Germans Overcome In Fight With The Bayonet

Russians Watch Men Cross River, Then Surround Them—Czar's Troops Score Several Successes — Enemy Trying a **New Plan**

Petrograd, Jan. 4—A Russian official communication regarding the fighting in Poland and Galicia, says:—

ing in Poland and Galicia, says:—

"A strong artillery combat has been fought all along the front on the left bank of the Vistula. The attempt of the Germans to gain ground in certain places in the region of the Bzura River was without success.

"On the night of January 2, we discovered the passage of Germans across the Bzura in the vicinity of Kozloff and Biscoupi. One of our glorious regiments surrounded the Germans and attacked with the bayonet without firing a shot. In the hand-to-hand struggle which followed they killed several hundred men. The survivors surrendered.

"About 3 n. m. on January 2, a brigade of German infantry attacked our

dred men. The survivors surrendered.

"About 3 p. m. on January 2, a brigade of German infantry attacked our position near Borjimow, northeast of Bolimow, but the German assault was repulsed with enormous losses. Desperate fighting occurred during the night of January 2, continuing until daybreak, northeast of Rawa, where we succeeded in dislodging the enemy from some of the trenches previously taken.

"South of the Pilica River, fighting took place at Metairie and Gaschek, and also southeast of Malagoszoz, where we repulsed all attacks of the enemy "In Galicia the fighting around Corlice and Zakliczyn continues.

"In the region of Uzsok Pass and Rostoki (south of Lisko), we have made progress. We drove back the enemy who fled in great disorder. We captured 2,000 prisoners and some Mitrailleuses. Several companies of the Austrians surrendered in a body. In their retreat to Uzsok, the Austrians abandoned arms and ammunition.

Ineffectual sorties still continue from Przmysl, but they are less vigorously pushed, probably because of the garrison's knowledge of the failure of the Austrian relief forces to break through the Russian lines.

London, Jan. 4—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs:

"The Germans have sent Prussian and Bavarian troops to aid the Austrians who have been ordered at all costs to hold ground along the front protecting Cracow. They are also making efforts to cross to the north of the Vistula, the idea being that with assistance from the east Prussian army of General Francois they might threaten Warsaw from this direction.

"The vigor with which preparations for a siege are going on at Cracow shows that no illusion is entertained there about the way the battles are going. The Poles are greatly disturbed by a statement of the Austrians that if they are unable to hold the fortress, the y will blow up the famous city and its cathedral."

With the shot, Patrick McDonald of the Irish-American Athletic club of New York stood out as the best man in the country. He made a new record with the 18-pound sphere, 46 feet, 23-4 inches.

Another great performance of the year was the high jump of Eddle Deeson of the Olympic club at Berkley, Cal, waere he was credited with the unprecedented leap of six feet 75-16 inches.

A CLASH OF DATES

GOES 28 MILES

Control of vessels and self-propelled torpedoes at a distance by means of wireless impulses was successfully demonstrated recently in the presence of officers of the United States army and navy, by John Hays Hammond, Jr., whose earlier experiments in this line have previously been referred to in this magazine. The boat "Natalia," built by Mr. Hammond, was manoeuvred around Boston harbor and out into the open sea as far as Graves Light, a distance of twenty-eight miles, and safely back. There was not a living person on the boat, all its movements being directed by a single wireless operator stationed at Marblehead, more than twenty miles away. The January Popular Mechanics Magazine contains some very interesting views of the boat and its operator.

That "Surplus" is Really a Deficit ---The Biggest Yet

An Over-Expenditure of More Than \$667,000 for the Last Year is the Record of the Local Government-A Clear Statement by Hon. C. W.

Moncton, Jan. 2—The over-expenditure by the Flemming-Clark government for 1914 was more than \$667,000, not counting interest on bonds for railways.

Hon, C. W. Robinson, opposition leader, in an interview today gave The Telegraph a very clear and complete review of the provincial accounts made public a few days ago by the local government. For several years past the government of the day has been actually asserting that it has been paying its expenditures out of revenue. Mr. Robinson, with the thoroughness of a business man, makes it clear that there has not been any surplus, and the many which the province is being run into debt is astounding. He says:

This means that the provincial debt has been increased nearly \$700,000 during the year in the ordinary business transactions and without taking any account of the enormous liability of an indirect nature resulting from guaranteeing bonds of railways.

There may be differences of opinion as to the method of classification of accounts and while the auditor shows a nominal surplus on the ordinary accounts of about \$12,000 he could just as easily have shown a deficit of very large proportions. No doubt he felt constrained to follow the custom and so classify the accounts as to return a surplus, but after all it is a matter of book-keeping and classification of a few items on each side of an extraordinary nature

The statement published only gives actual payments and receipts for the year, and no statement is ever made of the liabilities incurred and outstanding at the close of the year, as for example, the amount required to complete contracts entered into, or even the amount actually owing for work done and not settled for. Judging from the magnitude of the operations of the department of public works a very large amount is still outstanding in this one department.


