

## SESSION REPORT.

The Session in making its Annual Statement to the Congregation, cannot do so without humbly expressing its gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for His loving kindness to this congregation throughout another year. There are ample evidences of outward prosperity. During the year we have been enabled to take possession of our new and comfortable place of worship, which was dedicated with appropriate services on Sabbath, April 14th. There has been a large increase in the attendance on the regular diets of worship; in the Sabbath School and Bible Class. The Weekly Prayer-meeting is not attended as well as it should be, but we are pleased to mark an increase here also.

While there has been an increase in the body of Christ amongst us, yet we regret to say it is not all we had hoped for. There are still some who have little religious life in their homes and who take no great interest in the extension of Christ's kingdom, although they profess to be His disciples.

The Session would kindly urge upon all parents the very important duty of having a family altar, around which parents daily assemble for the worship of Almighty God. We would also enjoin parents to see that their children are taught in the Scriptures, committing parts of it to memory, and that they are also instructed in our Shorter Catechism, and kept as far as possible from all forms of temptation. All are entreated to be regular in their attendance on the public means of grace, and to avoid everything that might unnecessarily hinder others. You are also asked to do all you can to secure the proper observance of the Sabbath, both in your own home and in the community at large.

We would once again remind the congregation of our duty to a lost and perishing world, to the millions who are without the knowledge of Christ, of Him through whom alone men can be saved. The Church requires an increase of funds to carry on the work both at home and abroad. May this congregation do its part in hastening that time when Jesus Christ shall be crowned Lord of all.

## MANAGERS' REPORT.

---

The year that has just closed has been an eventful one in the history of Chalmers' Church. On Sabbath, the 14th day of April last, we were permitted for the first time to hold public worship in our new building. Its comforts and conveniences are to some extent a reward for the toil and heavy expenditure undertaken in its erection and completion. Yet while we exchange mutual congratulations upon the magnificence of our temple of worship, we must remember that the completion of our building does not mean the completion of our work, that our enlarged accommodations only mean that our sphere of usefulness is enlarged, and our responsibilities increased. Our desire now should be to make the best use of the grand possibilities with which a kind Providence has blessed us, and to allow nothing to interfere with our progress onward and upward, until the name of our church becomes synonymous with all that is zealous and liberal in the advancement of the cause of Christ.

Your Managers feel that with all we have accomplished in the past and all we have undertaken for the future, the present is a critical period in our history. We are now fully equipped for our work. We have all the machinery requisite to make for our church a brilliant future. If, however, we do not prove equal to the opportunities that are ours, if having put our hand to the plough we turn back, our last condition may be worse than our first. A very important factor in our progress is that we must not be hampered and our usefulness impaired by an insufficiency of funds. We must on no account acquire a reputation of being cramped financially. This would be a serious detriment to our progress—a sad curtailment of our powers of doing good.

In our last Annual Report it was stated that our expenditure for the year 1889 would in round numbers amount to \$5,000. It was at that time impossible to foresee what many items of expenditure would amount to when we entered our new building, but we are now enabled to forecast with tolerable accuracy the sum that shall

be required during the present year and we give you herewith a detailed estimate of the amount. The expenditure for the past year did not equal the amount estimated, mainly because we were only eight and one-half months worshipping in our new building. Our contributions also were far short of the estimate. In order to show you the marked increase in our receipts, dating from the time we left the old building, we have divided our financial year into three periods : the first, up to the church opening ; the second, half of the remainder of the year ; and the third, the balance of the year.

It will be seen from the above that our average per Sabbath of \$66.48 exceeds by the sum of \$16.75, or about 33 per cent., the average for the preceding year. While this is a very commendable increase, still our income at the present rate is not so great proportionately to our expenditure as when we occupied the old building. In the year 1887 our total income, including rent of cottages, was \$2,445.82, and our expenditure \$2,418.34. During the thirty-six Sabbaths we have occupied our new building, our total receipts amount to \$2,670.62, or at the rate of \$3,648 per year, while our estimated expenditure for the coming year is \$4,611. It is thus apparent that a very substantial increase must be made in our revenue to avoid a deficit at the close of the year.

Your management feel, however, that this prospect is not nearly so discouraging as at first sight it would appear, and if every member and adherent does his duty, we feel that at our next annual meeting we shall have a surplus rather than a deficit to report. In a circular issued to you on the 14th of October last, we endeavored to place this matter before you, but, owing possibly to our position not being thoroughly understood, no increase resulted.

The question now to be considered is the source whence this increase should come. In the first place, our increase in numbers is more rapid now than at any former period in our history. Doubtless during this year we will experience a very appreciable increase of revenue from this source. In the second place, we find that a considerable number of our members are non-contributors, so far as we know. We have now a membership of 426, besides a large number of adherents, while we have only 208 contributors by envelope, of whom forty-three are adherents. In view of all we have said, is it necessary to emphasize further the duty of every non-contributing member in this regard? The following table will give some idea of the amounts contributed by the different contributors.

Deducting the nine who contribute no stated amount, we find the average contribution per Sabbath per contributor, to be about thirty cents, or \$15.60 per year. Taking into consideration the number of members who do not contribute, the average is reduced to thirteen and a half cents per contributor per Sabbath, or \$7.02 per year.

Now, without assuming the position of censors of any person's ability to give, we simply state that if one-half of those contributing twenty-five cents would increase to fifty cents, which we think might be done, this with a similar increase as to the others would more than supply our wants.

At the risk of growing tedious we are disposed to dwell upon this point until every one asks himself the question, "Am I contributing to the Lord's cause as He hath prospered me?"

We also wish to impress upon contributors the desirability of being prompt and regular in their payments, and making it a point always to square their accounts at the end of each quarter. Some confusion has arisen during the past year through members securing envelopes of a wrong number, and we would kindly ask every person to become familiar with his number and always remember it upon replenishing his supply of envelopes.

Your Board recommend that our pastor's salary be increased to \$1,700 per annum, being an increase of \$200.

The Managers retiring this year are Messrs. D. Hunter, James Tennant, W. L. Scott and Dr. Rea.

## REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The Committee take pleasure in reporting that they have completed the work for which they were organized, namely, the erecting of a new place of worship, and they sincerely hope their efforts have been satisfactory to the congregation. So far as the architecture and workmanship are concerned they speak for themselves, and comment on our part is unnecessary. We might mention, however, one or two facts in reference to the cost. In the first place, the contracts were let at a season of the year when the various trades were anxious to secure work; they consequently figured on close margins. In the second place, after having once fully satisfied themselves with the plans and specifications, not a single alteration was made in them by the Committee whereby an extra could be charged. (The architects made a few slight improvements, for which there are some small charges for extras.) On account of those favorable circumstances your Committee were enabled to carry out the work at the least possible cost. All the liabilities incurred by the Committee in the erection and completion of the building have been paid, and the moneys necessary to meet them received from the following sources :

Mortgage on church property.....	\$25,000 00
Paid up subscriptions from the congregation ....	6,935 00
Loan from Ontario Bank.....	2,700 00

As you will see by the Treasurer's statement these figures show more than the direct cost of the building, as insurance on \$25,000 for three years, also interest on mortgage, loans from bank, etc., are included.

The Committee cannot conclude their report without stating that they have felt that the blessing of the Great King and Head of the Church has attended their labors from the beginning of their work unto its completion.

In commencing the new year, we would acknowledge with gratitude the guiding hand of the Great Head of the Church in the success which has attended us in the past, and go trustingly forward to the future, remembering that "He will not fail thee, nor forsake thee."

### WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

In presenting our Annual Report for the year just closed, we have reason to be thankful to the bounteous Giver for His continued goodness to us, and for the measure of progress we have attained during the year.

Our annual Thanksgiving meeting (held in November) was not so largely attended as last year, owing no doubt to the inclement state of the weather. Although the meeting was comparatively small it was not the less enjoyable, and the kindly words of encouragement addressed to us by Mrs. McMurrich, President of the Toronto Presbyterian Society, were much appreciated. The Thank-offering amounted to \$15.25.

The money raised this year has all been by direct giving, and amounts to \$78.45, an increase of \$15.23 over last year.

A large bale of clothing was sent to the North-West.

The office-bearers for the year were as follows:

President, Mrs. Mutch; 1st Vice-President, Mrs. J. Tennant; 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. McCorquodale; 3rd Vice-President, Mrs. McSweyn; Treasurer, Mrs. J. D. Walker; Executive Committee, Mrs. R. Macdonald and Mrs. D. D. Christie.

The regular meetings of the Society are held on the third Thursday of each month, in the afternoon and evening alternately, at the hours of three and eight o'clock respectively.

At these meetings the general business of the Society is transacted, devotional exercises engaged in and missionary intelligence received. Our membership is now twenty-nine, an increase of seven since last year. Ten are members of the General Society.

Although our membership is increasing it is slowly, far too slowly. A Woman's Foreign Missionary Society with a membership of only twenty-nine in a congregation as large as ours needs no comment.

We hope that many more of the ladies will find time to help on this work.

From those who cannot take active part we ask their earnest prayers, and let those whom God has permitted to labor in this part of His vineyard be encouraged and strengthened by His promise: "My word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

### THE LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION.

As a society we have great cause for thanksgiving to our God for what He hath enabled us to accomplish in His service during the past year. The principal work undertaken was the carpeting and upholstering of the new church, which has been successfully completed.

The usual day and hour of our meetings have been observed, viz.: the first Thursday of every month at 3 p.m., except the month of August.

We begin another year with a membership of thirty on the roll, and look forward to a pleasant and profitable season's work.

During the early part of the year considerable visiting was accomplished. We regret, however, that owing to the change of numbers and other hindrances, the ladies have not succeeded in meeting with the many strangers and others who have lately come to the congregation.

The Association has given during the year five parlor socials, a strawberry festival, two concerts, and a social at the opening of the new church.

We commenced the year with a balance of \$296.26, and have raised the amount of \$1,235.12, making a total of \$1,531.38. Of this we have paid on our furnishing account \$1,290, and \$233.35 for ordinary expenses, leaving a balance on hand of \$8.03, as the treasurer's statement will show.

The balance still due on the furnishing account is \$826.83. In view of this amount still to be paid, the Association desires the interest and co-operation of all the ladies of the congregation in helping them to liquidate this debt.

We hope that any effort put forth by the Association, either to meet this expense or to forward in any way the interests of the congregation, will meet with a hearty response from the members and adherents.

We would again request those who have the time at their disposal, knowing the responsibility that rests on us individually as Christians, to do the work that is given us to do, to join us.

As we address ourselves hopefully to the work of the new year that has just opened up before us, depending more than ever on Him who has said, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."


