I EAVING a long trail of destruction and hundreds of dead, injured and homeless, the tropical hurricane, which came out of the Bahamas Friday to rage across Southern Florida and along the

eastern gulf coast, finally has blown itself out in southern Mississippi With direct communication restored to the last of the isolated cities-Pensacola-it appears that there was no loss of life along the gult although the wind at times reached a velocity of 120 miles an hour, comparable to that which levelled towns on the miles an hour, comparable to that which levelled towns on the southeastern Florida coast, leaving at least 400 dead, 150 or more missing, 5,000 injured and 50,000 homeless.

Varying estimates from the 50-mile coastal area in the path of the sale placed the property damage between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

The death list at Miami alone was expected to reach 250 this morning, as additional bodies were given up by the waters of Biscayne Bay.

More than 3,000 injured bare been given medical assistance by hospitals and Red Cross workers, 22 were reported dead at Miami Beach.

DEAR MISS DIX—I am thinking of leaving my husband, but before doing so, want your advice. He is thoroughly selfish. For years I have done everything I could for his happiness and comfort, but he never thinks of mine. He is niggardly to me. He never gives me any money, only barely what I can run the house on, and he growls over the price of everything. But he boasts of how much he gives to charity, and what he gives to his friends, and how he helps boys and girls through school.

He allows his secretary to open my letters and read them, and this secretary treats me as an interloper when I go to the office, I do not know how far the intimacy between my husband

But they seldom find that a decree absolute brings the absolute peace and happiness they expected. They find that the divorced woman has no settled place in society; nowhere to go, and that she is neither fish, nor flesh, nor good red herring. If she goes back to her family, she finds that she is not wanted, and that they resent having to take care of her. If she goes among strangers, they lift an eyebrow, and have for her none of the sympathy that they have for the woman who is a real widow.

STRONG, IMPARTIAL REFEREE NEEDED FOR BIG BOUT TOMORROW

NAME WILL BE WITHHELD UNTIL NIGHT OF BOUT

Dempsey's Tactics in Heat of Encounter to be Watched

By HENRY L. FARRELL United Press Sports Editor. **DHILADELPHIA**, Sept. 22.-With activities ended in both training camps, with Jack Demp-sey and Gene Tunney pronounced by the experts as physically fit to fight tomorrow night for the world's heavyweight championship, and with all prelimary details of promotion fixed, discussion turned today to perhaps the most important topic of all—the officials. The Pennsylvania Boxing Com-

mission will not announce the name of the referee and the two judges until a few minutes before time for the main bout. The fighters were given more con sideration by the Pennsylvania commission than they would have received in New York. The champior and the challenger, something like the court procedure which gives a defendant a voice in the selection of a jury were permitted to submit a list of a

number of referees which would be satisfactory. It was a sensible thing to do as it is understood that both Dempsey and Tunney named every important referee that has been licensed by the commission. HONORARY CAPACITY

Unless everyone is all wrong, the

judges will not be important and their role is only an honorary one as no one expects the bout to go the limit of ten rounds. Even if it goes the limit the referee is the only important official in the event of a close finish. It is a cinch that no two judges would take a world's heavyweight title away from a champion unless the margin was pronounced and indisputable in favor of the challenger.

The referee, according to the Penn-

sylvania rules, does not vote unless the two judges disagree and then his Dempsey and Tunney both said-as has become customary in these mod-ern days of the judge system—"We don't care who is the referee as long


