CRITICIZES THE GOVERNMENT FOR THE INSUFFICIENCY OF TROOPS
Supplied to Lord Kitchener—Speech Approved by Opposition Benches—255 Boers Corralled
DEWEY MUST BE ENERGETICALLY DEALT WITH
It is Expected That When the Fresh Troops From Australia and Canada Arrive in South Africa Military Operations Will Be Greatly Expedited.
London, Jan. 21.—Winston Churchill (Conservative), in resuming the debate in the House of Commons to-day on the amendment moved by Frederick Cayley (Liberal) to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne at the opening of parliament, gained the distinct approval of the opposition benches by his criticism of the government's shortcomings in regard to the conduct of the war in South Africa, the insufficiency of the troops supplied to Lord Kitchener, and other matters. He said he preferred a settlement by compromise rather than by force, as the latter would entail the tremendous expense of long military operations.

SHOT THRU THE BRAIN.
Fatal Shooting Accident for a Quebecer.
St. Leonard, Que., Jan. 21.—Joseph Hebert, wood merchant of this locality, met with a fatal shooting accident to-day. He, in company with three others, was hunting about two miles from this village. They divided into two parties and were met at a given point. After they met they were discussing the best methods for pursuing game, when a gun in the hands of Joseph Leblanc was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering the brain of Mr. Hebert, resulting in his instant death. He was the eldest of five children. An inquest was held this afternoon and a verdict was rendered in accordance with the law.

NO MORE FLAG INCIDENTS.
Canada and United States Agree Not to Display the Flag.
Washington, Jan. 21.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Spaulding, acting on the suggestion of the State, has directed that official flags in future should not be displayed by United States customs officials at the British North America. Some time last summer a Canadian customs flag was forcibly removed by Americans from a building occupying the site of the former United States consulate at St. John's, Newfoundland. This incident led to a correspondence which resulted in an agreement between the United States and Canada, neither should display its flag in the territory of the other.

Its full dress when walking out will be found a trifle too expensive to be maintained for long, besides which the incongruity of a full dress uniform and a cap will be obvious to all. Most military men will be puzzled to find a reason for the men not being allowed to wear their working dresses when in the streets. For accounts they are to be smart and soldierly, and above all, comfortable. As the instructions stand at present, it seems as though in a short time we shall find a portion of the men who have intention of it, according to the original intention of the Board of Trade, the soldier with three distinct uniforms, full dress for ceremonial purposes, the present uniform for walking in, and the new service dress for working in.

As regards the new pattern cap to be supplied with this dress, the instructions concerning it are not very clear, so that we cannot say quite what it will look like. The instructions on this point are as follows: "Head-dress—A hat of thick felt with high brim, the sides perforated about 1/2-in. from the top with two rows of ventilating holes. Ventilation is also provided for the head band, and clips are provided for fastening up the brim." What shape the cap is actually to be cannot quite gather from the instructions, but it is only intended to be worn in the field, and, perhaps, is not of very great importance.

The address was signed by President Ames and the secretary, Paul Jarvis. The address was accompanied by a cheque amounting to over \$1000. Messrs. Edward Gurney, J. F. Ellis, Hugh Blair, A. E. Kemp, M.P., J. L. Spink, M. C. Ellis and Barlow Campbell made short addresses, testifying to the general regard caused by the resignation of Mr. Willis, in which he regretted severing his connection with the board, and urged that the prohibition question be given serious consideration by the business men.

Cheers were given to Mr. Willis, and the gathering sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Controller George McMurrich, C. B. Watts and James L. Love were appointed scrutineers. The elections will take place next Tuesday afternoon. The Grain Section of the Board of Trade held their annual meeting yesterday afternoon, at which the following officers were elected: Chairman, C. B. Watts; vice-chairman, J. C. McKee; committee, John Carrick, Ophias Good, C. W. Baird, John Melday and Robert Harris, secretary, Paul Jarvis.

The retiring chairman, John Carrick, in his annual report, reviewed the crop of the past year, which had been very satisfactory. The South African war had caused a good market for oats. The report regretted the increase of the pea bug, and suggested that the legislature should make some effort to do away with it. Until the pest was stopped, it would be advisable to stop growing peas. It was also recommended that representation be made to the proper authorities with a view to obtaining exemption from duties on straw used for bedding for the army.

House of Industry. The monthly board meeting of the House of Industry was held yesterday afternoon. Rev. John Gillespie, president, the superintendent's report showed that there were 163 inmates in the house. During the month 18 were admitted, 14 left and 7 died. One hundred and fifty convalescents were given lodgings for a total of 1219 nights. The treasurer's report showed an overdraft of \$854.97. Among those present were Rev. J. J. McCann, A. Hart, Arch MacMurphy, Warring Kennedy, Henry O'Hara, John Aitken, H. D. Canton, Beverley Jones, T. R. Whiteside, J. H. Patterson, John Price and Robert Little.

His Resignation in Order. Mr. Rust's report on the working of the electric plant at the City Hall is strongly commendatory of Engineer Dixon and the test made by him some time ago. If the figures produced by Mr. Rust are reliable—and there is no reason to doubt them—their accuracy is beyond a doubt. In view of what has occurred, it would seem to be no other alternative than to ask for Mr. Dixon's resignation. The official is quite incompetent for the duties of engineer, and his appointment to the position was an imposition upon the city. And there are others, too.

FIRST STEP TOWARDS MUNICIPALIZATION

The use of the electrical machinery in the civic buildings for the production of light is a step in the right direction. The Engineer shows that the city will save a large amount annually by making its own light instead of purchasing it from the Toronto Electric Light Co. This ought to be a small electric plant at the waterworks pumping house, for a start of light to the Island. We already have a number of engineers at the waterworks pumping house, and it would cost very little more to produce the light than is required for the Island. The next thing to keep in view is the production of light for the illumination of our streets. We now pay the Electric Light Company \$100,000 a year for this service. There is no doubt that the same amount of money spent in maintaining a municipal lighting plant would give us a much more efficient service. The starting of the plant in the City Hall and the installation of an electric generator at the Island pumping house are primary steps in the direction of general municipalization, and it is to be hoped that the aldermen who sympathize with this movement will be on the alert to see that the results obtainable under municipal control are not quibbled by parties favorable to the franchise corporations.

GRADED RURAL SCHOOLS

If the scheme of education which Sir William McDonald has in view is a meritorious one, there is no reason why the Province of Ontario should wait until the gentleman has put it in force before experimenting along the same line itself. Ontario is large enough and wealthy enough to do a little original work in the line of education in its own behalf. The world some few months ago referred to a new educational idea and we think the Minister of Education could very reasonably take up the suggestion and put it into practice in one or more sections of this province. The suggestion referred to was the centralization of education in each township by the erection of a centrally equipped graded school at a central point, the abolishing of the one-roomed schoolhouse and the conveyance of the children of the whole township to the graded school by means of an efficiently organized bus or wagon service. This method has been adopted in not a few counties in the United States, and it has given eminent satisfaction. It is lit-

NEW DRESS REGULATIONS

Military Mail: The Army Orders dated Jan. 1 include the long-expected regulations for the new service uniform for the army. PRIVATE BILLS PRESENTED.

Yesterday Was Last Day for Introducing Them, and Accordingly There Was a Rush.

AN EXPLANATION BY MR. GIBSON

Of Work of Committee That Went Over Imperial Statutes in Force in Ontario.

The reading of prohibition petitions, about 50 in number, the introduction of private bills, it being the last day for receiving them, and the Attorney-General's explanation of the work done by the committee that had charge of the compilation of the Imperial statutes, constituted the business before the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

When the House opens this afternoon, Premier Ross will deliver his budget speech. He said on Monday that it would not be a lengthy one. Col. Matheson, the opposition's financial critic, will reply.

TO OPPOSE GAS LEGISLATION

Council Will Be Asked by Legislation Committee to Fight Proposed Settlement.

WHEN IT REACHES LEGISLATURE

Resolution Passed Unanimously—What the Mayor Thinks of Committee's Action.

The gas question was brought before the Legislation and Reception Committee yesterday afternoon by Controller London, who moved that the committee recommend that the Council instruct the Corporation Counsel and City Solicitor to oppose any legislation which may be applied for to confirm any settlement of the present litigation with the Consumers' Gas Company until the same has been considered by the Council.

"Somebody will call that mutiny," said Ald. Curry.

"If that special meeting we have asked for isn't called, this is the best way to bring the matter before the Council," said Monday," said Ald. London.

The motion was carried unanimously without any further discussion.

His Worship said that the draft of the application for legislation in regard to the settlement of the gas suit would be ready and would be gone over by the solicitors at a conference to-day.

"Will it be ready for the Board of Control meeting to-day, or for the Council?" His Worship was asked.

"Now you can't reasonably expect a draft to go thru as quick as that. Doubtless some minor changes may be necessary."

"Can the Council rescind the action of the old Council endorsing the terms of the proposed settlement?"

"This Council may do so, but I do not anticipate it," said His Worship, who pointed out, however, that a two-thirds vote of the Council could upset the action of the last Council, also.

"However," said His Worship, "the Council will be a reflection on the action of the Executive of the Council, which had been endorsed by the Council."

The Mayor could not promise that the drafted bill would come up at the next meeting of the Council, but the matter will doubtless be discussed on the above recommendation of the Legislation Committee.

Lynch Amazes Gallery

BY WRITING OF LOYALTY

Favors Conciliation to Make Irish Soldiers Help England Out of Difficulties.

Dublin, Jan. 21.—The remarkable article in The New Liberal Review by Col. Arthur Lynch, newly elected member for Galway, is beginning to be discussed widely because of his failure to appear and claim his seat up by the general election.

Coming from the pen of a man whose election was won on the statement that he had fought against England with the Boers, the sentiments expressed in it are not what might be expected.

"The result of the election, Col. Lynch writes, has been a shock to Ireland, which has been more or less attached to England for centuries and under her wing since the days of Pitt, is more disconcerted than ever."

"And now Ireland is thereby united to the broad national issues. The party was never more compact nor more resolute in the palmy days of Parnell."

Col. Lynch enters into a discussion of the Irish question as affecting England's position in international politics. England's chief danger, he believes to be a European coalition, and he says Englishmen should know "such conditions are not more bogey to give us a moment's occasional fright at the breakfast table."

Again and again within the last few years, he says, the British Empire has been on the verge of being broken up by the continent to bring about a coalition of strength between France, Germany, and such a coalition would be by its nature, he says, a mortal enemy to England.

"Against even that coalition," continues Col. Lynch, "England would be very strong. One of the reasons is that she should settle her internal affairs so as not to be a lion's head against a bear's tail, and seek to make Ireland not a source of weakness, but a source of strength."

"A conciliatory policy to Ireland would therefore," he says, "have the effect of strengthening the British Empire, and so the British Empire would be the stronger for it."

Col. Lynch says, "Ireland would be a source of strength to England, and so the British Empire would be the stronger for it."

These Galway voters who expected to find Col. Lynch an extremist are somewhat surprised.

No Obstacles in Sight.

Ald. Spence said it was not yet too late to get a private bill through the legislature if the government would get it to the point of the fact that, although some of the members of the House of Commons are opposed to it, the Canadian side of the Niagara River, there was the distance from Lake Erie to the mouth of the Niagara River, and at any point it would supply abundant power.

He signed as he told of a new smelter now under construction near Buffalo, which would require 1000 to 2000 men to run it. Outside of Niagara Falls, he said he knew of other places. He is adjacent to Toronto where power was available, and he heartily agreed with Ald. Spence that many nuisances could be obviated. All he had to say was, "Get a hustle on and get something done."

He remarked that anything the Council decided upon in the direction of the power project, could well be a credit to the Council.

Ald. Urquhart and Chairman Ward expressed themselves as most heartily in accord with Ald. Spence's idea, and it goes on to the Council with the unanimous endorsement of the whole committee.
