shall, by resolution of the General Committee or Society, be otherwise arranged.

2. A Special Meeting of the General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or, in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks' notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and St. John respectively.

XIV.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors; the Rector and Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees, as before provided; all such persons being subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the Funds of the Society, and a report of

the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The order of business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's Report, to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or dispositions of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held; provided that in every such case a report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

XV.

1. The Clergy are requested to preach annually two sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

2. The Clergy are further requested to take up annually, in their respective Churches, a collection for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided for, be equally divided between—(1). The Widows and Orphans Fund. (2). The Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund. (3). The Children of the Clergy Education Fund. (4). The Divinity Scholarship Fund. Provided that any such special collection may, at the option of the congregation from which the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the Special Funds or Purposes of the Society, in such proportions as they may direct; and provided also that the yearly collection required by the rules of the Widows and Orphans Fund, in the case of Clergymen joining such Fund, shall, in such cases, be considered as the special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries: therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured in any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the General Purposes of the Society.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on first October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the

Missionary's salary through the Society shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof. Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion: but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e) The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter. If paid in money the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer; and if paid in produce, such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt, in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

(f) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g) Should neither the money nor receipts for produce to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice (C), and should neither such money or receipts have been so received by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice (D). If, however, the arrears be subsequently paid the grant shall be thereupon *ipso facto* renewed, unless the Board order to the contrary, in which case the Board shall notify the Mission and state the reason for such order.

(h) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(i) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply generally to any such Mission.

(k) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules and regulations as in their opinion may be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That every clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return on the first day of May in each year, showing—

1. The estimated number of the members of the Church of England.
2. The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease and Missionary Stations respectively.
3. Whether or not there is a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
4. The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.
5. The average congregation in each place of worship at Sunday services.
6. The number of baptisms.
 - (a) Infants.
 - (b) Adults.
 - (c) Total.
7. The number of communicants last year.
 - (a) Added.
 - (b) Removed.
 - (c) Deceased.
 - (d) Present number, (counting all those who, having had opportunity, have communicated within the year).
8. The number confirmed.
9. Marriages.
10. Burials.
11. The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday-school.
12. The amount contributed towards the support of the incumbent from sources other than the grant through this Society.
13. The income from Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 30th April last.
14. Names of Church Wardens.
15. Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions forthwith and before the General Committee on the first day of their meeting, and no grant shall be payable to any Missionary, in default of rendering any such statement or return, so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the clergy who do not receive stipends through the Society be requested to forward the same return, as far as possible, to the Secretary on the first day of May in each year, in order that a complete statement of the Diocese in these particulars may be published in the Annual Report of the Society.

7. That all the clergy of the Diocese be requested to forward to the Board of Home Missions on the 1st January in each year a statement for the year ending 31st December, showing—

1. Communicants (counting all those who, having had opportunity, have communicated within the year).
2. Income from Local Endowment for the support of the clergy.
3. Income from Offertory Collections.
4. Income from Pew Rents.
5. Income from other donations for Church purposes—including the assessment and all other sums given for the maintenance of the Church in the Parish or Mission (exclusive of the offertory collections or pew rents), and also all sums given for the support of the Church in the Diocese.
6. Income for Church purposes from other sources—including income from Church Lands (not Glebe), and income on any moneys invested for the use of the Church.

(The above statement is required by the S. P. G., and their grant to the Diocese depends upon its being satisfactory).

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat, not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society; and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission; and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow, in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first day of July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no

part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant, not exceeding \$100.00, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the second object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the directions of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200. nor shall the grant or grants thereafter be made to exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of Clergymen who are incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000; being the amount heretofore specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to the Society for this special object, and the interest only of this Fund shall be applied to the relief of disabled Clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest any surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in a Committee to consist of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor (if any) of the Diocese, and of three Clergymen and three Laymen, to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, at the July meeting thereof.

4. Any Clergyman duly appointed as Rector, Missionary or Assistant Curate in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application, in writing, to the Committee appointed under Rule 3, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The application shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension, or income of which applicant may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit. In all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of an application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure with all its emoluments.

7. The Committee may, at their discretion, alter or withdraw any of the pensions, subject to an appeal to the General Committee.

8. If any pensioner shall be able to undertake any clerical duty for which he shall receive any stipend, the pension shall be reduced, or shall cease, at the discretion of the Committee, as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his continued disability shall accompany his draft for the pension.

11. Pensions shall be payable quarterly, and proportionately for any part of a quarter, on the first day of January, April, July and October, in each year.

12. No alteration or amendment to the above rules may be made except by the General Committee, and upon notice of the proposed change given in writing, at the next previous annual meeting.

THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY SPECIAL FUND.

(Rule adopted by General Committee, July 1886.)

That the Special Fund be kept separate and untouched, and that all interest derived from it be allowed to accumulate, until it shall have reached the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, and that then the whole amount be transferred to the ordinary Incapacitated Clergy Fund of the Society, when the income may be applied to the purposes for which the Fund is being raised.

THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1 The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund to be called "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities), of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund shall, within six months, from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman being a member of this Fund shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments and all congregational collections shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days. If this rule is not complied with the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee; and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrears.

5. Upon compliance with the above rules the Diocesan Church Society undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension of Two Hundred Dollars to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during her widowhood. Provided that in case the income should at any time be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions for which it may be liable, such pensions shall be reduced by the Executive Committee *pro rata*; provided, nevertheless, that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

6. If the widow die or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the will of the Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act; or if Trustees should not have been named,

then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes with the Bishop's consent from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the sum of \$6 in lieu of the collections from his Parish or Mission.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half yearly, on January 1st and July 1st, in each year, the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener if required by him.

16. None of the above rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS SPECIAL FUND.

1. The Fund to be kept on deposit at interest in some chartered bank, or otherwise invested in securities which may easily be realized, and the interest received to be added to it from time to time.

2. Applications for grants from the Fund to be made to the Lord Bishop and the Board of Home Missions, and to be determined upon by them; any grants made to be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting.

3. The application of the Fund not to be limited to the cases of widows or relatives of clergymen serving in the aided Missions, but to extend to all cases throughout the Diocese, occurring after its formation and requiring help.

4. Each such grant to be made from the capital of the Fund, until the same shall be exhausted, and not to exceed one hundred dollars in the case of any one clergyman's decease.

5. The application of the Fund to be limited to the two cases following:

(a) Where the clergyman deceased shall not have been connected with the Widows and Orphans Fund, and satisfactory evidence shall be submitted to the Board that the widow, or the orphan children or other relatives of such clergyman, under the age of eighteen years, dependent upon him at the time of his decease, are not in receipt of an income from all sources exceeding \$300 per annum.

(b) Where, though the clergyman deceased has been connected with the Widows and Orphan's Fund, satisfactory evidence shall be submitted to the Board that such widow, or orphan children or dependent relatives under the age of eighteen years, are not in receipt of an income from all sources [except such Fund] exceeding \$200 per annum.

6. That it is to be understood in all cases that such grant is not intended for the payment of any debts or liabilities incurred by such clergyman before his decease, but to be available to an extent not exceeding \$100 in any one case to meet the inevitable expenses falling immediately upon the widow or helpless relatives of the deceased when they are not provided with private means of their own to defray them.

THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto (being \$1,425.79), of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to, or applied by, the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of Clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died, or retired with the Bishop's approval on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who if they shall think fit, may vest such management in a sub-committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant, to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension or income, of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, may, in any case, require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, shall determine, in each case, the amount of the grant, which shall be made in a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee, be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Executive Committee or its sub-committee may direct.

9. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

ABSENCE OF MISSIONARY.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion to pay him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee, for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made and shall expire with it.

VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money, whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

CONDITIONS OF GRANTS.

That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergymen, the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

REQUESTS TO BE FUNDED.

That all requests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

RETURNS FROM PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes, and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized.

Therefore Resolved,—1. That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, Church lands, and other investments yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may lawfully increase the amount required in proportion thereto, in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to pay the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission, until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

CONTRIBUTIONS.—HOW CHARGEABLE.

That the Secretary of the Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds, that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter at the October meeting, and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrears.

SECRETARIES OF LOCAL COMMITTEES.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually, to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society, the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

That the certificate of the Lay Delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

MISSIONS BECOMING VACANT.

That when any Mission now receiving aid from the Society shall become vacant, the grant from the Society shall therefrom cease, and shall only be renewed upon application to the General Committee, or to the Board of Home Missions, and upon such terms as to assessment and grant as they, or either of them, shall consider equitable.

PRINTING STATEMENT TO S. P. G.

That the statement made by the Board of Home Missions to the S. P. G. be printed in the Annual Report of the Society.

TRAVELLING OUTFITS.

Passed July, 1884.

Whereas, It is very desirable that some provision should be made whereby men commencing work in this Diocese may be enabled to purchase the requisite travelling outfit without becoming involved in debt for the same; therefore

Resolved, That when a man commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Diocesan Church Society, a sum not exceeding \$250 may be advanced to him for the purchase of the necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to serve at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be paid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

INSURANCE ON PARSONAGES.

Passed July, 1887.

That all the grants made to Missions by the Diocesan Church Society be upon the condition that insurance on Parsonages be maintained as heretofore required.

CONTRIBUTORS' NAMES.

Passed July, 1889.

That the Clergy be requested to report the names of all contributors to the funds of the Society for publication in the Annual Report.

FREE GRANTS OF BOOKS.

Passed July, 1889.

That the Book Depository Committee be authorized to make, at their discretion, free grants of books to Parishes or Sunday Schools, out of any surplus funds which may be on hand, applications for the same to be made to the Secretary of the Committee.

RENEWAL OF GRANTS.

Passed July, 1890.

That upon a Mission becoming vacant, the grant from the Society may be renewed upon such terms that the stipend shall not exceed \$700, with a parsonage, or \$780 without a parsonage.

MEETINGS OF COMMITTEES OF D. C. S. AND SYNOD.

Passed July 1891.

1. That meetings of all Committees having business to be transacted be held quarterly, in the first week in March, June, September and December, respectively.

2. That the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society appoint one member of a committee of two (the Synod to appoint the other member) who shall arrange the time and place for meetings of the different Committees, on application of the Chairman of such Committees respectively.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A committee shall be appointed to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, by public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purpose to advertise in any manner the said lands, or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the seal of the Society to be affixed to the same; also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made; all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisions, and stipulations of 48th Victoria, Chapter 36, ss. 50, 51, 52, 53, 54; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of lands leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

Resolution passed July 2, 1886.

That the Glebe Land Committee be instructed and authorized to take such steps and bring such suits as they may think necessary to retain possession of, and recover all lands and property connected therewith, vested in the Society under the Act 34 Vic. Chap. 76, subject always to the consent and approval of the Lord Bishop.

REPORT.

1892.

The statement has been made, that the chief hindrances to the continued progress of the work of the Church in this Diocese are to be found in the alternate scarcity of men and of money. Last year it was men that were more especially wanted; this year it is money.

A year ago the Board of Home Missions was obliged to announce the sad fact that not less than twelve or thirteen Missions in this Diocese were vacant; a state of affairs that was indeed to be deplored.

Thirteen *vacant* missions! This meant that the doors of thirty-three churches were closed against those who were wont to assemble therein to worship Almighty God, and to receive spiritual blessings through the ordinances of His Church. It meant that more than five thousand members of the Church of England were, for the time being, forsaken by their spiritual mother. It meant that some fifty outlying stations, where the people were accustomed to have occasional services, were left unvisited, and the unfortunate members of our church in these places left to wander in the wilderness as sheep having no shepherd. It meant that seven hundred and fifty communicants were practically deprived of the comforts and blessings they were wont to receive in the Sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ.

That the doors of churches, built in many cases at the cost of much patient effort and self-denial, should be locked,

the windows boarded up and the buildings suffered to go to decay, was something not only to be deplored, but something calculated to awaken the blush of shame in the faces of the members of the Church of England in this Diocese.

To-day we are glad to know that the great majority of these vacant missions are filled. The doors of churches that were shut have been re-opened. The clergy and laity doubtless assemble at this Annual Meeting of the D. C. S. with mingled feelings of thankfulness and of anxiety—of thankfulness, in that the vacant mission fields are filled; of anxiety, in that the maintenance of the work undertaken is likely to tax our resources to the utmost, in view of the reduction of the sum of £250 *sterling* in the annual grant from the S. P. G. In an emergency such as the present, what the Church of England in this Province needs is the stirring up of the wills of her members. The laity of the Church of England in New Brunswick have the ability (of that there cannot be much doubt) to maintain the work that is now being undertaken. What we especially need to-day is an increase of the Christian graces—Faith, Hope, and Love: Love for the work that is to be done for Christ's glory and the good of our brother man; Faith in His promise who says, "Lo, I am with you always"; Hope, that despite every obstacle and every discouragement, looks onward and believes the apostle's words, "Your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

In the charge to his clergy, delivered at Fredericton, in August, 1830, the Right Rev. John Inglis—at whose instigation the Diocesan Church Society was founded—in referring to the zeal and self-devotion required on the part of the Missionaries in this Province, said:

"There may be other countries in which less devotion to the duties of his office may enable a clergyman to be the instrument of good; but he who here satisfies himself with that mere routine of official duty which barely saves him from the charge of absolute neglect, and has nothing of the missionary spirit, can effect but little. . . . Fear not, then, beloved Missionaries, to be worn out in the service of so

good and gracious a Master as we acknowledge. Go on rejoicing amid its severest labours. Offer up your strength, your health, your life itself, if death should be the will of God, and count the offering as your richest gain. Let every one of us, Bishop and Priest, be a missionary in the fullest meaning of the name, and humbly rejoicing in our office, let us thank God and take courage."

Doubtless many of those who in past days contributed to the support of the Diocesan Church Society caught something of the earnestness and enthusiasm of its founders. In days when the Province was much poorer than at present there were faithful sons of the church who sustained the work set on foot by our noble missionary society, by generous offerings during their lives, and who left it noble bequests when they died. Their good examples should find many imitators in an emergency such as this that stares us in the face through the withdrawal of a portion of the aid so long and so generously contributed by England's venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. Shall it be said of the church in this Diocese: "There is none to help her of all the sons which she has brought forth?"

The Missionary reports that follow will show what is being done, and they will also show that very much remains to be done, for still "the labourers are few."

ADDINGTON—REV. H. BEERS, B. A.

ANDOVER—REV. LEO. A. HOYT, B. A.

Little has occurred during the past year out of the ordinary course of events in this mission of Andover.

The division of the mission of "Grand Falls and Madawaska" into two, with Grand Falls, and Edmundston, respectively, as the centres of their fields, was one very much needed; and this division caused that part of the parish of Grand Falls known as "Four Falls," to be taken from the Andover work

and placed in its proper parish; so that now the mission of Andover is confined to the parishes of Andover and Perth, with the southern section of Drummond parish.

A very discouraging accident happened to the people of Glenbourne, when their little mission-room, in course of erection, was blown down in the gale of the 20th June; but the church people of the neighborhood met during the following week, and have with commendable energy laboured to restore their loss. They deserve the sympathy of all their fellow-churchmen.

I have again to express my thankfulness for the very efficient work performed during the past year by the Rev. H. B. Morris, who still is faithfully labouring in Bairdsville in this parish.

On Tuesday the 21st of June, the Right Rev. the Bishop Coadjutor visited the parish and administered the sacred rite of confirmation to a small class. The next day after the confirmation in this parish I accompanied the Bishop through the mission of Gordon and Lorne, where we were privileged to note the remarkably satisfactory evidence of church growth in that mission; an evidence well calculated to cause us to thank God and take courage.

BAY DU VIN—REV. W. J. WILKINSON, M. A.

There is nothing very special to report from this parish this year. Like all other parishes it has its encouragements and discouragements. The services held during the year, as hitherto, have been daily, and the celebrations of the Holy Communion weekly. A Bible-class has also been held every week at the parish church, and we have gone carefully through the two Epistles to the Corinthians and the Epistle to the Galatians. I hope to keep this up, and also to form confirmation classes immediately, as we expect a visit from the Bishop Coadjutor in October next.

We are going to try and complete the repairs on the outside of the parish church this autumn; and after that we will turn our attention towards the interior.

We are very much indebted to the Women's Aid Association, Fredericton, for a liberal grant of \$25 towards our many expenses in the parish.

The smelt fishing last winter, and the salmon fishing this summer, have been worse than they have been for several years. There are many, however, who, notwithstanding the hard times, pay their subscriptions as cheerfully and promptly as ever.

Stirring addresses were delivered in this parish this spring by Rev. Canon Forsyth, C. O'D. Baylee and Hon. Judge Wilkinson, on behalf of this Society, which induced several, I think, to increase their subscriptions.

The parishioners very generously and thoughtfully presented my wife last Christmas with a tea-set, which we prize, not merely on account of its value, but on account of the kindness and good will which prompted the action, and for which, as also for many other acts of kindness, we are exceedingly grateful.

May God continue to bless my unworthy efforts to His glory and to the good of His Church.

CAMBRIDGE—REV. E. P. HURLEY.

I have only little to write of the condition of this parish that will be beyond expectation.

During the year the usual number of services have been held, notwithstanding many obstacles of a discouraging nature, and those held in Lent were much better attended than my most sanguine expectations had led me to believe. Generally speaking, I am honestly persuaded that the spiritual life of the parish has been steadily, though, it may be, slowly, on the increase; and if our numbers have been lessened by death and departure to other spheres of labour, those that remain behind are being strengthened and encouraged by increased zeal and firmer hopes.

Since I had last the pleasure of reporting to your Society, we have added seven new members to the church by the rite of "laying on of hands," which His Lordship Bishop Kingdon performed, and which was attended by a large and reverent

congregation, who much enjoyed the presence of His Lordship and the admirable discourse delivered to them on that occasion.

A new and much needed fence has also been erected round the cemetery and grounds of the church at Jemseg, part of the material of which cost the sum of \$28, most of which amount came from Miss Scovil, sister of our church warden, whose services and zeal for the interests of this mission cannot be too highly appreciated. The people did the work of erecting the fence, and Mr. Scovil contributed much of the material. A great want, that in my judgment has been for years instrumental in retarding the progressive work of the parish, has at length been supplied, in the purchase of a rectory, for which both the Rector and people have to record their gratitude to many donors, especially to the Board of Home Missions for a grant of \$100, and to James Holland Knight, of Denver, Colorado, for his generous donation of \$100, also for that end; to the Rector and people of the parish of Rothesay for the sum of \$5; to George E. Fairweather for his many gratuitous services in connection with the same work, and to many others too numerous to mention in a brief report. The whole premises have been completely renovated since purchased, at an expense of \$200, and the improvements still go on until we hope to have what will be considered a very pretty country rectory.

I had also charge of the mission of Canning from 1st of October last to 1st of July, and though it entailed enormous labour and great expense of time, I do not regret it, for I believe my services were much appreciated by the people, and, under God's grace, that much good was done. During that time I held fourteen services in different parts of the mission, and administered the Holy Communion once, when eleven persons partook of the Lord's Supper. With the permission of His Lordship the Bishop, and the encouragement of the Board of Home Missions, I shall continue to do all I can for this mission until such time as it may be served by a Student or Missionary.

The work of the Sunday-schools has also been kept going so far as it is in my power to do it, and though I am persuaded that much more might be accomplished if only fitting and qualified teachers could be found, still, there is much satisfaction in knowing that the children are being trained in church doctrine and practice as far as my opportunities permit.

During the year we have lost five good contributors to the support of the mission, by death and departure to other lands, and we are now on utmost strain to raise our assessment for the D. C. S., and I may here candidly say that I do not hope to be able to receive the sum of \$700, annual stipend from the mission, until such time as the Scovil Trust Fund shall be again able to supply the Missionary the allotted sum of \$400 annually.

CAMPOBELLO—REV. W. H. STREET, B. A.

The general work of the church in this parish during the year past has been uninterrupted and satisfactory, and the services well attended. During Lent a course of instruction on the prayer-book was followed out—such teaching is always needed, and might be repeated with profit oftener than it is.

The Sunday-school is a bright feature of church work on the Island. Many of the children come great distances through all kinds of weather. They are very bright and intelligent, promising well for the future work of the Church in whatever portion of the vineyard they may be called to labour, for, as they advance in years, it is not unlikely that the majority may emigrate to other shores.

The fisheries, formerly a source of wealth, have ceased to be so now, owing in a measure to the restriction on international trade, leaving the profit to our fishermen almost *nil*. Indeed, were it not for the employment given by the American Co. and visitors, and a short while in the factory during the summer months, it would be difficult to conceive what many would do. While referring to the American Co. and visitors, I may be allowed to speak with the warmest gratitude of their generous assistance to church work on the Island. When I came here the rectory was much out of repair. It only needed the kind thought of several ladies from Philadelphia, Boston and other parts of the States, to suggest the call, which received a most handsome response. At the expenditure of upwards of \$300 they made the rectory comfortable for the winter, putting in a handsome new furnace, double windows, and adding other needed repairs and comforts. The care of the work they took entirely upon themselves, and did everything with the kindest thought and in a way that proved they deemed it a privilege to give of their

best to God. I would like, also, to refer to other special donations which came from warm hearts: A supply of prayer and hymn books, with a handsome gift of books for the Sunday-school library, from the Metropolitan and Mrs. Medley; from Mrs. Robinson Owen, a former resident of the Island, ever holding in loving remembrance her earlier home, a contribution of more than \$20, which was supplemented by a grant of books from the S. P. C. K. I need scarcely add that Mrs. Robinson Owen has for many years continued to send regularly from England the following contributions, viz.: \$25 to the D. C. S., and \$25 towards the assessment for the clergyman's stipend; that is, she now contributes, yearly, \$50 to the funds of the D. C. S. according to the present scheme. There are other contributions which I must not forget: W. H. Thorne, Esq., of St. John, towards the painting of the church, and the Hon. James I. Fellows, of London, through whose liberality we were enabled to furnish the whole Sunday-school with that admirable scheme of instruction, "St. Paul's Series," by Rev. Walter Gwynne. I must not omit to mention that Mrs. Cochran, from Philadelphia, besides other gifts to the church and parsonage, has also enriched the Sunday-school library by a donation of valuable volumes, and supplied the school with hymnals.

The Metropolitan very kindly visited the Island during the month of August last and spent a Sunday with us, preaching at the morning service. On the Monday following, His Lordship visited many of the older residents, residing some distance from Welchpool, who love him so dearly, and were so rejoiced to have his blessing again.

I trust His Lordship Bishop Kingdon will be enabled, this fall, to visit us and administer the holy rite of confirmation.

Offerings have been given in answer to appeals—from the Jewish Parochial Mission, the S. P. G., and Domestic and Home Missions, and contributions sent to Church Extension Society, Kilburn, England.

CANTERBURY—REV. C. A. S. WARNEFORD

CARLETON—REV. W. H. SAMPSON.

CHATHAM—REV. CANON FORSYTH, B. A.

The usual round of parish work has been pursued without interruption during the past year, and has, I trust, been attended with Divine blessings. 182 Sunday, and 642 Week-day services have been held, with the usual average attendance. On the 8th day of July last the sacred rite of confirmation was administered to 32 candidates by the Lord Bishop Coadjutor, and nearly all have since become communicants.

The Sunday-school at St. Mary's Chapel goes on as usual, and I am thankful for the valued, efficient and cheerfully given help of Mr. F. E. Neale, who has come to the rescue in a needful time, and now supplies the lack of a *man* to aid me in this important branch of our parish work. The school at St. Paul's Church has lately been resumed after being closed during the winter months. J. P. Burchill, Esq., M.P.P., is again at his post in superintending and teaching in this school, from which I am compelled by other duties to be absent. Occasional addresses or instructions are given to the children at the afternoon services at St. Paul's, but the number of children now in the *immediate* vicinity of the church is very small. On Saturday afternoons in each week, when possible, I assemble the children in Douglasfield, about three miles from the parish church, and instruct them in the elements of Christian doctrine. 48 Children's Missionary Boxes were distributed in Lent last, and the result has been that \$20 have been collected, or about double the amount of last year. The proposed restoration of St. Mary's Chapel has been further considered, and a committee has been appointed to collect contributions towards this object. I hope that during the present year this work may be wholly or in part accomplished.

The usual contributions have been made to Domestic and Foreign Missions in response to the appeals of the D. and F. M. Society of the Church of England in Canada.

The annual collections for the General Purposes Fund of the Diocesan Church Society are not yet completed, but I hope the amount will not be less than that of last year, although there seems to exist an unusual depression in business, and our

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local needs are pressing themselves upon our attention. I may say that our parish will endeavor to aid in making up the present deficiency in the General Purposes Fund.

On May 16th, last, one of a series of Missionary Deputation meetings, held throughout the Rural Deanery of Chatham, was held in this parish, and by this means and otherwise full information as to the needs of the Diocese was set before the people. Whether the result will be an increase of contributions, or not, I cannot say until the collections are completed. The meeting in Chatham was addressed by the Rev. Canon Brigstocke and the Rev. C. O'Dell Baylee, and J. P. Burchill, Esq., M. P. P., and the audience was very much interested. Hoping that such endeavors in the interest of the Society's noble work may not be in vain, and that the Church in Chatham may not be wanting in the evidences of zeal and liberality, I beg to respectfully submit the foregoing report of another year's work on behalf of God's Kingdom and for the setting forth of His glory.

DALHOUSIE—REV. JAMES SIMONDS, M. A.

When I was appointed to this parish in August last I found it encumbered with a debt of \$60—the balance of the cost of repairs on the church, made some three years ago. Early in November the ladies got up an entertainment which produced sufficient funds to enable the treasurer to pay off the debt. The church I found in a good state of repair, and well furnished—with the exception of the chancel carpet, of which no more need be said than that it had done duty for at least 20 years. During Lent one of the Daughters of the King collected sufficient funds (over \$30) to provide a new carpet. A dossal has also been provided, which is a great improvement to the sanctuary. Financially the parish makes a fairly good showing. In addition to the above, two offerings have been taken for the D. C. S., amounting to over \$6; over \$8 was given as our Epiphany offering for Foreign Missions; \$5 was contributed on Good Friday for the Jews' Parochial Mission Fund; the children's offerings during Lent, in response to the appeal on behalf of the mission of Albert, amounted to nearly \$5; a like sum was given for the W. and O. Fund; and at the deputation meeting the collection amounted to \$4.25. The list of contributors to the General Purposes Fund of the

Society will represent a larger sum than was given last year—between \$60 and \$70. The assessment on the parish, \$350, (which is more than my predecessor thought could be raised) has been forthcoming, and my stipend has been paid very promptly. But it has not been an easy matter by any means. The parishioners have not all paid promptly, but the admirable method of the treasurer has enabled him to remit always without delay. He makes a point of keeping in hand to the credit of the parish a balance of not less than \$50, from which he draws what is necessary for the quarterly remittances as soon as they are due. The ordinary offertories, up to July 1st, make a total of over \$100. Thus, in various ways, and for different purposes, nearly \$600 has been raised during the past year. Though the parish numbers nearly forty families, by far the larger part of what is contributed is given by less than half of these. The rest, of whom some are quite poor, give little or nothing. I regret to say that some well-to-do people never give anything.

The services have been carried on regularly. There has been a celebration of the Holy Communion every Sunday, and since Ash Wednesday, on all other holy-days. Besides the other Sunday services, evensong is said every Wednesday and Saints Day, and the litany every Friday. During the summer months there is a daily service.

In November last a chapter of the Daughters of the King was, with the Bishop's approval, formed in the parish. It has met regularly and is now preparing for a sale to raise funds to render the rectory cellar frost-proof. Recently a parochial chapter of the Ministering Children's League has been organized, whose motto is, "No day without a deed to crown it." *The Church Monthly* has been localized as our parish magazine. I have been much assisted for several months past by my father, Rev. Richard Simonds.

What has been said of the doings in my little parish has been in no boastful strain. It is very difficult to raise money, and our resources are now taxed to the uttermost.

Spiritually, the parish is in a very unsatisfactory state. I can only express the wish and hope that, by the blessing of God, I may be able to report an improvement at the next meeting of the Society.

DERBY & BLACKVILLE — REV. C. O'DELL BAYLEE.

On the 13th day of last January I arrived in this parish with my family, and was most cordially and heartily welcomed by the congregations, who on the 4th day of February gave us a public reception at the rectory. As my predecessor, the Rev. R. W. Hudgell, in his report last year has given such a full account of the parish of Derby and Blackville I have very little to say but refer this venerable Society to the report of 1891. Allow me to say that the work in this parish since my appointment has continued without any interruptions. The services of the Church have been regularly kept up, and I trust will continue to be so during the year 92-93. During six months of the year, with the assistance of my Lay-reader, I intend (D. V.) holding six services every Sunday. Commending this parish to the loving care and protection of Almighty God, I humbly pray that He will continue to extend to us in the future, and according to our needs, the mercies of past years.

DORCHESTER—REV. J. ROY CAMPBELL.

In direct contradistinction from last year's report, which was full of history, that for this year enjoys the happiness of being without history, but it is not, therefore, any the less important.

On Tuesday, March the 15th, His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor held a special confirmation, on which occasion he administered that rite to five prominent adult parishioners, all of them being church members of much promise.

Trinity Church Guild continues, through its various Wards, to do a work of increasing usefulness; and it is very well that it is so, for it is by no means easy, in the country, to find a good and efficient sexton growing on *every* bush.

The behests of the committee on the needs of the Diocese have been sedulously cared for, not only in *this* parish, but also in every parish in the deanery; so that we can say in *every* case, that we are doing what we can.

Services and meetings have been held in the several parishes, which were none the less interesting or useful to the Society because the speakers were homespun.

In addition to our sundry offerings to *extra parochial objects*—for we have spent nothing on ourselves this last year

as a parish—we have the very great pleasure of reporting for 1892-3 the sum of \$220 towards the general purposes of the Society; which shows the 10 per cent. increase that is asked for by the B. H. M. to meet the current deficiency.

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT—REV. J. W. HICKSON, M. A.

After an interregnum of thirteen months I was appointed to take charge of this mission. I found that it was not a very easy one, owing to its vast area. I began with three services on Sunday, but as the Stone Church is about twenty-five miles distant from St. Paul's by way of Cross-roads, I find that a change is necessary, and in future each of the churches will be closed on one Sunday in four.

I regret that the churches are all out of repair, which makes it somewhat difficult for the Church people to do as much as they might for the D. C. S. In future I hope that we will be able to lay by a little yearly, so that when repairs are again needed we will have money to do the work.

St. Paul's church, the best attended in the mission, considering the number of communicants, shows a lack of zeal in spiritual matters. Although the congregations are large, still we have only about ten communicants. I hope and trust that ere another year passes we will have something better to say on this point. A Women's Guild has been organized in connection with this church and is doing good work; the president is Mrs. Dr. Morehouse.

This spring the men have set out trees in the church lot. Generally they take a deep interest in church affairs.

A good Sunday-school is in operation, for which the Women's Guild have supplied a library.

All Saints Church has had fair congregations, and has a thriving Sunday-school. Miss Mary Sleat has kindly undertaken to collect money for repairs. Our thanks are also due to Miss Jacob, the deaconess of the diocese, and to the Women's Aid, of Fredericton, for help. Although we are not strong numerically, yet there is a greater number of communicants than at St. Paul's church.

St. John's church, which has been considered unsatisfactory, I am well satisfied with. We have had good congregations and hearty services, but only fortnightly. In future there will be three every four weeks. We have a good Sunday-

school, which is increasing in spite of strong opposition. There has been a branch of the Women's Aid organized, and also a girls' branch.

We have now a legal corporation for each parish, and not a so-called one for both.

During my diaconate there were three celebrations. The Rev. John Parkinson, of St. Mary's parish, very kindly came and gave two, while the third was given by Rev. H. E. Dibblee, of Maugerville. The Rev. Canon Roberts very kindly administered the Holy Communion to some of our sick. I feel especially indebted to Mr. W. N. H. Clements for his help. He drove the Revs. Parkinson and Dibblee on each occasion, and in bad roads, saving me a considerable amount of hard work.

In spite of the disadvantages that a Deacon labours under when in charge of a parish, I have many things to be thankful for, and hope and trust that God will prosper His work in our midst. Since coming here I have baptized sixteen, of whom four were adults.

In re the Tay, I think it unwise to join it to this mission. The last report says it can be reached from Upper Keswick in two hours. It is possible to do it in two hours, but 18 or 20 miles on a country road, with a good deal of hill, is more than any horse ought to do even on good roads. Then Stanley is only five miles from the Tay. If the Rector of Douglas has to attend the Tay, they could not expect more than a monthly service, and in winter scarcely that. Then the churches here would all be closed on that Sunday, and of course people will grow careless as the result. It is better to remain as it is, and the people of the Tay, by applying to the Lord Bishop, can be united with Stanley, and have a vote in church affairs.

The outlook is promising, and I believe, that after the interregnum, the people will value the services more, and will take a deeper interest in church work of all kinds.

I forgot to state that we have also a Sunday-school in Lower Hainesville, where I intend giving an occasional service; occasional, because it is not more than five miles from the church.

A missionary meeting was held in Stone Church on June 29th, on the needs of the diocese. The speakers were Revs. Canon Roberts, Rural Dean Montgomery, John Parkinson, and Sir John C. Allen. The collection, \$5.84, has already

been forwarded to the Society. The meeting was quite enthusiastic, and no doubt Douglas will do its share in helping the D. C. S. out of its difficulty.

I think I may say that in future the stipend will be paid by subscriptions, not by tea-meetings and such like.

DUMFRIES AND PRINCE WILLIAM — REV. C. T. EASTON, M. A.

I was licensed to the Mission of Dumfries and Prince William about the first of the new year, therefore I am unable to report anything very eventful during so short an incumbency. The churches which, with the exception of All Saints, Magaguadavic, were closed for the space of three years and a half, have been re-opened. St. Paul's, Parish Church of Dumfries, has been refitted with new and handsome seats. With some other improvements made, God's House of Prayer would be worthier of His honor and service. Of course we are few—a remnant only—and money is so surprisingly plentiful for everything except church purposes! However, the Church is dear to the hearts of a few. A new church edifice is sadly needed at Magundy. The old one is dilapidated. Thanks to the energy of Mrs. William Fraser and some others, a sewing circle—that useful adjunct to the working of a country parish—has been begun with a capital of \$31.00 or thereabouts. The new burying-ground at Magaguadavic has been fenced. Magaguadavic, a prosperous hamlet 17 miles from the river, is in point of numbers my most important station. My most serious drawback in this parish is the lack of music in the church services. In only one church, *viz.*, St. Clement's, have I singing, and that is confined to the hymns. Vocal music is not taught to any extent, if at all, in the common schools of New Brunswick. In our country parishes the singing master needs to be abroad.

The rectory was burned down some years past. Where to build the new one is the burning question. Of course it is competent for the rector alone to decide that question, suitable to his own personal convenience, and assuredly not for the petty jealousies and selfish interests of any particular locality.

FREDERICTON — REV. CANON ROBERTS, M. A.

My report to the D. C. S. is, briefly, as follows:

A meeting of the parishioners to consider the needs of the Diocese was held in March. As soon as I heard of the withdrawal of £250 by the S. P. G. I got as large a number of the leading layman of the parish together as I could, and set the matter plainly before them. The result is that they have set themselves to work with great earnestness to meet the difficulty, and I am thankful to be able to promise subscriptions and collections to the General Fund of *at least* \$1500.

GAGETOWN — REV. N. C. HANSEN, M. A.

The annual reports to the D. C. S. may not always bristle with new material, but they should lead the Society to infer that, although the parish may not have given extraordinary external proofs of an inward life, yet, that there has not been a sabbatical year. Such a report I confess is, at least to me, a matter of some concern; and judging from the number of parishes whose deeds, done or undone, the fertile imagination of this Society is left to fill out from the meagre skeleton "No Report," I fancy that I may conclude that I am not the only one who has felt the existence of such a difficulty. The day may come when these reports will be looked back upon by the clergy with something of the emotion that must have filled the Jews when they remembered the times in which they had to make bricks without straw. Possibly it may be said that the name of the parish, which heads the report, is the text, but this text is not every year a satisfactory one, and will not every year produce enough for a satisfactory report. A report to be especially interesting of necessity demands that something special shall be done every year, and yet we cannot always be building churches or Sunday-schools, etc. In fact, I hold strongly, that if a parish report for several years, were as barren of variety as Mark Twain's diary on his ocean journey to the Holy Land, and if the rector had nothing further to report than the triumphant fact that he had provided the prosaic cash required by an assessment which has been increasing in the same proportion as the decreasing of the population of the parish—if he should be so happy as to be able to report that he has succeeded in doing

this—I for one would say, this was a sufficient indication that there has been a remarkable increase of activity in the parish. While I happen this year to have a few special items to mention, I will freely admit here, at the end of my second year in this parish, that the dreams and visions which I had at the outset, of an extraordinary increase in church attendance and church activity which would be the immediate result of my advent, have proved like other dreams and visions—illusory. Two years experience has convinced me that I have no exceptional capacity to scale heights and win prizes which my predecessors left unscaled and unwon. We have, however, finished the fence around the church at a cost of nearly \$100. The interior of the church has also been painted, a light terra cotta in the nave and a dark green in the chancel. Nearly enough money is also on hand to paint the exterior, a work which will be proceeded with in the autumn. I must not fail to mention here, too, that the necessary enlargement of the burial ground has been made possible by the gift, from Sir Leonard Tilley, of a valuable adjoining piece of ground which we hope to have consecrated during the summer. Since my last report the church here has lost its very best friend and supporter by the death of Mrs. DeVeber. Before she became an invalid she was one of the most indefatigable workers in the church, and for many years an efficient organizer. As an invalid there could have been no better example of what a Christian and a Churchman might be and suffer. When her bodily presence was denied us her sympathy was always with us, and the means with which God had endowed her were freely used to assist works for God and His church.

GORDON AND LORNE—REV. J. R. HOPKINS.

No report.

GRAND FALLS—REV. J. J. PARRY.

Having been in charge of this parish but a short time, and that under disadvantageous circumstances, I have little or nothing to say that will be regarded as extraordinary or phenomenal in character.

Since the division of the mission from that of Madawaska, I am glad to say that the prospects are in some ways better.

Thanks to the kind assistance of friends, and seasonable advice of the indefatigable rector of Andover, the new parish has been placed in a settled position.

At Grand Falls the services are well attended, and there is among the attendants manifold signs of true reverence and piety. The church has also been beautified in many ways by the munificence of loyal churchmen. The Sunday-school has also been reorganized upon a new basis, and it is at present in a fair way of developing into a powerful aid to the Church and her work here.

With regard to the outlying stations: they are not yet in a very satisfactory condition, owing to the people being unacquainted with the church services. At Four Falls there is every prospect that the Church will gain a permanent footing. In course of time we hope to have a church built there.

Since I have been in charge there have been twenty-two baptisms, of whom fifteen were adults. There is a confirmation class of twenty-five, most of whom are now prepared and are awaiting the performance of that sacred rite.

There is much to be done, that perhaps never will be done, and what is being done is not being done as it should be, owing to the extent of the parish—the dividing, instead of the concentration of one's energies. One of the wants of the mission is the lack of teachers in the Sunday-schools.

GRAND MANAN—REV. W. S. COVERT, B. A.

No report.

GREENWICH—REV. D. W. PICKETT, M. A.

My register for the past year shows 7 baptisms, 4 marriages, and 14 burials. On 22nd of September his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor visited the parish for the purpose of administering the rite of confirmation. Thirteen candidates were presented, two of whom, a brother and sister, being too ill to be taken to the church, received the blessing at the hands of the Bishop in their own home. During his short stay with us his Lordship also took an opportunity to visit an aged widow, a faithful member of the church, who has long been debarred from attending her public ordinances, but to whom the Bishop's blessing will be a joy as long as life lasts. The

benefit of such personal visits, when time admits of them, reaches far beyond the family circle, and cannot be estimated.

Since the removal of the parsonage to Round Hill the use of a hall in that vicinity has been obtained, where Lenten and other week-day services have been held, from the continuance of which it is hoped much good may result. A Sunday-school has been organized in the same building, and under the superintendency of Mr. Sancton Belyea with four assistant teachers, has a large and growing attendance. We shall now be able, I hope, to have a Sunday-school open all the year round. Exchanges of books with other schools are desired, and donations of second-hand books will be thankfully received. In addition to collections for the D. C. S. contributions have been made through the year to the S. P. G., to Domestic and Foreign Missions, to Parochial Missions to the Jews, and to the Incapacitated Clergy Fund.

HAMPTON.

Vacant at July meeting of D. C. S.

JOHNSTON—REV. C. P. HANINGTON, B. A.

Church matters are moving here about as usual. His Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor visited the parish last September and consecrated our new church of St. Barnabas, at Canaan Rapids. A confirmation was held in this church on the same day, at which 7 persons were confirmed. The attendance at our services at the Rapids has been very much improved since the building of this church, and we are now enabled to have regular public celebrations of Holy Communion in that district, which was not possible before.

As the services in Bagdad have been much appreciated and largely attended for some years, we have concluded to erect a church there also, and intend making a start at it this summer. A piece of land has been chosen for the site and will be presented to us by Mr. Robert Jeffery, Sr. We have a small sum of money in the bank and many persons promised free labour. But as the settlement is very poor, and as we do not intend to run one dollar into debt, our little

building must, perforce, rear itself slowly, unless interested friends outside the parish give us help.

We report 27 baptisms this year, the largest number reported in one year since I have worked in the parish.

The attendance at the services at our six different centres has been very satisfactory, speaking generally, throughout the year, the average attendance being larger than that for 1890-91. By the census returns we learn that the population of Queens Co. is less than it was ten years ago; the decrease being about 2,000. This accounts partly for the fact that church work (as far as statistics exhibit it) remains at a standstill, and that our back parishes must for a long time look to richer city parishes for aid and partial support. The D. C. S. is not, then, merely a convenience, it is a necessity; let the benevolent cease contributing to it and we poor mission districts must (as far as we can see) collapse, and be forced to say "farewell—a long farewell" to the church's services.

The withdrawal by the S. P. G. of one fifth of its grant causes us some anxiety; but we have no doubt but that churchmen will be stimulated to fill up by their increased offerings the breach thus formed; and we put our trust in God and in Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church, feeling that He will not allow His cause to fail, or the prayers of His servants to remain unanswered.

KINGSCLEAR—REV. H. MONTGOMERY, M. A.

There is nothing out of the ordinary line of parish matters to be reported this year from Kingsclear. Services have gone on as usual, and on the whole have been more largely attended especially at Central Kingsclear than heretofore. There is still, however, much room for improvement in this direction.

Last July a strawberry festival was successfully held by the Women's Aid Branch in this parish, and brought in a fair sum of money for parochial purposes. All the debts of the parish were paid off, and a balance placed in the Savings Bank towards a fund for putting a new roof on St. Peter's Church. Another festival to be held in July will, no doubt, increase this fund so that work may shortly be begun on the church. At Upper Kingsclear we have but a faithful few. Services are held fortnightly there, and what few church

people there are in that portion of the parish, with the exception of one or two, attend very regularly. Our music here is of an unusual character for so small a country congregation. The few voices in the congregation are assisted by an organ, a cornet and a violin, and so far as the instrumental part of the music is concerned it would make many a city rector envious if he heard it. Unfortunately for this parish there is occasionally somebody who is a help to the church going away and nobody coming to fill the gap: so that the outlook is not always bright, but we must work and wait, leaving the result to Him who gives the blessing while we feebly and patiently struggle on.

KINGSTON—REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT, B. A.

Though not seeing it to be either an obligation or a duty to make any report of work done in this parish to the General Committee of the D. C. S., being neither a missionary nor a member of the same, yet I am moved to hand in some returns, lest the brethren be tempted to put a wrong construction on any prolonged silence on my part.

I will begin, then, by saying that for the past year the Sunday services have been held with stated regularity, the omission of a service now and then having been occasioned by stress of weather, blocked roads, etc. Our church-going church people, so far as I can judge, have not diminished. Our communicant roll is as large as ever, in spite of the steady drain by removal and death that is ever going on within our borders. Sixteen years will have passed when the 2nd of September is reached, since I assumed the duties and responsibilities of rector here, and during that period of time I can think of but one church family that has moved into this parish, whilst I can recall many, not individuals, but families, that have left, a circumstance that is not particularly enlivening to any Parish Priest. Up to date I have not come across the latest statistical return of the number of church people in the parish, and for this reason I have left unanswered Question 1 in the return to 1st May for the Society.

On Thursday the 10th September we had a visit from the Bishop Coadjutor, who confirmed at Trinity Church in the afternoon twenty persons, the majority of whom have since

then been devout and regular partakers of the Holy Eucharist. Within three years, therefore, there have been confirmed seventy-five persons in this parish.

The Rev. D. I. Wetmore continues to give me valuable assistance, though, I am sorry to say, with very little pecuniary encouragement. By his help all our churches, four in number, are opened for service every Sunday.

I wish it were in my power to present a bright and favourable report of our Sunday-school work. From various causes the Sunday-schools are not as thriving, so far as attendance is concerned, as I could wish. I am speaking now more particularly of the school here, in Kingston proper, and also of that at St. James, Long Reach. The older and confirmed scholars depart and there are very few new ones to fill their places. Our little ones live too far away from the school to be able to attend. But our teachers try to do the best they can, and with that we must be satisfied. The school at Clifton is doing good work; the majority of the children living close at hand, the attendance, therefore, is regular, and the prospects encouraging. At St. Paul's, Whitehead, the work, I fear, is not progressing. It has been carried on in the past amid many difficulties and discouragements, but I hope a fresh start will soon be made and this school come once more into line.

And now let me say a few words as to what has been done by the people during the twelve months past, as indications that they are by no means careless or indifferent to the things pertaining to the well-being of the Church of the Living God.

Trinity Church: Last summer the south side of the roof was newly shingled and the whole neatly painted, and necessary repairs put upon the tower and steeple, at an outlay of over \$150, raised by the Women's Aid Society, of Trinity Church. A fair linen cloth for the altar has been given by Miss E. Northrup, at present absent from the parish.

All Saints, Clifton: In the autumn of last year this beautiful little church was newly painted from the cross-tipped spire to the base of the church, by the enthusiastic churchmen there, in a most beautiful and creditable manner. A new Mason & Hamlyn organ was imported from the U. S. and used for the first time at a Thanksgiving service on Wednesday, 11th November. And this spring All Saints Guild turned

out in force and graded the ground between the road and the church, setting out trees, seeding down the plat, and having a good clearing-up time generally.

At St. Paul's, Whitehead, the horse-shed, which was in a tumble-down state, was put in thorough repair by the young men of that church, so that now it affords comfortable shelter to the weary and heated horse of the Parson.

At St. James's, Long Reach, the ladies have put down a rich, handsome carpet within the rails, and have also collected a sum of money sufficient for the replacing the old and worn surplice with one more comely for the worship in the sanctuary. The church itself has also just been freshened up by the application of two or more coats of paint to its weather-worn sides and steeple, so that once more it becomes a prominent feature in the landscape, on this side of the Reach, to the eye of the tourist who may chance to be steaming up or down the lovely waters of the St. John, the Rhine of America. The ladies have also been instrumental in raising the funds (over \$150) for the accomplishment of this most necessary work, by soliciting subscriptions from our own people, and in other legitimate ways.

In all our churches, the need of money for making up the stipend of the Rector and Assistant being so keenly felt, we have not what, I dare say, can be found in almost all the churches of assisted missions, a sexton or care-taker, but the cleaning, the firing and lighting, the oil and fuel, are all gratuitously done or offered by a people who, though poor in this world's goods, are yet rich in good works, and who would feel most bitterly the loss, if by some adverse circumstance, the Church of their fathers, the altars they are wont to compass, and the services they have learned to love from their youth were denied them, through their inability to maintain the ministrations of the same.

For extra parochial objects there have been raised—for the S. P. G., \$7; for the Jews, \$6; Lenten offerings, specified, \$3.56, all paid in to the Treasurer of D. C. S.; General Purposes Account, \$1.50.—Total, \$18 06.

LANCASTER—REV. J. C. TITCOMBE.

LUDLOW AND BLISSFIELD — REV. H. MONTGOMERY, M. A.

The most important event to be reported from this mission this year is the consecration of St. Andrew's Church, Doaktown. Three years ago this July the corner stone of this church was laid by Lady Allen of Fredericton, and since that time the few church people of this part of the mission zealously and generously did what they could to hasten its completion, and their efforts have been successfully rewarded. Among the few who did much to help on the good work was one who has not yet entered into communion with the church, Mr. Robert Swim. He kindly gave the land whereon the church is built, and also gave a large subscription besides. To outside help, however, the mission is largely indebted, and indeed without the generous aid of kind friends in Fredericton, St. John and elsewhere the church could not have been built. On Her Gracious Majesty's birthday of this year the church was ready for consecration, and was duly set apart as a House of God, by his Lordship Bishop Kingdon, on that day. Several of the clergy of the Deanery were present, and about fifty of our friends in Fredericton, taking advantage of the holiday and the excursion train provided for the occasion, came over and assisted in making the service hearty and bright.

Thus the Queen's birthday has been made a still more memorable day for the inhabitants of Doaktown.

The Church is similar to the one built in Ludlow, and we have earnest hopes that God's blessing will abundantly rest upon the work in connection with the new Church. The congregation attending the services there averages about sixty. There is also a model Sunday-school taught by a well-trained and efficient Sunday-school teacher, Mrs. Robert Swim, formerly Miss Ross, of Fredericton, whose good work in the Sunday-school in Fredericton will not soon be forgotten. Since the Church was consecrated a beautiful carpet for the chancel has been presented by the Sunday-school in connection with Trinity Church, St. John.

In Ludlow the work is going on as usual. The Mission room at Carroll's (which will be the third Church building erected in six years) is nearing completion. The Church people in this portion of the Mission, though more plentiful than in Doaktown, are very poor, and out of their poverty are doing their best to finish their little Church. They have re-

ceived very little assistance from outside sources, but are certainly deserving of aid, and we earnestly hope it will come; otherwise they will have to wait for some time yet and services will have to be continued in a small stuffy school-house, which will not nearly accommodate all those who desire to attend the services. We are looking forward to securing the services of a Lay Reader for the summer months, so that there will be more frequent services in the Mission and the necessary assistance in preparing candidates for confirmation. Mr. Hutchings, the Lay Reader last summer, did good work in the way of visiting and teaching the young, and was much liked by the people.

In conclusion, we thank the Great Head of the Church for the blessings vouchsafed to the Mission for another year, and trust that with His help, the Church will continue to grow and flourish, to the honor and glory of His Holy Name.

MADAWASKA — REV. DAVID RICHARDS, B. A.

This Mission has been very much neglected, and members of other religious bodies have not been slow to take advantage thereof.

At present there is but one place of worship, where two services and a Sunday-school are held weekly.

The few members of the church here are of sterling value, — true and loyal to their Church and well worthy of the attention paid them by the D. C. S.

The improvements that are being made are a standing witness of the great self-sacrifice the members of the Church make to adorn and beautify the house of God. Would that there were more of like kind.

MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON — REV. HORACE E. DIBBLEE, M. A.

Throughout the year past the work of the Church in Maugerville and Burton has been moving quietly forward.

On March the 20th, his Lordship Bishop Kingdon visited St. John's Church, Oromocto, and administered the rite of laying on of hands to ten candidates, all of whom have become regular communicants. Our communicants' roll for the two

Parishes has now reached the number of one hundred and fifteen, which is an encouraging improvement, the standing for the past four years being 88, 95, 105 and 115, respectively.

The congregation of St. John's Church, Oromocto, owe a debt of deep gratitude to Miss Wilmot and her brothers, who have placed in this Church a chaste and beautiful marble font in loving memory of their parents, the late Hon. R. D. and Mrs. Wilmot.

Since entering into the charge of these Parishes I have been oftentimes filled with regret at the serious loss the Church has undergone in the death of some of her oldest and staunchest members.

At our Anniversary meeting last year, fitting reference was made to the loss we sustained in the death of the late ex-Governor of the Province, the Hon. R. D. Wilmot. This year it is my sad duty to chronicle the removal from the Church militant of one of the most generous benefactors of the Church in this Diocese, the late Charles D. O. Currie. A very large proportion of the Endowment Fund accumulated by my predecessor in Mangerville was the gift of Mr. Currie.

Our contributions to the General Purposes of this Society, I have every reason to believe, will equal those of last year.

I am happy in the thought that I can again report most favourably concerning the work done by the divinity student from King's College, who, through the kindness of the Board of Home Missions was sent to my assistance during the mid-summer vacation.

If the church in this, the oldest county in the province, is to keep the 719 souls she is said now to have, and if this number is to be increased during the next decade, then, assuredly there can be no question as to the wisdom of the Board in lending every available assistance to this end.

When it is considered that there now is but one clergyman for this whole county, whose particular charge embraces an area until recently occupied by *two* clergymen, it ought not to be thought presumption in me, should I suggest to the Society, by this means, the advisability of preserving to the church, where possible, the ground that has long ago become her special heritage. His mind must be sadly biased indeed who would do aught else than rejoice at the rapid strides which are being made by the church in some of the new settlements of the Diocese, yet, when these advances are being made at so great a sacrifice as the desertion of those old church-

families who have stood by her in the early days of the province, and whose first principles have now become matured into an allegiance which only continued neglect can weaken, I say, that in my humble judgment it is unwise to make so great a sacrifice.

The returns for the several parishes have not yet reached me, but by actual count, I would say, that *less than half* of the total return of church people for the County of Sunbury are within my cure. It is manifest therefore, that if the latest census taken is correct, more than 300 souls belonging to the church in this county are living without the regular ministrations of the church. This surely is a fact that calls for the most serious consideration of this venerable Society. If I might be allowed to suggest further, I would say, that in my judgment Maugerville and Burton are so located that the mission might well become the centre of very successful missionary work in this county. All that is required is such assistance from the Society as will enable a man in Holy Orders (or failing that, a capable Lay Reader) to undertake the work.

I am naturally most deeply interested in the work of the church in this county, and I cherish the hope that these suggestions which I now offer will not be altogether in vain.

MONCTON—REV. E. BERTRAM HOOPER.

The work of the church in the parish of Moncton has gone on steadily during the year, and with encouraging results. Those who are familiar with the history of the church in this city, and have watched her progress from year to year, must acknowledge that the blessing of God is manifested upon every portion of the work He has given us to do. The only indications by which men may judge point to an increase in zeal and love for the mother church, a deepening and strengthening of the good fellowship and unity which should reign within her borders, and a consequent advance and growth in grace and in the knowledge of God. The indications referred to are: 1st, Congregations of exceptional size and steadiness, often taxing the seating capacity of the church to the utmost; and 2nd, a satisfactory increase in the roll of communicants, with increased frequency and regularity in the communions made.

Material improvements also afford us much cause for thankfulness.

A beautiful two-manual pipe organ, built by F. E. Peters of St. John, has been placed in the church at a cost (including chamber and other incidental expenses) of \$1700, and this large sum has actually been raised by the congregation within the year. We all feel that we are very deeply indebted for this most gratifying success to Mrs. T. V. Cooke, who throwing herself heart and soul into the project, undertook and carried out the entire work of collecting for the organ. We are thankful to Mrs. Cooke, and are all proud of possessing an instrument which adds so much of dignity, beauty, and grandeur, to the services we offer to Almighty God. I say that we are all proud of it, because I think that there is not a single wage-earner in the congregation who has not contributed generously towards the organ, and from the youngest Sunday-school child to the oldest member of the congregation, all have done their utmost to further this object. The organ is, in the truest sense, an offering of the congregation to God.

Through the generosity of Mr. James Smith of Sussex, we have been enabled to lay down a rich new carpet in the sanctuary, and a serviceable linoleum in the chancel between the choir seats; besides other less important improvements in the decoration of the chancel.

Notwithstanding the strain of the organ fund upon the purses and energies of the congregation, the "Willing Workers" have reduced the debt on the Rectory to the trifling sum of \$70.00; and as the subjoined list will show, the congregation have not been unmindful of their obligations to objects outside of their own parish.

I am thankful to be able to present so favourable a report of the zeal and generosity of my people, more especially when one remembers the peculiar trials of the church in Moncton, and the fact, which is not generally known, that the average income of the men of the congregation is under \$500 per annum, with the cost of living, rent, etc., as excessive as in cities of greater pretensions.

I would not, however, be understood as implying that there are no difficulties, no discouragements in our church work, or that our people are all doing their duty in matters spiritual and temporal. There is much room for improvement, room for more real, honest, vital religion, room for more self-denying labour and liberality; God grant that what is lacking in us may by His grace and mercy be supplied.

Contributions, as follows: Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, \$15.25; Parochial Missions to the Jews' Fund, \$9.68; proceeds of S.S. self-denial boxes for Albert, \$30; special collection for work at McAdam Junction, \$19; Widows and Orphans Fund, \$7; subscriptions as per list for General Purposes D. C. S., \$34.80—\$115.73; special contribution by Mr. H. C. Hanington entitling to life membership in D. C. S., \$40; total from Moncton for objects outside the parish, \$155.73.

As a proof of the utility of public meetings addressed by deputations on the needs of the Diocese, I may report that such a meeting was held in Moncton last February, which was largely attended, at which telling addresses were delivered by our energetic and practical Rural Dean, Rev. J. Roy Campbell, rector of Dorchester, by His Honor Judge Hanington, and by Rev. C. E. Mackenzie, rector of Shediac; the results of this meeting being the infusing life and interest in the work of the Society in the hearts of all who were present, and the offerings of \$19 for the proposed work at McAdam Junction.

MUSQUASH — REV. H. M. SPIKE, B. A.

I have nothing of very special interest to report to the Society, and hope its work will be sustained where there is so much need required in the poor and scattered parishes. The usual amount of \$80 may be expected from this parish.

NEWCASTLE AND NELSON — REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

NEW DENMARK — REV. N. M. HANSEN.

It is not easy to report some news of general interest every year from a small country parish; still I feel that the Society should hear something in return for its support.

On the 6th May, the Rev. Scovil Neales addressed us on the needs of the Diocese. We were very much pleased with him and he with us.

On the 24th of May we had a Deanery meeting in New Denmark for discussing the reduction of the missionary grant. I offered my resignation for a small retiring fee, which would save a little money when my mission was united with Grand Falls, but the Deanery would not recommend my suggestion, and our good Dean kindly said that I should stay and do the same good work as hitherto.

We are looking forward for a confirmation in September, of twenty-seven young persons. The first confirmation in 1876 we had nine, and since it has gradually increased to twenty-seven, and it will probably increase in the same manner in the future. I often hear of opposition against the Church by old people, but I never heard of one single example of opposition in the young. But on some occasions I have seen the church filled up by nearly youthful faces, former and present pupils of the Sunday-school; and then I thank God who gave me wisdom from the beginning to attend to the Sunday-school. Three years of education and twenty-five years of practice in the old country in religious teaching and treatment of baptized children, has not been without fruit in my work here. As the farmers say in July: "Crop looks well and gives a reasonable hope for a good harvest;" so I say: Spiritual crop looks well. Maybe the sower will not live to the harvest, but the Church Society will survive the sower and gather the fruit in time to come.

NEW MARYLAND — REV. F. ALEXANDER.

I have nothing special to report in connection with this mission. Services have been held with regularity, and repairs to the church completed, during the last year. We are sadly in want of a new fence around the church-yard, and contributions towards this object from any quarter will be thankfully received by the missionary.

NORTON — REV. E. A. WARNEFORD.

The contribution from this parish for the present year is \$93.75, being an increase of \$17.25 over the amount collected last year.

There is nothing of special interest to report connected with the work of the parish. Our services have been regular, and the attendance has been in a great measure regulated by the weather. Fair weather Christians, alas! are too plentiful.

PETERSVILLE — REV. W. B. ARMSTRONG, M. A.

During the month of August last I took charge of my present parish. I found it was out of debt both as regards my predecessor and also as regards the churches and rectory. The rectory, however, was very much in need of repair as nothing had been done to it since its building, some 18 years ago. From the chimney to the cellar repairs had to be effected, and the building needed very much to be painted within and without. It was thought better to proceed with the absolutely needed repairs, and the inside painting. Accordingly we had two concerts in September last, by which we raised the sum of \$50. In both of these concerts we were kindly assisted by Mrs. Fenwick Arnold of Sussex. The painting and repairs altogether amounted to the sum of \$100. This year we hope to raise means enough to paint the building outside. In the month of October a number of the parishioners kindly came and shingled the roof of the barn. I have also to thank my parishioners for hauling me a year's supply of wood.

On the 15th of February we had a meeting at the Petersville church, to consider the project of building a church fence, and also a horse shed. It was decided to proceed with both of these. The boards for the fence have been already procured, and it is expected that the fence will be erected before haying time.

Since my coming to this parish I have met with a great deal of kindness. The people as a rule are not blessed with wealth, but are, generally speaking, glad to give of their means towards the support of the church. The houses are very much scattered, and as the majority of them live at a distance of 10 miles from the rectory, it involves a considerable amount of time and exposure on the road. The hearty welcome, however, that invariably awaits one, compensates for the length of the drive, and however stormy may be the Sunday there are always some faithful ones to greet the clergyman after his toilsome drive through snow or rain.

The services at St. Luke's Church, Welsford, close to the rectory, are held alternately morning and evening, and are always well attended. The offertories during the first eight months ending at Easter last exceeded that of any previous year in the history of the parish. A class of about twelve candidates from this section of the parish will be presented to the Bishop Coadjutor for confirmation in August next.

The services at Petersville, the mother church, are held alternately morning and afternoon. Here on account of the exposed situation of the church, on the top of a high, bleak hill, the congregations vary very much according to the weather. On a fine day sometimes the attendance is quite large, whereas a snow storm or rain has a very perceptible effect in thinning the numbers.

A service is held once a month at Armstrong's Corner, on Sunday afternoons, and which, in winter and summer, is well attended. At both of these places candidates for confirmation are being prepared. In the settlement of Clones a monthly service in the morning is held.

Altogether there is much to encourage one, and an ample work to be done for the Master. The contributions to the D. C. S. will amount to about the same as last year.

PETITCODIAC — REV. C. H. FULLERTON.

PORTLAND — REV. L. G. STEVENS, M. A.

RICHIBUCTO — REV. H. HACKENLEY.

Notwithstanding the disadvantages under which this parish is labouring there are signs of progress and indications of encouragement. When I took charge of it the people showed a willingness to do their best to get along without any assistance, but through falling off in trade here, and many of our people having left the place, and their places not being filled by others, they found themselves utterly unable to keep up without aid. Application was therefore made to the

D. C. S., and I am happy to be able to report that a grant has been made towards the parish, by which, with the strenuous efforts of the people, along with the studied and judicious working of our corporation, we shall be able to get along, perhaps. I am satisfied that the members of the vestry will do their best in order to keep matters working as satisfactorily as possible. There are some urgent needs in this parish which require attention, before it can be placed on a favourable footing. 1. The parish church is unfavourably situated, especially in the fall, winter and spring of the year, and it is old and poorly lighted. Efforts are being made to procure more lights. 2. The rectory wants repairing, or a new one built, and around the grounds, about $4\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land, surrounding it, a new fence is needed. We want also Sunday school libraries for two Sunday schools. How are these things to be accomplished in the face of the fact that our people are poor, no matter how willing? This parish at present is not what it was a few years ago, either financially or numerically, on account of its trade dwindling down, and emigration from the place. Because of these things the people need every encouragement, and considering their disposition to labour and to wait, I have no hesitation in stating that they merit practical sympathy. My experience here is, that our people are hopeful, sympathetic, and agreeable. The members of the vestry are studying ways and means, and evidently making the best of the situation. I hope that they will be encouraged in their efforts, which I am sure they both need and merit. In consideration of what the D. C. S. is doing for this parish our people are determined to do what they can, in return, for the general purposes of the D. C. S.

We have about 100 scholars, and 13 teachers in our two Sunday schools, one at Richibucto, and one at Kingston, both of which are fairly well attended. I am trying to impress upon our teachers the importance of a personal visitation of their own scholars at their homes, etc.

The ladies of the "Mite Society" are about to go into this department of their work with renewed energy.

I am holding monthly services at two different outside stations on a week night, and a service at Buctouche every two weeks, one on a week night and the other on the Lord's day; and every Lord's day I have either two services and a Sabbath school, or three services, divided between Richibucto,

Kingston and Buctouche, as above; and a service every Friday evening in the Chapel of Ease, Richibucto.

As this is the first report that I have made since I took charge of this parish in October 1890, I beg leave to state that there have been six marriages, thirty baptisms, and twelve deaths. Very shortly now I hope to be able to present a large class of candidates for confirmation.

RICHMOND—REV. A. W. TEED, M. A.

Since my last report the church's work in Richmond has been continued in much the same manner as before.

First as to the material fabrics of the church. It affords me pleasure to state that the effort begun about a year ago to obtain a much needed organ for St. Paul's church has been most successful. One has been purchased at a cost of \$90 which has been paid. In the interior of the church the walls of the nave, and the walls and ceiling of the chancel and of the vestry have been calcimined, and thereby their appearance much improved. Part of the expense was borne by the people, and part was defrayed out of a donation of \$20 sent us just before his death by the lamented Henry Neales, once Rector of Richmond, whose work and whose worth is, and will long be, held in loving remembrance by his former parishioners. The fence has lately been put in repair, and the grounds cleared up by a few earnest workers, so that the property presents quite a different appearance to that which it showed a few weeks ago, although it will still bear improving.

Progress too can be noted at St. John's (Parish) Church. The sides of the chancel have been panelled with basswood and ash, at a cost of \$75. A balance of \$10 remains unpaid. Our thanks are due to Miss D. Duff, a former resident of the parish for \$15 towards this work. A further advance has been made by some of the people in putting their lots in order in the cemetery, as well as beginning a new fence, but much yet remains to be done.

While the material work of the church has thus gone on steadily, even if to our impatient minds but slowly, the spiritual welfare of the people has I trust not been lost sight of. His Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor, visited us on Oct. 26th, when six were confirmed, one being a venerable old lady of more than 90 years.

The Sunday and week-day services have been regularly held, and the Sunday school is holding its summer session. The claims of the church outside the Diocese have been brought before the people, through the Epiphany and Ascension-tide appeals. The offertory for the S. P. G. was not neglected and that on Good Friday was for Parochial Missions to the Jews. The needs of the Diocese were brought before the people by the Rev. Scovil Neales, who visited this mission May 15th and 16th.

But in speaking of spiritual matters, as has been often noticed in time past, one feels his inability to put down his work and the results of his toil, and I fear that oftentimes our reports are uninteresting and somewhat disappointing.

The parish registers record for the past year 15 baptized, 6 confirmed, 5 marriages, 5 burials.

ROTHESAY—REV. GEO. E. LLOYD.

Contributions for general purposes \$60.50.

SACKVILLE—REV. C. F. WIGGINS, B. A.

The Parish of Sackville has been compelled to pass through the deep waters of a large expenditure during the past year. The placing of furnaces in St. Paul's Church and other incidental expenses have incurred a debt of over \$400, which, in addition to the ordinary expenses of a self-supporting parish, has called for no little effort on the part of the people. We make these remarks by way of explaining the fact of our contributions to the Diocesan Church Society being so small this year. They are, I am sorry to say, not all completed yet, as we were waiting for the visit of our honoured Dean who had been appointed as a deputation in behalf of the Board and, although he set forth its special claims this year eloquently and well, not even he could take blood out of stone or draw money from empty pockets. His address aroused a strong interest among the people and they would willingly have given had they the power.

Both the churches have been greatly improved in the past year. St. Ann's, at Westcock, has been decorated in walls and ceiling and looks extremely well, and the improved heating

apparatus in St. Paul's has proved a great success and has brought comfort in the place of misery and wretchedness. For four of the winter months I went to the assistance of the Rector of Westmorland, who was through prolonged illness unable to take his duty, but is now, I am thankful to say, able to resume work. I have had very many reasons to thank God for blessings of the past year and of evident signs of increased love and devotion on the part of the people. We are planted on an ungenerous soil for the growth of church principles, but I am comforted in the belief that the few plants we have rooted are doing well, considering their surroundings and that in due season we shall reap if we faint not.

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK — REV. CANON
KETCHUM. D. D.

ST. DAVID — REV. J. W. MILLIDGE.

Since my last report to the Society the official figures of the census of 1891 have been made public, and have confirmed what has long been suspected, that a very serious diminution of the population had taken place; the decrease in the parishes of St. David, St. Patrick and St. James having been 997 in ten years. And that is not all, for those who have left us have been the young and vigorous, leaving at home the middle aged and the old who are rapidly being removed by death.

Several of our oldest communicants have departed this life during the past year, among them being Mrs. Jane Carson of St. Patrick, who although 89 years of age walked half a mile to church, and received the holy communion a short time before her death. She lived a consistent Christian life, and died the death of the righteous. Her most cherished recollections were of the times long ago, when our beloved Bishop partook of her hospitality in his visits to St. Patrick.

Mr. William Carson also joined the church expectant in Paradise, at the age of 84. He had been a great reader, and when at last his eyesight failed, and increasing infirmities

confined him to his bed, his great delight was to repeat large portions of the church service, and whenever I passed the night at his house an early celebration of the holy communion formed part of the family devotions.

Although losing so many of our people, those who remain seem to be making up in zeal for diminished numbers. A fine new cabinet organ was purchased for St. Patrick's Church last November, and by May, through the exertions of the ladies, fully paid for. Miss Georgia McFarlane, our volunteer organist, deserves great credit for the care she bestows upon the musical portion of the service. An anthem is now sung at nearly every service in this church. We have to thank Mr. James Mowatt and some others on the Bay Road for an excellent shed to protect the parson's old horse from the biting winter winds during service time.

The ladies of St. Thomas' Church have lately purchased a handsome new altar cloth and chancel carpet. Other much needed improvements will probably be carried out during the summer.

At Beaconsfield all debt has been paid off through the great liberality of the Metropolitan, who sent us \$50, and the Girl's Mission Band of Fredericton \$25. But in consequence of hard times and the scarcity of money no progress has been made, the interior of the church remaining as it was last year. Services are however held regularly during the summer and autumn, with a monthly celebration of the holy communion. The corporation of All-Saints, St. Andrews, presented this church with a very nice little organ which had been in use in their Sunday-school.

ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD—REV. RANALD E. SMITH, M. A.

The services in both churches have been kept up regularly since my last report, and, I think, good progress has been made in both parishes. According to the census for the past decade, our church members have been reported to have decreased nearly 10 per cent. The leakage has not been at St. George and Pennfield, as there has been an increase in our numbers.

Hard times, with the same grim and forbidding expression of countenance, again raised his unwelcome head, above

the troubled parochial waters of St. George. For nearly four months, during the first part of the winter, the Granite Works, in which so many of our sturdy church members work, were shut down. But they have beaten him away again. Again the hum of the mills is heard, and the whirr of machinery, and the sharp clip of the steel. No doubt, he will return again at intervals.

Death too, has been active, since my last report. I have read the solemn service for the Burial of the Dead over 22 bodies. In St. George Capt. Joseph Meabury entered into his rest at the age of 68, after a long and painful illness. He was confirmed by the Coadjutor Bishop in 1875.

In Pennfield, George Gillespie, (not long since church warden) died in December at the early age of 39, "in sure and certain hope;" and in two months his wife, another consistent member of our church, followed her late husband. Captain Snell, light-house keeper at Beaver Harbour, a whole hearted man, passed through the dark valley. Mary Harvey, of St. George, a patient sufferer for months, was relieved by passing peacefully into Paradise. All these died in faith and peace, what would they have done without the spiritual consolation of the ministrations of the church, and the same occurs all over our diocese.

On Nov. 23rd, confirmation services were held by Dr. Kingdon, when 32 candidates were confirmed, 23 in St. George, and 9 in Pennfield, all adults except 3. The class in St. George was a rather remarkable one. There were five brothers, three married couples, two were of Baptist origin, one Methodist, one Presbyterian, four had been lately baptized, and to add to their remarkable character their physique was generally very large.

This was the sixth confirmation since the arrival of the Coadjutor Bishop and altogether 186 have been confirmed in that time. Frequent confirmations have a very beneficial tendency on a parish, on priest, confirmees and the general people. Since my last report 130 different persons have brought their Lord's death to remembrance.

The interior of St. Luke's Church, St. George, was painted last autumn, and a new Brussels carpet placed in the chancel and linoleum in the choir, the whole, together with new blinds, costing about \$120.

Our contributions will not be more than required by the Society, as our parishes here have as much as they can do

to make up the assessment. In October we remitted \$6.59 for S. P. G., and we have collected \$5.51 for Algoma, and \$5.00 for Bishop Blyth's Fund.

Such is the account of our stewardship since our last report, in brief. If we were all to put on paper the trials, troubles, the experiences and the encouragement we receive, the visits we pay, and the daily experience of our parochial work, hindrances and helps, the kindnesses of friends and the machinations of foes, I fear we would be compelled to hold a very protracted meeting. We leave it all in our own Lord's hands, to bless our work and pardon our failings and imperfections.

ST. MARTINS—REV. W. LEB. McKIEL, B. A.

In looking over the record of the year's work in this parish we find that there have been 144 services on Sundays, and 118 on week days. There have been 64 celebrations of the Lord's Supper. 15 communicants have been added to the list, and 4 have been removed by the hand of death. There have been 11 baptized and 7 confirmed, all of whom are communicants.

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The Coadjutor Bishop, with his usual kindness, came to us for a special confirmation on Sept. 18th, having been here the year before and confirmed 25.

The St. Martins branch of the Women's Aid Association has been doing a good work. The women, by their industry, skill and zeal, have, during the year, raised the sum of \$138.94 clear of all expenses. Out of this they paid \$46.59 to liquidate certain claims against the church, which were contracted before the present Rector took charge. They then paid for a new metal pump and galvanized pipe for the rectory well, the total cost of which, when completed, was \$39.09. They further gave \$25.59 for new brass hanging lamps for the church; \$8.92 was expended on some repairs at the rectory, and the balance has been expended in material and supplies for carrying on their work which is worthy of all praise.

In addition to this good work done by the women, Mrs. James Rourke, one of the vice-presidents of the association, very kindly, generously and without solicitation, furnished Holy Trinity Church throughout with kneeling cushions at her own expense. The comfort of the worshippers has thus been increased by this kind and generous act of one of their number.

The new fence at the rectory lot has been completed, for which we are mainly indebted to the zeal and labor of Mr. Samuel Merlin.

The church in St. Martins has suffered a loss by the death of Miss Margaret Walker, not that she had much of silver or gold to enrich the church with, but she had gifts and graces which cannot be acquired by these. The light of an unsullied life of devotion to the service of God and His Church, diffused itself on all around, and she being dead yet speaketh to the present generation which has grown up about her, to go and do likewise.

In addition to the assessment paid to the Diocesan Church Society and the current expenses of the church and Sunday school, this congregation has given to the S. P. G. Missions \$2.31, Domestic Missions \$3.00, Parochial Missions to the Jews \$2.33.

ST. MARY — REV. W. O. RAYMOND, M. A.

ST. MARY'S — REV. JOHN PARKINSON.

The past year has been in the Parish of St. Mary's uneventful, but there are not wanting signs of decided and steady progress. About 410 services have been held in the several churches and stations, 1500 parochial visits made, and an attempt at giving parochial work a more distinctly missionary character by giving house to house instructions in Holy Scripture and the prayer book: this has aroused interest in the church, in some cases of a very marked kind, and in all it has brought about a greater freedom in asking for information amongst the people, and caused them to regard the clergy as their teachers, not only on Sunday and at Divine service, but also at any other time.

The work in the large missionary parish of St. Mary's has certainly become such as to require twice the labour it did a year ago, and while, as everywhere else, there are difficulties to be met and overcome, yet there is a hearty good will and determined effort among all classes of the parishioners, which has given, and which continues to give, great encouragement, and a good hope for time to come.

The Bishop Coadjutor has confirmed twice within the year in St. Mary's, once in the Nashwaak Church, and once in the parish church. 17 candidates were confirmed, and this so soon after the large class of 34 in February of last year, the parish may well be thankful for.

There are several beautiful gifts which should not be unnamed in this report. One a handsome and appropriate pulpit for the parish church, a complete set of lamps with brackets to provide for evening service for Trinity Church, a full supply of hymn books and prayer books for Trinity Church and the Nashwaak Church, also a carved ash reredos and fine-toned new organ for the Nashwaak Church. Nearly \$300 has been collected and placed in the People's Bank of New Brunswick under the name of "The Marysville Church Building Fund." A very beautiful piece of land has been given by Mr. Alexander Gibson, and plans have been prepared for a church to be built at Marysville with as little delay as may well be. An effort is being made to raise what is necessary to complete what will be a beautiful and correct church after a perfect English model, but yet at the same time well adapted to colonial requirements and the difference of climate.

St. Mary's Parish does not forget what the D. C. S. has done, and is still doing, for it, and this fact it is confidently believed will be seen in the new subscription list.

Two important meetings have been held in the parish during the past D. C. S. year, one on behalf of the needs of the Diocese, and one on behalf of the Sunday School Teachers' Association. Both were largely attended and have quickened parochial interest in the several objects.

To their Lordships the Bishops and other friends, both cleric and lay, sincere thanks are due and hereby heartily offered.

It may be said that this report is framed in no mere optimistic spirit, but in full and distinct view of the strain and effort that are ever required to keep and hold what has already been gained, and at the same time to press forward in full view and just estimate of what has to be overcome, but also in abiding memory of our Lord's promise to His Church, a promise which receives its fulfilment every day, that He would be with her for success and blessing until the end of the world. "*Quis accusabit adversus electos Dei? Deus Qui justificat.*"

ST. PAUL — REV. CANON DEVEBER, M. A.

ST. STEPHEN — REV. O. S. NEWNHAM.

From the Parish of Christ Church, St. Stephen, I have to report that the work of the church has gone on during the year without anything of importance to chronicle. The congregation, noted for its loyalty to the church, is still active and full of good works. During the year another Memorial Window has been put in place, this one to the memory of the late Mrs. Dowling.

We have had no cause so far to regret the adoption of the "Mite Society," in place of all questionable means of raising money for church purposes.

The Mission work in Milltown is one of great interest. The small building which was erected two years ago has been found too small for the congregation, and we are now making an addition. This will give increased accommodation for some fifty more sittings. A Sunday-school was organized a few weeks ago, said to be the first Church of England Sunday-school ever held in the town, in which there are nearly fifty scholars enrolled, and on Sunday last there were forty-five present.

At a confirmation held in the Spring, 12 persons were confirmed by his Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor. If some way could be devised by which service could be held on Sunday mornings and evenings regularly, I am satisfied that a strong parish would soon be the result.

I might add here, to show that the congregation is in earnest, that the money needed for the enlargement, about \$200, was subscribed in less than a week, and before the work was begun. Considering that the congregation is composed nearly altogether of working people, this speaks much for their zeal. Too much praise cannot be given to Dr. Deacon, who did the whole of the collecting, nor to the members of the building committee, who have worked with such a good will.

I need not add that the parish will do its best for the General Purposes Fund of the D. C. S., and will, I hope, not fall short of former years, though the full amount has not yet been collected.

SOUTHAMPTON AND QUEENSBURY — REV. SCOVIL NEALES, M. A.

In making this my fifth annual report to the Diocesan Church Society I fear I must in great measure simply repeat the report of other years, for though the work does not dimin-

ish yet it does appear monotonous, and so also must be the report of the same. Very little seems to occur out of the ordinary current of events. Last August a confirmation was held at two points in the mission, when 21 candidates were presented to receive the gift. During the year, unless prevented as in one or two instances by sickness or other cause, I have held three services regularly every Sunday (each Sunday's work averaging a drive of 35 miles,) and though such has been the case yet no one church or station in the mission has had more than two Sunday services in the month. Eighteen persons have during the year been baptized, of whom eight were adults. There have been six burials and five marriages, and there are now 92 names on the communicants roll. These things are some of the results which have attended the work in the past year. Other things also might be mentioned as part of that which is being done. We have now a weekly Bible class held at Maple Ridge, which is well attended and from which we hope for good results. A new Sunday school has been organized a few Sundays ago at Maductic Falls, a place where for some time past I have been holding regular monthly services. The church which was begun at Bear Island two years ago is not yet finished, but on that we can report progress, though not as rapid as we would like, but as we have determined not to run into debt in building, such progress as is being made is real, and we hope before winter to have the building ready for consecration.

In conclusion I must not fail to mention the many acts of kindness and help which in ever increasing measure it has been my lot to receive from my parishioners. On Christmas last a number of of them, headed by Mr. Patrick Lockard of Millville, paid me a visit, and with many kind words and good wishes presented me with a magnificent buffalo coat, and now again I must return heart-felt thanks to our Heavenly Father for all His mercies and blessings.

SPRINGFIELD — REV. A. J. CRESSWELL.

Since making my report to the D. C. S., in July last, the work of the church in this Mission has gone on steadily and quietly, and has been similar to that of previous years, and with much the same results.

Since last July 12 persons have been baptized (six being adults), 12 have been confirmed, and there have been four marriages and 13 burials.

Divine service has been held in one of the three churches once every Tuesday, with a fortnightly celebration of the Holy Communion in the Parish Church, and in the other two a monthly. Year by year the attendance at the Parish Church is decreasing, by reason of removals and deaths.

During the seasons of Advent and Lent a weekly Bible and Prayer Book class was held at the Rectory, and considerable interest was evinced by those who attended.

The congregations at SS. Simon's and Jude's Church keep up very well, the responding being much more audible and the singing stronger than heretofore. His Lordship, the Bishop Coadjutor, visited this church Sept. 11th last, and confirmed twelve young persons.

At St. Luke's Church, Norton Station, we have just purchased a "Bell Chapel" organ, costing \$95. I am also thankful to say that the conduct of both attendants at church and communicants is all that can be desired. The weekly choir practice has been the means of strengthening our singing, and at these we have also practised reading the Psalms and other responses in the Prayer Book, as it is my desire to see ALL who can read render the responses.

I am glad to report that the interest in the work of the church in this Mission has been generally well sustained, and the church tone much improved. On more than one occasion have the parishioners shown their thoughtfulness and kindness towards the Rector. Three of our Sunday-schools are in operation, although the lack of teachers seriously hampers our efforts.

Lastly, a word concerning finances. The people are endeavouring to do now, as they have in past years, all they have been asked to do in the matter of assessment, but the sum is a large one, and unfortunately we are decreasing, no less than 108 young people have gone to the States (mostly) during my incumbency of five and a half years.

STANLEY—REV. A. B. MURRAY, M. A.

The work of this parish has been carried on during the past year with encouraging results. The services have been regular and the attendance good. During Lent we had special

week-day services, at which special addresses were given by Rev. Canon Roberts, Rev. H. Montgomery, and Rev. J. R. S. Parkinson, on some important historical points of the English church. All of these were able and interesting, and strengthened our hands very much. Since my last report there were 15 baptized, 10 confirmed, 6 burials, and one couple married.

SUSSEX AND STUDHOLM—REV. H. W. LITTLE.

Perhaps it is rather to the newer and more attractive fields than to the older and less interesting parishes that we should look for detailed reports to be read to us at these meetings.

In obedience, however, to the call of our Secretary, who is insatiable in his demands for copy, and whose "appetite, I may observe, appears to increase by that it feeds upon," I gladly offer a few fragmentary remarks upon some points of my work in the parishes of Sussex and Studholm.

As we hope to keep the centenary of these parishes in August next, we have postponed the annual D. C. S. collection till then, when we are to have two public meetings with special offertories in aid of the Society, by which arrangement we expect to about double our contribution of last year.

Our Lenten Sunday-school offerings were given to the mission fund for Albert, and we hope soon to hear of the appointment of a temporary missionary—say some zealous layman even—to go through that mission and comfort the hearts of those few but faithful ones who are veritably scattered upon the hills as "sheep without a shepherd."

We took up an offering on Good Friday for Bishop Blyth's mission at Cairo, one for S. P. G. last fall, and one for the Indian homes at our children's service in September. None of these were large sums, but if each parish would make it a rule to send *some* offering, and not be ashamed of its smallness, the aggregate result would surprise us all. What we really want is to develop and work out the idea that every member of the church shall contribute something—a few cents even—and get rid of the mistaken notion that no offering is of value to the church unless it is a large one in the eyes of men. The familiar story of the widow who cast two mites into the treasury seems to support this view—at least it

bears upon it somewhat pointedly. All successful schemes of church finance are broad based upon the charity and gifts of the many.

During the past year we have paid off another portion of an old debt upon the fabric of Holy Trinity. A commodious and finely designed guild-hall, after plans drawn by my predecessor, has been erected at Studholm, by the guild of the Ascension—a valuable and loyal body of church workers. A plot of ground has been freely offered us in Sussex as a site for a church-hall in the village. A girls' guild has been set on foot and is doing excellent work by raising special funds for paying organist, vergers, etc., and we have without any special strain raised sufficient money to meet the working expenses of the churches in both parishes. St. Agnes is now paying its own way satisfactorily, with a small balance to its credit at Easter of this year, and good congregations in attendance.

One difficulty which I have had with reference to raising help for D. C. S. was a peculiar one, and ought, I think, to be mentioned here. Many of my people met my appeal at first for the Society with the reply that a distinct pledge was given them, when these parishes became self-supporting, that they should never be asked to contribute to the funds of the D. C. S. My natural reply to this was that no one had any authority to give such a promise, and that if it had been given it was in no way binding upon myself or the Society, and that even the Society itself had no power to excuse members of the church from the privilege—I will not call it duty—of taking their part in the work of spreading and supporting the church in this Province and throughout the world.

The result of the late census of the Dominion has somewhat surprised us here, as we have to report a list of church members and a roll of communicants somewhat larger than at any past Easter, and this in the face of a considerable exodus of population to the States and elsewhere. What we have lost by death and removal we have more than made up by admission of new members into the church, and this is probably the experience of a number of other parishes in the diocese. An inquiry by a special committee of the D. C. S. would no doubt reveal the fact that there has been an error of figures somewhere.

The various organizations of these parishes, which comprise four Sunday-schools, three women's aid societies, a

teachers' union, with a weekly meeting, are all doing excellent work.

The local committee of the D. C. S., of which Miss Arnold is secretary, looks well after the interests of the venerable society, and we hope to have good proof of that interest in the results of the meetings to be held next month.

A new century of life and opportunity opens out to us this year, and this thought gives rise to the hope that it will not be long before the Church people in this Province, as in the case of the diocese of Quebec for instance, will be able not only to support their own church, but to help on the work of Christian effort in new fields with liberal offerings of money and of men. "Happy are the people that are in such a case."

TRINITY (ST. STEPHEN) — REV. R. L. SLOGGETT.

No report.

UPHAM—REV. S. JONES HANFORD.

I have no special report to forward. The scarcity of money has hindered the people in making up their assessment, but I am thankful, however, to add the payment has been made up to last April.

It has been quite impossible for me to get the subscriptions collected, and I can only hope that I shall have them ready in time for the printing of the Report; therefore, I cannot, as yet, state what will be the amount for the year, though I fear we shall not be able to collect much, if any more, to make up the deficiency.

As a portion of the Kingston Deanery we have promised to make up an extra sum on the stipend account; but what is to be done to meet the last withdrawal of the S. P. G. is hard to say. If the people could be made to feel the weight of their responsibilities something more could be done, but the difficulty is to make them feel this. It is all very well to say that the "stipends of the clergy must be kept up;" but, *practically*, for the country clergy, this has not, especially of late, been done, and therefore, though by some this would be thought to be taking a backward step, I am inclined to advocate that the D. C. S. *make its grants to the several missions*

as large as possible, respectively, and the people pay what they can, or may, to the clergyman. He will then know how he stands and can act accordingly. Whereas now, after the people have failed to make up their assessment, the D. C. S. stops its grants, and the clergyman is unpaid from either source.

But some other and better means of paying the full stipends to the clergy may possibly be devised and practically be made available in the best interests of the church. But however this may be, I must freely own that whatever schemes or arrangements have been or may be adopted by the Board of Home Missions, or other officials of the D. C. S., have been, and will be, such as in their judgment are most conducive to the best interest of the church.

VICTORIA — REV. R. W. HUDGELL.

This parish is supported by the voluntary weekly offerings of the people. The present number of families represented in the parish is 55. The number of communicants is 80. During the year from July 1891 to July 1892, there have been 66 celebrations of the Holy Communion, 10 Holy Baptisms, one marriage, and 11 deaths. Of those who have departed hence to Paradise five were communicants. In addition to the usual Sunday services there is a weekly Celebration of the Eucharist at 8 a. m., a monthly Children's Service, and a Young Men's Bible-class. The weekly Fast of the Church is observed by evening prayer and instruction on Fridays at 7.30 p. m. The contributions to the Society for this year will amount to \$50.

WATERFORD AND SAINT MARKS—REV. ALLAN W. SMITHERS, B. A.

It shall be my earnest endeavour in this report to give the Diocesan Church Society the true status of this large and growing Mission.

At the outset I would say that we admit the crime of being young; we can point to no long line of saintly rectors — no valuable Glebe — no comfortable endowment — in a word we have no grand historic past. Our work is in the present;

our hope in the future. This Mission includes the Parishes of Waterford and St. Marks, in which there are two churches, one mission room, and five outposts or stations to serve. I am glad to be able to report that all the public services of the church are well attended, and that the outlook for this year is encouraging.

Last autumn, Bishop Kingdon visited the parish and confirmed thirty-one candidates, 11 at Waterford and 20 at Jeffries' Corner. Most of those confirmed have, I am happy to say, become regular communicants.

In both parishes the Sunday-schools are doing good work. During the year we have added three teachers to our staff; and there has been a most gratifying increase in the number of scholars. The children are publicly catechized once a month.

The women of the church have done most nobly this year. We have now two well organized Guilds — one in each parish. By dint of hard work these sewing-circles have raised during the year about \$50 for church purposes.

The Women's Aid Association has greatly strengthened our hands by a grant of \$20 towards completing the church of All Saints, Jeffries' Corner, in the Parish of St. Marks.

I have also to acknowledge with deep gratitude the gift of a set of Silver Holy Vessels, from friends of the Mission in England.

In conclusion I think it only just to mention that the assessment hangs very heavily upon us. We are assessed almost \$300 and so far have only \$250 on our subscription list. The tidings that our assessment might possibly be increased this year has created quite a panic among my church wardens and vestry. It is all very well to call the assessment a voluntary contribution — but to our minds it seems far more like a voluntary *compulsion*.

Perhaps it may be of some interest to this Society to learn that early in last March, the old church lot at the Upper Corner was, upon formal demand, quietly surrendered to the corporation of St. Marks — thus avoiding a tedious and costly lawsuit, and bringing the war for the Holy Land to a close. With commendable forgetfulness our attorney, Dr. C. W. Weldon, has failed to present us with a bill of expenses. It is unnecessary to add that as a people we are determined not to be outdone in forgetfulness. Dr. Weldon has earned, and enjoys, the warmest thanks of the Mission.

WELDFORD — REV. A. A. SLIPPER.

I have been in this parish a little more than three months, consequently this, my first report, must be very brief.

There are two churches in this Mission, St. Paul's, the Parish Church, and St. Matthew's, in the Parish of Harcourt, where the house which is used as a rectory, is also situated. The house and St. Matthew's Church were built a few years ago by the Rev. H. Holloway.

There is a distance of about twelve miles between the two churches.

The people attending St. Paul's Church are very much scattered, and it is only in very fine weather that the congregations are large. The want of stability and loyalty to the church on the part of many is painful to think about. At St. Matthew's Church, Harcourt, we have a small congregation, but I am glad to say the greater part of them are very loyal church people.

Our services here are hearty, and since my advent into the parish the altar lights have been in use, in accordance with the wish of the founder of St. Matthew's Church, the Rev. H. Holloway, for some time Rector of this Parish, but now working in England.

WESTFIELD—REV. H. T. PARLEE, B. A.

During the year past the Church in this parish has met with serious loss in the death of some of its most prominent members. We have particularly to note in this connection Mr. and Mrs. William Burgess, who died within a month of each other, and Mr. Samuel Baxter. Mr. Burgess was for a number of years a vestryman of this parish. Mr. Baxter was also a vestryman, and in his section of the parish, a leading man both in the church and out of it. I might say that in the two years of my ministry in this parish I have buried five of my vestrymen. For some cause the people are rapidly leaving the parish and thus decimating the church. Our communicants' list has suffered in this way to the extent of about twenty-five per cent. On the other hand a number of persons are preparing for confirmation and the list will shortly be further increased.

Trinity church, at Land's End, has been brightened up very much this last year. The walls have been tinted, the woodwork re-painted and varnished, and a new organ stool, carpet and blinds, purchased and put in position. By the kind exertions of the school teacher, and others assisting, a neat fence has been put around the open sides of the grounds. We expect to paint the exterior after haying, as we have a small sum of money on hand with which to pay for the materials. The furnace placed in the rectory last year has proved satisfactory and is now nearly paid for.

WESTMORLAND — REV. D. M. BLISS, B. A.

I forward the Diocesan Church Society returns from this parish, the amount, I am happy to say, is somewhat in excess of that reported last year. If the Society can spare not less than two dozen and a half reports I would be able perhaps to do better another year.

WICKLOW AND WILMOT—REV. J. E. FLEWELLING.

For several reasons I can render a very satisfactory report. First, I am thankful to report that through the goodness of our Heavenly Father I have been in such comparatively good health for the past year that my work has been done with greater satisfaction to myself, and also I trust, to my parishioners. I have not made as many parochial visits as usual, but that will be remedied this year, if my health continues to improve.

I am also in a position to report much activity among laymen, and improvements in and around both churches. Thanks to willing workers the S. S. at Centreville remains *evergreen*, and good work has been done. Superintendent Lee is hardly ever absent from his place in S. S., and the Librarian, Mrs. R. Wilmot Balloch, performs her duties faithfully, teaching a class also and often questioning the whole school, to the pleasure and satisfaction of all. Mrs. Geo. W. White teaches the infant class and is almost always present every Sunday. Miss Lydia R. Merritt who teaches a class, has always cheerfully performed her work, willingly acting as organist. We are all indebted to Miss Lizzie Bull and Miss Morehouse for



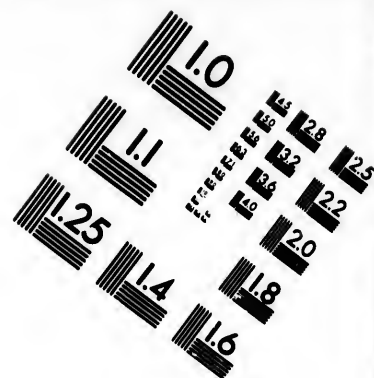
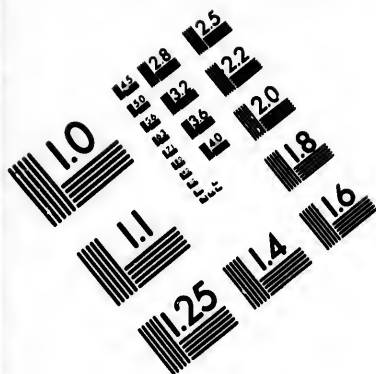
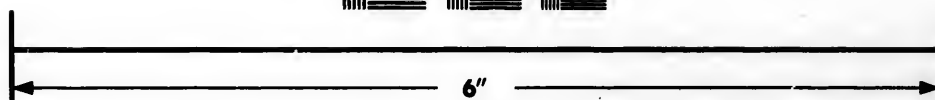
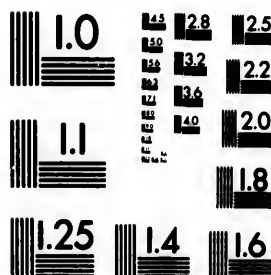


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assistance rendered to the regular teachers of S. S. during their visits in our village.

Mrs. A. P. Ritchie with willing assistants, keeps up the interest for summer months in the Sunday-school at Greenfield.

The ladies at Centreville have been very successful as a sewing guild, in raising sufficient money to purchase a furnace, which will be put under St. James' Church before the cold weather sets in.

During the year I have lost the help of an earnest worker in church matters, a warm personal friend, and a liberal subscriber to the funds of the D. C. S., in the death of Stephen S. Wiggins. Our loss is doubtless his gain. Very interesting services have been held during the past year at East instead of West Florenceville, Mrs. John R. Tompkins very cheerfully acting as organist. Services have been held once in four weeks regularly, and frequently extra services have been given them, and it is pleasing to report that services have been fairly well attended, and that the organist has never missed a service. As soon as the B. H. M. sends a missionary to Aberdeen, I shall cheerfully yet regretfully relinquish this work into his hands, and confine myself to the Parishes of Wicklow and Wilmot. The ladies are at present collecting for D. C. S. and I hope to forward as much this year as last to the Treasurer of the D. C. S.

In conclusion I regret to have to report a loss financially to the Mission by the departure of many persons to the West. Notwithstanding the loss of many dollars, by subscribers leaving us, report reaches our ears that the Mission must stand an additional assessment. It is hard even if it is fair. If the B. H. M. had not won for itself in the past a record for dealing honestly and fairly with our Missions, we might be tempted to think that the Board was going to force our Mission to perform duties which many of us think are beyond what should fairly be demanded of us.

WOODSTOCK, WAKEFIELD AND NORTHAMPTON— REV. CANON NEALES, M. A.

Woodstock—The occasion of the greatest interest in the past year was the celebration of our centennial on October 23rd—the hundredth anniversary of the ordination at Halifax by Bishop Charles Inglis of the Rev. Frederick Dibblee, first

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rector of this parish. At the same time his Lordship the Bishop Coadjutor administered the holy rite of confirmation to sixteen persons in St. Luke's church. At Benton he consecrated St. Mary's church, and in the afternoon of the same day, Oct. 28th, confirmed four persons. The services throughout the whole centennial commemoration were of a most interesting and encouraging nature, due in large measure to the presence and kind assistance of many clergy who in past years had been connected in some way with the parish. Our great regret, however, throughout all, was the absence of our beloved Bishop, the Metropolitan, to whom our parish owes a debt of fatherly kindness continued to it for nearly half of the century.

Benton lying partly in Canterbury and partly in Woodstock, the Rev. C. A. S. Warneford shares the duty there with me, and the members of the church greatly enjoy having a house of God in which to render to Him a reverent and hearty worship.

Wakefield—Regular Sunday services have been held in St. Peter's church—though now only every fortnight; and none now at Victoria Corner since I have no assistant.

Northampton—Regular monthly services on Thursday evenings have been held during the past year in a school room, for as yet we are without any church building.

I regret to say that since January I have been without any assistant, greatly, I fear, to the detriment of the mission as a whole; for, though I never have less than three or four services each Sunday, and constant parochial duty through the week, there is necessarily much work needing to be done. I am looking forward to the assistance of a divinity student of King's College, Windsor, during vacation, and I hope before that time expires to have the prospect of more permanent help.

CONCLUSION.

The foregoing reports of the work of the Society's missionaries will be found to display the lights and shadows which characterize all human efforts.

The record is indeed one of much faithful work pursued at times amid many difficulties and discouragements. Yet

there are not wanting cheering indications that increased earnestness and a growth in spiritual things are evident on the part of the people. It is true that year by year the annual reports of the clergy have mourned the departure of many of the most active and zealous members of the church to new homes where their temporal prospects were thought to be more promising, and the recent census returns have shown that the reports of our Missionaries respecting the losses sustained by the church through emigration were all too true. It is therefore cheering to record the fact that although the church has in the way referred to lost some of her most valued members and several Missions have been temporarily closed, nevertheless the number of communicants returned for the year ending January 1st, 1892, was 6,878, the largest number returned in any one year in the history of the Diocese.

We have had the pleasure of welcoming into the Diocese during the past year many new workers, and we are thankful to say the ranks of the clergy have not been broken by the death of any of their number. We have, however, to mourn the loss of many of the most devoted laymen, amongst whom it is fitting to make mention of three prominent members of the executive committee of the Society, viz.: the late Mr. T. W. Daniel, the late Mr. R. T. Olin and the late Mr. R. P. Starr, whose memories will long be held in grateful remembrance and whose places both in the church and in society at large it will indeed be difficult to fill.

Mr. G. A. Schofield, on behalf of the committee appointed to secure a suitable room in St. John for the meetings of committees and similar purposes, reported that two rooms had been secured in Pugsley's building at \$125.00 a year. The rent to include lighting, heating, attendance of janitor, etc. The committee in charge of the rooms proposed to notify all the Clergy of the Diocese that the rooms are at their service as offices whenever they desire to use them if they are not at the time required for meetings.

The committee recommended that the Treasurer be instructed to pay the rent quarterly out of the contingent fund of the Society, and that the bill of Messrs. J. & J. D. Howe for chairs and tables be paid. The Society is indebted to Bishop Kingdon for the loan of several maps for the rooms, and the committee suggested the desirability of procuring a

On motion of Mr. Schofield, seconded by Mr. G. E. Fairweather, the report was adopted and the recommendations ordered to be carried out.

The committee on the Needs of the Diocese were authorized by the Executive Committee to print and circulate one or more occasional papers.

The Printing Committee reported that Barnes & Co.'s tender being the lowest submitted for the printing of the Annual Report of the Society, had been accepted. The reports had been printed to the satisfaction of the committee, and are being forwarded to the Clergy for distribution amongst the subscribers to the funds of the Society.

It was on motion

Resolved, That the bill of Barnes & Co., for printing and distributing the report, be paid.

The Printing Committee reported that they had conferred with the leading publishers of St. John, to ascertain the practicability of having the earlier numbers of the Society's Annual Reports reprinted in accordance with the terms of the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Executive Committee, but could find no publisher willing to undertake the work under the proposed conditions. Messrs. J. & A. McMillan had offered to print 300 copies of the earlier reports at the rate of \$14 per sheet of 16 pages.

The Secretary reported that in accordance with a resolution passed at the last meeting of the Executive Committee, twenty sets of the Reports of the Society, beginning with the year 1885, had been bound, and the volumes placed in the hands of the Treasurer for sale at \$1 per volume.

The Treasurer presented and read the quarterly balance sheet, which was, on motion, received and placed on file. The Treasurer was, on motion, requested to add the sum of \$500 to the capital account of the Incapacitated Clergy Fund, and \$500 to the capital account of the education of the children of the

Clergy Fund in accordance with the rules governing these Funds. The Treasurer was also authorized to transfer the sum of \$1.84 from Object III. account to the Contingent Fund account.

Mr. C. A. Macdonald presented a report from the Special Committee appointed to assist the Treasurer in the apportionment of the various sums, arising from the sale of Glebe lands, to the parishes for which the Society holds them in trust as follows :—

The Committee have examined with the Treasurer of the Society the receipts and disbursements in connection with the Glebe lands, in the different parishes, and find that an item of \$20.40 charged against the Parish of Dumfries, was the payment made for a special report of the condition of the church lands in this parish made during the month of December, 1888, and should be paid out of the general funds of the Society. The committee therefore request that an order may be made for this amount to be paid by the Treasurer out of the general funds and placed to the credit of the Trust account.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. Geo. A. Schofield, it was

Resolved, That the report be adopted, and that the Treasurer be authorized to credit the Glebe Land Trust account with the sum of \$20.40, and call upon the Church Wardens of Dumfries to repay this amount to the Society out of the income of said lands.

The Secretary read a letter from the Rev. James Neales, conveying his grateful acknowledgment of the two resolutions passed at the last anniversary meeting of the Society, with reference to the decease of his sons, the late Rev. William Stirling Neales, and the late Rev. Henry Huntley Neales.

The Committee on 23rd February last made an investment of \$13,000 of the General Funds of the Society in a mortgage on the valuable property on the corner of King and Germain Streets, St. John, belonging to the estate of the late Stephen K. Foster, \$2,000 repayable in two years, and the remainder in five years, at 5% per annum interest.

As the Treasurer had not sufficient funds in hand for so large a loan, the Committee thought it best to dispose of some of the Debentures of the Society, which were either about to fall due, or were only yielding 4%.

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APPENDIX F.

Report of the Board of Home Missions for the year
ending 30th June, 1892.

*To the Rt. Rev. the Lord Bishop and the General Committee
of the Diocesan Church Society.*

The Board of Home Missions submit the following report:

During the past year the following alterations have been made in the grants passed by the General Committee last July:

Albert.—The contribution required was reduced to \$160, which sum the Board were assured could be subscribed at once if a Missionary could be sent. No arrangements have been made as yet for anyone to take up the work and the grant has not been used.

Cumbridge.—The figures on the schedule passed by the General Committee last July were not correct. The Board substituted for the grant \$354, and income from glebe \$346, which were the amounts previously agreed upon.

Dalhousie.—The sum required was reduced to \$350.

Grand Manan.—Acting upon the report of a deputation, the Board reduced the amount of contribution required to \$300.

Grand Falls and Madawaska.—This mission has been divided and two grants have been made. The mission of Grand Falls now embraces Grand Falls, Four Falls or Ortonville, and Limestone, the last named being in the Diocese of Maine. The total contribution from these places is \$440, and the Bishop of Maine makes a grant of \$100. The grant from the D. C. S. is \$780.

The mission of Madawaska includes Edmundston and St. Francis. The contribution is \$300 and the grant \$780.

This arrangement involves the increase of \$365 over what it would have cost to maintain the missions united. But there are two clergymen living and working in the missions, and a very great deal more work is carried on than was possible under the old plan. Besides that, the Board felt that the re-arrangement could not be delayed if the Church was to deal satisfactorily with the growing needs of Edmundston.

Petersville.—The contribution required was reduced to \$300.

Petitcodiac.—In view of the fact that this mission had been so long vacant, and thereby the difficulty of making up the required amount was greatly increased, the Board thought it wise to agree to the request of the people to reduce the sum to \$300 for one year.

Richibucto.—This old parish has again come on to the D. C. S. list as an aided mission. A deputation from the parish came to lay their case before the Board, and later on a deputation from the Board visited the parish. Acting upon the recommendation of that deputation the Board made a grant of \$580, conditional upon a contribution of \$396. This grant was only made, however, upon the distinct assurance that it would only be required for a short period, and because the need seemed very urgent.

In view of the steady reduction in the S. P. G. grant it will not be possible for the D. C. S. to continue the same grants to the old missions if the new work is to be assisted as it requires.

St. Martins.—Acting upon the recommendation of a deputation that visited this mission the contribution from the mission was reduced \$50 for the first half year. Since then the payment has been on the schedule of July last.

Vacant Missions.—There are at present 6 vacant missions, viz., Aberdeen, Albert, Bathurst, Bay Verte, Canning, and Simonds. Last year 13 were reported vacant.

Divinity Scholarship Fund.—\$100 of the income of this fund was granted to Mr. G. F. Scovil, divinity scholar at Kings College, Windsor. \$75 was also paid to the late Mr. G. B. Roberts on account of the grant made to him for this year.

Deputations.—Deputations from the Board have visited the missions of Grand Manan, McAdam and Vanceboro, Petitcodiac, Richibucto, and St. Martins.

Parsonage Houses.—Grants on the usual terms have been made to complete the parsonage houses in Cambridge and Fairville.

Committee on the needs of the Diocese.—Under authority of the General Committee the Board appointed a committee on this subject, and the report is attached hereto.

Annual statement for S. P. G.—The Board submit herewith a copy of the statistical statement furnished to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel for the year 1891. Returns were not received from ten missions, but eight of them were vacant. The return shows an increase of 98 in communicants, and of 29 baptized, and a decrease of 19 confirmed.

Financial Statement.—The Board regret to say that several self-supporting Parishes have given much less than was anticipated, and four, viz. : Sackville, Portland, Trinity Mission (St. Stephen), and Shediac have not contributed anything to the Society. As will be seen from the following statement the whole amount received from self-supporting missions is \$1,033 less than was expected.

In April last the Board made an estimate of what would be required for the coming year to maintain the present work, and it seemed then that \$700 more would be required than we had in 1891-92.

A letter was sent to each of the Rural Deaneries informing them of this, and asking for advice as to whether any better division of this amount could be made than a requirement of \$10 more from each mission.

To this the Deanery of Chatham replied that they would endeavour to raise \$90 more next year, being \$10 for each Mission in the Deanery.

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The Deanery of Fredericton submitted a division of the \$90 required which they had agreed to.

The Deanery of Kingston undertook to raise the \$130 required as a voluntary contribution, on condition that the grants were not changed.

The Deanery of St. Andrews has not sent any reply.

The Deanery of St. John replied that they could not recommend any definite course.

The Deanery of Shediac replied that, while they would make every effort to increase the contribution they could not pledge themselves to any fixed sum.

The Deanery of Woodstock has not sent any reply.

After this letter from the Board had gone out to the Deaneries the S. P. G. gave notice of a reduction of £250 stg., over \$1,200, in their grant for 1893.

The Board have sent to the Society through the Bishop Coadjutor a strong remonstrance against this large and most unexpected withdrawal — pointing out to the Venerable Society that £200 out of the proposed grant of £1,000 has to be taken for pensions which the Society guaranteed their older Missionaries and £100 had been given to new work at the special request of the Society three years ago. These deductions only leave £700 for the ordinary use of the Diocese. In case it is too late to alter the terms of the grant now made the Society has been asked to make a special grant of £150 for some of the new work of the Diocese which cannot otherwise be provided for. In the hope that this appeal will be successful and in order that as much time as possible may be given for the Diocese to assume this additional responsibility, the Board have prepared and submit herewith a schedule that adds only ten dollars to each Mission with a few exceptions. Of course, if the S. P. G. declines to make any alteration there will not be funds sufficient to re-open all the missions now closed; but that can be dealt with by the new Board as occasion requires during the year. In the meantime every Parish or Mission must prepare to do more each year if the work of the church in the Diocese is to be maintained.

The estimate of income and expenditure for next year and the returns and minutes of business of last year accompany this report.

Report of the Committee on the Needs of the Diocese.

To the Right Reverend the Chairman of the Board of Home Missions:

Your Committee on the Needs of the Diocese beg leave to submit the following report:

On September 15, 1891, in accordance with a summons sent out by His Lordship Bishop Kingdon, the Committee consisting of the following members: Revs. Canon Brigstocke, C. P. Hanington, and H. Montgomery, and Messrs. Geo. A. Schofield, J. S. Beek and E. J. Wetmore, was organized at Sussex, Bishop Kingdon acting as chairman. At this meeting a sub-committee was appointed consisting of Revs. C. P. Hanington, H. Montgomery and G. A. Schofield, Esq., to arrange for appointment of Deanery Committees to form a plan of meetings in the various Deaneries. After correspondence with the Rural Deans, Committees were appointed in each Deanery. The following synopsis of work done in connection with your Committee is made up from reports received from the various Deaneries.

Deanery of Chatham.—Canon Forsyth, Chairman. Meetings have been arranged for in each Parish, and six meetings have already been held, and on the whole have been well attended, and more than ordinary interest awakened in the work and needs of the Church.

Deanery of Fredericton.—Rev. H. Montgomery, Chairman. Meetings have been arranged for in the various Parishes. Three meetings have been held and three are arranged to be held in the month of June.

Deanery of Kingston.—Rev. H. W. Little, Chairman. No report.

Deanery of Shediac.—Rev. J. Roy Campbell, Chairman. Successful meetings have been held in various parts of the Deanery.

Deanery of St. Andrews.—Rev. O. S. Newnham, Chairman. The chairman reports that no arrangement could be made for holding meetings. But suggests that if a good man could be obtained to preach missionary sermons to Sunday congregations, the purpose of your Committee would be accomplished.

Deanery of St. John.—Rev. Canon Brigstocke, Chairman. The chairman reports that he twice summoned a meeting of the Deanery Committee, but they failed to attend.

Deanery of Woodstock.—Rev. Canon Neales, Chairman. The chairman reports that the Clergy of the Deanery were consulted and meetings were arranged for, except in the Parish of Andover: and that the Rev. Scovil Neales was appointed as a deputation to address the meetings.

From these reports it will be seen that on the whole a larger number of meetings have been held this year than usual, and that where they have been held considerable interest has been awakened and enthusiasm aroused in the work and needs of the Church. Your Committee have found that the plan adopted this year in arranging for meetings has worked very satisfactorily, especially in the country Parishes.

Under authority obtained from the Executive Committee, your Committee issued an occasional paper, giving an account of the work being done in the Parishes of Gordon and Lorne, and circulated the same throughout the Diocese.

APPENDIX G.

Report of the Committee on Interesting Sunday-schools in Home Missions and on Promotion of Sunday-schools.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Fredericton and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick :

Your Committee on Interesting Sunday-schools in Home Missions and on the Promotion of Sunday-schools beg leave to submit the following report:

During the year past your Committee have endeavoured to bring before the children of the Diocese the need for increased offerings, especially during the season of Lent, so as to aid the Diocesan Church Society in making grants to Missions not yet supplied, to this end a paper was put forth by your Committee on behalf of the Mission of Albert setting forth need of providing for the spiritual wants of this altogether too long neglected Mission. The children were not asked to contribute directly towards assisting this Mission, but were so informed as to its condition and needs, that it might be hoped that their offerings this year to the General Fund of the Church Society would be so increased that the Board of Home Missions might feel enabled to take the necessary steps towards having work again begun in Albert County.

Lenten Boxes were issued in response to demands for the same, and the following returns from the same have been received. In some instances, however, the offerings have been devoted to other purposes than the General Purposes Fund of the Church Society:

APPENDIX H.

Report of the Book Depository Committee.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society :

The Book Depository Committee of the Local Branch of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their Eighth Annual Report:

Sales.—The sales of publications up to time of stock taking, May 1st, amounted to \$494.71.

Importations.—Several importations have been made this year, and our stock is now fully replete with Church, Library, Sunday-school and Parochial requisites, and we can now supply any of the books and tracts advertised in the Circular sent to the Clergy in Lent.

Dawn of Day.—Notwithstanding the fact that three Parishes gave up the circulation of this useful Parochial magazine, its circulation has increased. The Committee in charge of this department have increased the size of the magazine, and with this year's issue present each subscriber with a beautiful colored engraving of the Holy Family. Back numbers for 1892 can still be had on application to the Secretary.

Depository.—The Committee would once more draw the attention of the Clergy, and others interested to the advantages which a Depository like the S. P. C. K. affords for supplying or replenishing either a Clergyman's, Sunday-school or Parochial Library. The books upon its catalogues are supplied far cheaper than they can be obtained from any local bookseller, no matter how generous he may be in the way of discounts.

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We are asked by the Parent Society to bring before your notice, "The Colonial Church History Series."

Histories.—The History of the Church in Eastern Canada and Newfoundland, by the Rev. J. Langtry, is now ready—price 75 cents. A few are in stock, and the Secretary will be pleased to receive orders for the next importation.

A new supply of library books, Sunday-school requisites, tracts, etc., has just arrived, also a further supply of Lane's Illustrated Church Histories. Two Vols. 25 cents each.

The Official Year Book for 1892, is also now in stock.

Your Committee have once more to express regret that the Depository does not receive that support from the Clergy and Church people generally, that it deserves.

The sales are not what they should be, the Clergy seem to pass the Depository by and to be willing to pay more for the same article at the local booksellers, and yet the Society has the greatest claim upon their patronage, it deserves our grateful support.

The Church in this Diocese as in every other owes a great deal to the Venerable Society, and its work deserves at our hands a hearty co-operation.

We all think of the Society when we want money or free libraries, but we seem to forget it when we have money to spend or to give.

There are very few Parishes in the Diocese where the Society has not given assistance.

Many of our Churches to-day would not have been built had it not been for the generous and timely aid of the S. P. C. K.

Many a Sunday-school would have been without requisites or libraries, and many Churches without Service Books, if the S. P. C. K. had not provided them.

Our Clergy have had their hands strengthened, their minds relieved, their work supported, and encouraged to renewed efforts by the timely and generous Free Grants of Literature, and Liberal Donations of money from the Society.

Grants for 1891-1892.—The Diocese again this year must feel deeply indebted to the Society for further proofs of its interest in the Church's Work in New Brunswick. Since our last report grants of money have been made, and free and partial grants of libraries to the following Parishes:

NEWCASTLE AND NELSON.—REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

It is with a feeling of deep thankfulness to Almighty God that I am able to report to the Society a year of uninterrupted and successful work in the two missions which now form my charge. The services in both of my churches have been held as usual, and the attendance has been good. According to my present arrangement I have four services every Sunday, with an additional one once a month. The Sunday-schools in connection with both parishes have given signs of progress, and I am inclined to think that much good is being accomplished in this important department of church work.

St. Mark's church, Nelson, has more than justified its erection. It has been the means of gathering together a good and, as I fondly hope, permanent congregation, and the little band of faithful communicants is steadily increasing. In connection with this church I have to acknowledge two very handsome presents which have come into use during the past year: the first a very nice and suitable set of communion plate, from the English firm of Messrs. Wippell & Co., kindly given by Mrs. Geo. Burchill, Sr., of Birch Hill; they were used for the first time at our Easter communion, and we did not forget to pray on that occasion for God's continuous blessing upon the generous donor. The second gift referred to is a banner for the lectern, very handsomely worked by Miss Lou Harley, and given by her to the church; it very appropriately came into use on Trinity Sunday, and adds considerably to the general effect of the interior. The building is yet unpainted, but a little bird has whispered something to me, and unless the oracle gives forth a wrong sound, I shall be in a position to report this as done when another year has gone by. The bell has not come yet! What is the matter friends? There is no burying ground in connection with St. Mark's, and we have already felt the want of one; perhaps at no very distant period we shall be able to supply even this.

Good work has also been done in Newcastle, chief among which I must mention the building of a much-needed shed at the rectory, and the erection of a substantial new fence around the Sunday-school lot. The money for the former

was raised by the indefatigable labours of our Young Women's Guild, and that for the latter by the teachers of the Sunday-school.

In accordance with medical advice, repeatedly expressed, I am about to take a year's rest and change in England. Both the Bishop and my Vestry have done all in their power to enable me to carry this advice into effect. I leave the mission in charge of the Rev. W. Herbert Smythe, of the diocese of Ontario, who comes to the parish strongly recommended by his Bishop and several of his brother clergy. My sojourn in the mother country will be rendered more agreeable and happy by knowing that I leave my "few sheep"—few but precious—in the pastoral care of one in whom I have full confidence, and who will feed them, I have every reason in believing, with food convenient for them. May God's blessing rest abundantly upon the members of both congregations, and, if it be His will, bring us once more together.

Before closing this report it is only right that I should inform your Society that a missionary meeting was held in St. Andrew's Sunday-school hall on the 17th of last May. The Revds. Canon Brigstocke and Forsyth were the speakers on that occasion, and, although from local reasons the attendance was small, still I cannot but hope and believe that the earnest addresses then delivered will have their fruit in a more generous and intelligent interest in the work of the Diocesan Church Society.

SHEDIAC.—REV. C. E. MACKENZIE.

Progress, quiet but steady, is the watchword from Shediac. The services have been regularly maintained and well attended. The list of communicants is still increasing, and on Christmas and Easter a larger number partook of the sacred mysteries than ever before in the history of the parish. A notable event was the reading at the Easter meeting of a letter from Mr. Justice Hanington on behalf of himself and the rest of the family of late Hon. Daniel Hanington offering a bell of not less than 1,000 lbs. as a memorial to their father, provided a suitable spire and tower were built to contain it. The meeting was highly gratified with this generous and timely offer, and at once appointed a committee to build the required tower and spire.

To the kindness of Judge Hanington we also owe a debt of gratitude for the welcome illustrated S. S. papers which he has supplied to the children of his native parish for over a year. *O si sic omnes!*

St. Alban's church, Cocaigue, has been carpeted in the sanctuary, and a new fence has been placed around St. Andrew's church lot.

A subscription list for the D. C. S. which will amount to nearly \$75.00 has been circulating, and about one-half has been paid in.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

As one means of increasing the contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable.

The plan of Weekly Offerings upon the Envelope System has been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope, at the services on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan the following objects are sought to be accomplished:

1. That not only heads of families, but *all in the Parish*, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute *according to their ability* to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible, at the appointed time, *bring their pledged Weekly Offerings to Church*, instead of paying them at the call of the collector.

[NOTE.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A FORTNIGHT, or at any other stated period within the quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrears and debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be *materially increased*, so that mainly from this source sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be generally adopted.
