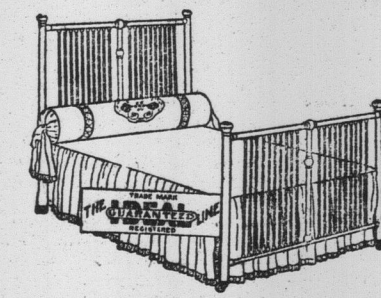

UNITED STATES COMING INTO REALIZATION THAT GERMANY IS GUILTY OF THE CRIMES CHARGED

The following article, spread across the upper half of the Cleveland Press, published in a city that has a very large German population, shows how the feeling is spreading over the United States that the crimes attributed to Germany have actually been committed, and that American sympathy should go out to the victims.

We propose that the congress of the United States at once appropriate \$100,000,000 for the relief of non-combatants in those countries of Europe which have been occupied by enemy soldiers and that the president be authorized to appoint a relief commission to spend the money where it is most needed.

Millions upon millions of men, women and children in Belgium, in northern France, in Serbia, in Poland and in other devastated territory are slowly dying of starvation and exposure.


Of all the great nations of the world the United States is the only one that has been deaf to the pitiful appeals of these suffering millions of human beings.

are also spending huge sums to feed and clothe the stricken people of Serbia and Poland.

The British colonies—Canada, Australia and New Zealand—also have appropriated large sums for this noble purpose.

All these nations and colonies are doing this at a time when every dollar kept by them is sorely needed in the life and death struggle in which they are engaged.

They could be forgiven if they said we must let the Belgians and the Poles and the Serbians starve because our first duty is to our own people and we cannot help both.

But how, in the name of all that is noble, can a nation that is wallowing in wealth, that is at peace, that claims to be Christian, continue to evade its duty to suffering humanity and at the same time keep its self-respect, much less the respect of the rest of the world?

We are tempted to go into the details of the situation as it exists among these stricken peoples; to republish in this place the full report of the commissions which are doing their best to keep the people of Belgium and Poland alive but who are so restricted in their efforts because of lack of money that they can do but a small part of what is necessary to do.

We assure, however, that most of our readers are familiar with this and that it is unnecessary at this time to prove the terribly urgent need.

Just an instance: Herbert C. Hoover, the American in charge of the Belgian relief commission, arrived in this country a few days ago. In an interview he said: "The situation in Belgium is the worst since the beginning of the war. I have come home to ask Americans to do their share in raising between \$100,000,000 and \$200,000,000 needed to feed the destitute."

From what we can learn the situation in Poland and Serbia is as bad or worse.

One hundred million dollars now! Let that be America's answer!

GOVERNMENT LOANS TO FARMERS
 (Toronto Globe)

Saskatchewan is making a courageous and important departure in creating a Farm Mortgage Board to provide loans to farmers for legitimate agricultural purposes. The loans will be made from a fund provided by a bond issue, and the rate of interest will be sufficient to cover cost and expenses. Interest and principal will be combined so that thirty annual payments will liquidate the debt. Like most governmental excursions into the field of private enterprise, safety and success will depend on management. Lending is always uncertain, and the continuing influence of private interests has generally been regarded as necessary to prevent abuse. But if the loans are restricted to farmers already on the land, and are advanced under sufficient supervision to insure the use of the money in stocking, equipping, and otherwise preparing for increased production, material losses can be avoided.

It will be necessary to provide against the use of such loans in the buying of land. This would introduce and encourage a speculative element ultimately disastrous. If speculators knew the farmers could borrow public funds to buy land there would be an immediate stimulus to pre-emption. The money should not be so advanced that it can be diverted, even indirectly, to payments for farming areas.

U. S. Steamer is Sunk by Germans Crew Assisted to Escape and no Lives Lost - Other Neutral Nations Prepare for Action in Protest Against New Policy The American steamer Mousontic, with a cargo of wheat from Galveston, Texas, for London, was sunk on Saturday off the Selly Islands by a German submarine. She formerly was the Hamburg-American liner Georgia and was interned in New Orleans until April, 1915, when she was purchased by American interests and placed under United States registry. An announcement is made by the American Consul at Plymouth to the effect that the crew were given full warning and were allowed an hour to prepare to leave the steamer. After getting to their boats the steamer was sunk and the submarine towed the rescued crew for ninety miles toward land. The submarine then fired a signal to a British patrol boat which subsequently landed the crew at Penzance. Other neutral vessels sunk by the German submarines are as follows: Spanish steamer Don De Noviembre, with one man drowned. Greek steamer Helicott; crew rescued coast of Spain in life-boats. Norwegian steamer Ymer, only part of crew landed. The Spanish steamer Paura was hoarded and badly damaged and one member of the crew wounded. Neutral Protection. The Swedish government has demanded an investigation of the torpedoing of the steamer Edda, reserving her right for future action. It is understood that negotiations are in progress between the Danish, Swedish and Norwegian governments concerning the situation. The Spanish cabinet is considering the submarine situation and it is expected a strong protest will be sent to Germany.

Sixty Years of Church History

Exmouth Street Methodist Church Celebrating Jubilee With Special Observances

In Exmouth Street Methodist church a week of services marking the diamond jubilee of the church was begun at the morning service yesterday. Rev. George F. Dawson, the pastor-elect, occupied the pulpit, owing to the illness of Rev. W. G. Lane. Mr. Dawson also spoke at the evening services. The sixty years that the church has been in existence have brought about a wonderful growth in every department. In 1855 the Methodist conference appointed Rev. Charles Stewart, D. D., its first pastor. His appointment was looked upon as the opening of a new circuit in that section of the city. Previous to Dr. Stewart's appointment meetings were held in various cottages and homes in that neighborhood. Benevolent hall was placed at the disposal of the quarterly board, and regular preaching services were held there after Dr. Stewart's arrival. The corner stone of the present church was laid June 12, 1856, by Rev. Dr. Ritchey. Dedication exercises were held on Jan. 30, 1857, with Dr. Ritchey as the principal speaker. At the same time this service was made up of singers from other churches, the choir of the Exmouth street church assisting. Accidents on the board of trustees caused by death and resignations were filled in 1862 as follows: Aaron Eaton, James Smith, Henry Graham, John Gardner, James T. Smith, Daniel Melvin, F. C. Humbert, E. E. Leckhart, John McMoran, John Brookfield. In 1872, during the pastorate of Rev. T. J. Deinstadt the church was raised to its present height, affording the present Sunday school accommodation, at a cost of \$7,161.82. During September, 1889, the Sunday school was started at Marsh bridge with William Warwick as superintendent, and R. C. Frost assistant superintendent and secretary. The Brussels street schoolhouse (Glad Tidings) was built in 1892 at a cost of \$1,847.55. The parsonage was built in 1894 during the pastorate of Rev. J. Brewster, chiefly through the efforts of the late Aaron Eaton. The cost was \$2,538.29, leaving an indebtedness of \$17,700.00, which was paid off in full in 1901. On the division of the circuit in May, 1897, Exmouth street became a separate circuit, and the following leaders were appointed: William Warwick, John McMoran, D. Sullivan, George Trimm, A. Anderson, D. Collins, J. Jenkinson and H. Grimshaw, Joseph Hart. There is one class with a church membership of 810. The total income during the year for all purposes was \$2,270.94. The new pipe organ installed in 1912 cost \$2,760.20. Other recent improvements have cost \$6,790.48. In connection with the jubilee services a souvenir programme has been issued. It contains a list of the services for the week, pictures of Dr. Stewart, the first pastor; of Rev. W. H. Hearty, pastor from 1897-70, and of Mr. Lane, the present pastor. HALIFAX PROTESTS
(In connection with the Statement regarding the through sleeper service on the I.C.R. and C.P.R. to Montreal and Boston via St. John, reference to which was made yesterday it should be stated that the C.P.R. sleeper from Montreal was handled to Halifax by the I.C.R. from St. John, thus giving connection without change at that point. This was considered an advantage by the traveling public to and from Montreal and the west. The Boston travel used the I.C.R. sleeper between Halifax and St. John, connecting there with sleeper for Boston and vice versa. For the past three years, in the summer a through sleeper to Boston was put on but was discontinued as usual at the end of the season. The present situation, therefore, is that I.C.R. declines to handle the Montreal C. P. R. sleeper to Halifax, but asks that the C. P. R. haul the I. C. R. sleeper through to Boston. This the C. P. R. has declined to do until an arrangement is arrived at regarding the Montreal service. The Canadian travel that wishes to use the St. John-Montreal route, feel that the Canadian travel should not be obliged to change at St. John, thus cancelling a privilege enjoyed for many years. In the meantime the C. P. R. has been compelled to refuse to haul the I. C. R. sleeper between St. John and Vancouver, which is their portion of the line to Boston.

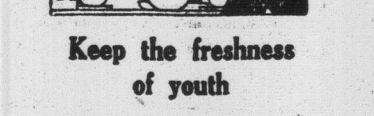

Mock Displays
in Berlin Shops

Nice Piles of Fancy Foods Which Tempt the Eye But Which Must Not Be Sold

An interesting "Berlin Letter" appears in the Frankfurter Zeitung.

In speaking of Berlin shops the Frankfurter correspondent remarks on the "surprising" opulence of the shop windows of drapery establishments—silk fit for queens, delicate veillings, astrakhan in lavish abundance—but he notices that these are all articles which have either not been placed under an embargo because of their practical usefulness, or articles of use on which the embargo rests.

The correspondent says you must look at these piled-up shop windows with scepticism. They don't bear examination. From a distance they represent abundance, narrowly observed they are a fraud. Goods are there of no use to anyone, and you are told on a card that you may buy them "without special permission." You look in the window of a great "delikatessen" shop, with its enticing array of appetizing things. They must be fearfully dear—lowers of chocolate boxes, symmetrical buildings of preserves in tins, all sorts of geometrically arranged designs of glass jars and pots with labels that make your eyes bright and your mouth water.

It is incredible, but we have the "Frankfurter" man's word for it, that all these mighty edifices of boxes, pots, cans, bottles, and jars are either empty or commandeered, and reserved not for sale.

For a long time the public could not custom itself to these mock displays and resented the lavishness, but the "better-class" shops now display cards in the window on which they ask the public to believe that the jars and boxes and things are empty, and other cards which tell what articles have been commandeered, and what are still for sale.

Batock's regime, we are told, has only partially put an end to the street "polonaises" of waiting women. As soon as any particular article becomes unusually scarce the queues of women form up as it were automatically.

We are further informed that in educated and exclusive circles in Berlin the most engraving subject of conversation deals with "How and through whom this or that person has procured this or that food dainty?" One has received a ham and butter from a civilian official in Brussels, another a hare and some venison from an estate in East Prussia.

Frau Von M. had a goose from Warsaw, and Frau Von N. had an extra quantity of butter from someone who gave it in exchange for sausages. Another lady barbers flour for sausage, flour which she had slowly accumulated on her bread-card. Doctor X. delights in telling how he is able to spread on his bread the butter which his sick wife is unable to eat, and a lady doctor makes a point of collecting flour, sugar, milk, butter, eggs, oil, coffee and bacon from patients whom she is dieting.

HOSPITAL SHIPS TO BE SUNK ALSO

Germany Charges "Frequent Misuse" by Allies—Britain May Retaliate (New York Times). Berlin, Jan. 31 (By Wireless to Sayville)—The Admiralty today made the following announcement:—The German government has convincing evidence in hand that hostile hospital ships frequently are misused for the transportation of ammunition and troops. The government has communicated these proofs to the British and French governments by diplomatic means. At the same time it declared that hospital ships passing on the military route of the hostile army engaged in France and Belgium, within the lines Flamborough Head-Terschelling on the one hand and Lanx's End-Ushant on the other, shall be no more treated as such. Hostile powers are free to use hospital ships for the transportation of wounded and sick army members on ways outside this district. The barging of other sea routes is reserved in case of further violation of hospital ships in violation of international law. Negotiations for the purchase of the St. John Railway Company have now reached a stage where it appears almost certain that they will be carried through. A definite offer has been made and its acceptance is recommended to the shareholders by the directors of the company. The proposal will be dealt with at a special meeting of the shareholders.

The offer is for the purchase of the entire assets of the company, including the properties and franchises, and the amount offered is \$1,900,000, with an additional payment of \$10 a share for each share transferred. This would give the shareholders the net price of \$140 a share, while the highest price quoted on the market has been about \$120, some time ago.

The New Brunswick Investment Company, Limited, is a corporation formed for the purpose, and is composed chiefly of prominent local citizens. Sufficient capital and ample backing to ensure ability to carry out their plans have, it is reported, been provided and, if the transfer is completed, it is believed that an aggressive policy will be adopted by the new owners of the company.

We have received an offer from the New Brunswick Investment Company, Limited, of one million dollars and one hundred thousand shares of the company's property, assets and franchises and, in addition, ten dollars a share for each share of the company's stock transferred to the New Brunswick Investment Company, making one hundred and forty dollars per share net to the shareholders. The New Brunswick Investment Company agree to assume all of the Saint John Railway Company's indebtedness and liabilities. Payment to be made by the New Brunswick Investment Company in full on transfer of the property on or before February 28th, instant, or so soon thereafter as matters in connection with our company's mortgage can be arranged, as to which, the parties making the offer anticipate no delay.

Payment of the additional ten dollars for the stock will be made when the certificates are delivered to the New Brunswick Investment Company in transferable form.

LOCAL NEWS

WAS BORN IN ST. JOHN

The death of William McCormick occurred in the soldiers' hospital at Togo, Me., on Wednesday night, Jan. 31. He was born in St. John, N. B., on August 20, 1882.
