



# The Halifax Visiting Dispensary.

# REPORTS, &C. FOR 1891.

The Annual meeting of the Halifax Visiting Dispensary was held Monday, Jan. 11th, 1892, President Silver, in the chair, who spoke of the continued usefulness and increased work of the institution, referring to it as one of the best in the city and most needed for the indigent class of the people.

#### DIRECTORS' REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST, 1891.

The return of the season for holding the yearly meeting of subscribers and well-wishers of the dispensary requires a briet report of its progress and position from the board of directors, in conjunction with the financial abstract of the honorary treasurer. While the board have but to manage the fiscal and prudential affairs they must refer to the more practical details of the work performed by the active medical staff (contained in their report annexed) as indicating the great usefulness of this established charity and the success which, under the blessing of divine Providence, has attended their labors on behalf of the sick poor at the institution and their homes.

#### THE FUNCTIONS OF THE DIRECTORS

are to appoint from year to year competent and suitable physicians and dispenser, to see that the necessary medical and surgical requirements are duly supplied and the building kept in good condition, to secure funds sufficient to meet current expenditure and know "that every man faithfully performs his duty." In the absence of any complaint and the existing position of the other matters mentioned, the directors consider that with the exception of funds the past compares most favorably with any previous year. Their natural desire that the treasurer should be supplied with sufficient funds to meet the ever increasing outlay caused by the gradual accession of applicants for treatment leads them to remark upon the apparent failure (in part) of the plan of a simultaneous collection in all the churches on a stated day each year, called "hospital" or rather "Dispensary Sunday."

#### DISPENSARY SUNDAY COLLECTIONS.

The result of these appeals for financial aid to the several ehurches in the city are that the special observances of the day was not unanimous and in some congregations the collections show a considerable falling off as compared with former years. The board would recommend to their successors in office, the adoption of some method by which the moral and financial results of Dispensary Sunday may be enhanced in su ceeding years. 0

#### THE DISPENSARY INDISPENSABLE.

The city cannot now do without such an institution, or have its utility hampered or limited through lack of means to maintain and extend its undertakings. Besides the larg - number of poor visited by the physicians daily, there are sometimes as many as 35 patients for treatment at the rooms, and from 65 to 75 prescriptions to be delivered. The Board beg to express thanks to all who have assisted in keeping up the interest of the public in this noble charity, or who have contributed otherwise.

#### MR. WILLIAM RHINDS' KIND GIFT.

They desire especially to record the voluntary action of Mr. Wm. Rhind, of this city, who has lately presented this corporation with a deed of the lot owned by him, adjoining the Dispensary on the east. By this generous gift the property is much improved, secured from deprivation of light, air and sanitary advantages which would be caused by a purchaser building thereon.

The Secretary will gladly supply anyone desiring to become a member of the corporation with the constitution, by-laws and regulations. A payment of \$4 a year constitutes members ip.

# REPORT OF MEDICAL STAFF.

The statistical report annexed shows a large increase in the number of cases treated in the

#### INDOOR DEPARTMENT

by the attending staff, the very great increase in the surgical and medical sections much outweighing a falling off in the department of women and children. The greatest increase is in the surgical room, and it is no doubt largely due to the increased efficiency as the result of the provision by the directors of much n eded instruments and apparatus. As a result it has been possible to undertake a number of cases of minor surgery, the treatment of which has been hitherto attended by inconvenience. Such minor cases as amputations of fingers and removal of small tumors can now very well be undertaken, and of course this is an advantage to the V. G. hospital, to which some of these cases would otherwise have to go, thus occupying the beds that might be occupied by more serious cases.

#### THE OUTDOOR DEPARTMENT.

In the outdoor department, north district No. 1. shows an increase of upwarks of 30 per cent. in the number of visits made, and south district of 20 per cent. The figures for the other districts do not call for special comment. The work for Dartmouth shows some decrease, perhaps partly accounted for by the absence for a time of Dr. Smith in England.

The visiting physicians have been called upon to treat a large number of cases of diphtheria, and as usual several cases of this disease were discovered among the inside patients.

#### WOMEN AND CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT.

The sphere of usefulness of the department of women any children has been limited, owing to the lack of certain instruments and appliances, and the directors will be asked to make a small provision for these articles. A prominent feature of the dispensary registers is the large proportion of patients who give Newfoundland as the place of their birth and recent residence.

#### TRIBUTE TO THE DISPENSER AND JANITRESS.

The medical staff have pleasure in stating their appreciation of the courtesy, regularity and general faithfulness of the dispenser. Mr. Lgurin. They have also reason to express their satisfaction with the way in which the janitress does her duty, the rooms being very clean and tidy.

The only change on the staff during the year was the resignation of Dr Stoddard, the state of his health necessitating a change of climate. He carries with him the good opinion and wishes of his confreres.

#### EYE AND EAR DEPARTMENT.

During the past year 147 patients have been under treatment. Of these little requires to be said, as they differ but little from those of for er years.

I think I may fairly claim that the dispensary is running smoothly. Having been connected with it for many years, I may say that it has never run more smoothly. Of the patients there are some, of course, who grumble and think they should have some one better than a "dispensary doctor." Judging from the number of applicants, there are not many of this class; and there are even applicants who are willing to put their pride aside and with a bold face attempt to "run the blockade." and place themselves on the list of charity patients. There is danger of the dispensary becoming too popular and even fashionable.
