SOUTHERN HURRICANE BLOWS ITSELF OUT

400 DEAD, 150 MISSING, 50,000 ARE HOMELESS

Rescuers Believe Final Death Toll Will Reach More Than 700—Ocean Waters Give Up More Bodies

MARTIAL LAW REMAINS IN FORCE

Boats Reported Beached and Bridges Washed Out; Long Lines of Destitute Inhabitants Served at Emergency Relief Centres; 74 Jailed for Looting

LEAVING a long trail of destruction and hundreds of dead, injured and homeless, the tropical hurricane, which came out of the Bahamas Friday to rage across Southern Florida and along the eastern gulf coast, finally has blown itself out in southern Mississippi.

With direct communication restored to the last of the isolated cities—Pensacola—it appears that there was no loss of life along the gulf, although the wind at times reached a velocity of 120 miles an hour, comparable to that which levelled towns on the southeastern Florida coast, leaving at least 400 dead, 150 or more missing, 5,000 injured and 50,000 homeless.

Varying estimates from the 60-mile coastal area in the path of the gale placed the property damage between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

Rescue and relief workers believe complete search of the mass of tangled wreckage in the score of more stricken towns and cities and count of the bodies cast up by the waters of Biscayne Bay, will swell the death toll to more than 700.

250 DEAD AT MIAMI

The death list at Miami alone was expected to reach 250 this morning, as additional bodies were given up by the waters of Biscayne Bay.

More than 3,000 injured have been given medical attention by hospital and Red Cross workers, 22 were reported dead at Miami Beach.

A missing list of 70 at Hollywood was expected to increase to the 40 known dead as the back country where many are believed to be, is thoroughly searched for possible casualties.

Two hundred and fifty injured persons have been given medical attention.

The death list at Fort Lauderdale remained at 11, with 20 seriously injured numbered at more than 800. Twenty of these are expected to die.

Five hundred others are reported injured in the suburban cities of Ft. Pierce and Ft. St. Johns.

STREETS PATROLLED

Martial law remained in force throughout the storm area, with national guardsmen patrolling the streets.

At Fort Myers on the west coast, eight were killed at Lakeland, and virtually a score of smaller cities in the territory between West Palm Beach and Miami on the east coast reported scattering casualties ranging from one to seven.

Late reports from Pensacola on the west coast where the hurricane struck with waning force as it passed inland, said some lives were lost with property damage estimated at \$2,000,000.

SUFFERERS AIDED

Many boats are reported beached and several bridges are said to have been washed out. Pensacola was cut off from surrounding territory for 24 hours.

With the arrival of an adequate supply of fresh water, sanitary conditions have greatly improved in Miami, and Hollywood, whose water and sanitary systems were totally destroyed.

As search went on for additional dead throughout yesterday and last night in Miami, long lines of destitute filed past emergency relief centres for small portions of bread and fuel.

LOOTERS JAILED

Seventy-four persons were arrested for looting stores and other places of business destroyed by the storm.

Protraction of British Strike May Aid Maritime Winter Ports

Demand For More Beer Starts Mutiny In Dutch Regiment; N. C. O. Killed, Soldiers Hurt

AMSTERDAM, Holland, Sept. 22—The unsuccessful demand of soldiers of the Twelfth Regiment for more beer, after a long march in broiling hot weather, caused a mutiny at Assen yesterday which resulted in the death of a non-commissioned officer and the wounding of a number of soldiers.

When the troops, who consisted of men called up for annual training, demanded the additional beer, the non-commissioned officer refused to comply, whereupon the men smashed their barracks windows and wrecked the canteen. Officers, being unable to quell the disturbance, summoned the guard, which fired a volley in the air.

A volley of real cartridges then was fired and a non-commissioned officer who had taken no part in the disturbance, was killed, and a number of privates wounded.

Serious disorders also have been reported at Ede. The war office stated that complete order had been re-established in the army. The Dutch press recently has reported dissatisfaction among the troops because of complaints that they were trained excessively during the hot summer months.

DR. FOSTER SAYS VENIOT ASSURED CABINET POST

Question of Department Still in Doubt; Report on Maritime Dismissed

Hon. W. E. Foster, who returned last night after a six-day visit to Ottawa under the chairmanship of Premier-elect Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, told a Times-Star reporter that he was practically assured of his position as minister of the Liberal Government cabinet group will be the Hon. Peter J. Veniot, former Premier of this province and the present leader of the Opposition.

That Premier King would be announced on Thursday, if not in its entirety at least almost complete, was another statement by Hon. Mr. Foster. He stated that he was sure that the new government as possible in the future to prevent any delay in the organization of the next parliament.

PORTFOLIO IN DOUBT

As to what portfolio in the King Cabinet the Hon. P. J. Veniot would be asked to fill, Dr. Foster could not state. He said that he was sure that he would be one in which the vigorous personality and practical experience of the New Brunswick would be of most service. There would undoubtedly be a re-arrangement of the former King Cabinet as affecting the former ministerial group. One instance in particular would be that of British Columbia which this election returned only one Liberal member. It was probable the Ministry of Public Works now held by Dr. J. H. King would be removed to the East as far as representation was concerned.

Asked what the particular inside news of the hour was at the Federal capital as a result of the governmental turnover, Dr. Foster said there were mixed feelings of surprise and satisfaction, particularly satisfaction, inasmuch as one of the major parties had a clear mandate. Both Conservatives and Liberals had been in conference for several days clearing up departmental business. He had never seen Ottawa quite so busy on Parliament Hill or in quite such a complex state.

Hon. Dr. Foster smiled broadly, when asked if he had been created a senator or if such a recognition of his services had been tendered him. "There is no vacancy, somebody says," the Doctor remarked, "so how could there be any appointment?"

MARITIME REPORT

Another important matter discussed by Dr. Foster upon his arrival was the Maritime situation. This report is due to be presented almost immediately as Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, the chairman, is to sail for the other side on Friday. Dr. Foster was asked if he had any idea what the report was going to recommend or what the nature and scope of the report would be.

SNOW HITS CALGARY

Last Day of Summer Sees Four-inch Blanket of White on City

CALGARY, Alta., Sept. 22—Followed by one of the coldest spells of weather which has struck Calgary this season, September 21, the traditional "last day of summer" broke over Calgary Tuesday morning in a blinding snowstorm, which blanketed the city in four inches of white drift, and held temperatures down to eight degrees of frost on the average all day long.

KING URGED TO ATTEND EMPIRE CONFERENCE

London News Asks Him to Make Sacrifice

PREMIER CABLES

In Published Statement Declares He Has Given No Interviews

LONDON, Sept. 22.—A cable to the London Daily News from the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, denying that he has given or authorized any interviews with "respect to the general election or the Imperial Conference" and adding: "So long as the present ministry remains in office I prefer giving no statement whatever," has revived interest in the question of the Canadian representation at the Imperial Conference.

Hugh Redwood, writing in the Daily News, urges Mackenzie King to attend and says, "In authoritative quarters it is generally admitted that King faced special difficulties owing to the coming by-elections and the change in the government. But it is strange to say that he would be making a sacrifice and voluntarily giving up his seat at any rate the opening session of the conference. To do this he did not do himself good. Canada has more than three weeks. The Canadian High Commissioner might represent him at last meetings."

URGES APPROVAL OF INDIES PACT

Bermuda Business Man Says His People Resist Under Canada's Delay

MONTREAL, Sept. 22—Urgent appeal for early ratification by the Dominion Parliament, of the treaty between the British West Indies and Bermuda, was made in address here yesterday by John J. Arnold, business man of Bermuda. Increasing difficulty is being experienced in trying to explain to the West Indian and Bermuda people, why there should be this delay. Particularly has this been so in the last six months, said Mr. Arnold.

It was pointed out by the speaker, that the trade treaty between the West Indies and Bermuda, which was signed in Ottawa in June 1925, was not yet in force. The treaty provides that the West Indies, Bermuda and the British West Indies, should be bound by the treaty from the date of its ratification by the Dominion Parliament. It is not yet in force, said Mr. Arnold.

JOHNSON GUILTY

Man Who Confessed to Eleven Murders Convicted in Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 22—Tom Johnson, who told police he had committed 11 murders, was found guilty here, last night of the slaying of Leonard Erdahl, young attorney, B. C. surrendered in Seattle, recently and was brought here for trial in the Erdahl case. Erdahl was killed during a hold-up last December.

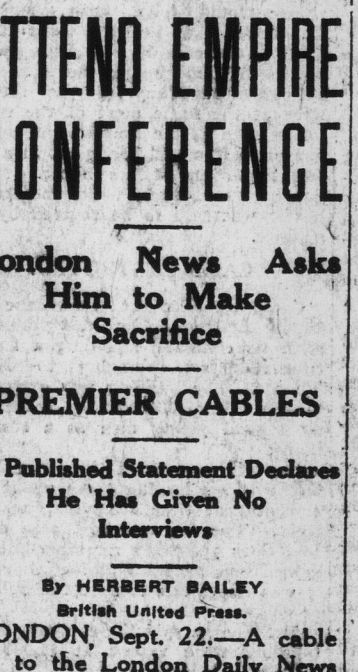
The penalty for first degree murder here, is life imprisonment. Johnson will be sentenced tomorrow.

DEMANDS FOR COAL CARRIERS BOOST RATES

European Buyers Holding Off Until Tariff Drops

MONTREAL TALK

End of Mine Tie-up and Lowering of Continental Stocks Will Help

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—The Montreal Gazette today carries the following news item: "Continued demands for ships to carry coal from America to the United Kingdom, made by British firms on account of the coal strike in that country, may ultimately affect the port of Montreal to a serious extent, if they should be maintained until the end of the present season. Rates for the transportation of grain have been steadily rising, and have now reached a figure that makes it unattractive for European buyers to take grain from this continent. Rates quoted for coal charters have soared to new high points.

"As high a rate as 80s. a ton has been quoted for an early steamer to carry American coal to England, and it is affirmed that the equivalent of this rate in grain transportation to the continent, is around 80s. a hundred pounds. Thus, at this high figure, it is unlikely that European buyers will purchase grain from this continent, if there is any possibility of their being able to hold off until the coal strike comes to an end, with a resultant decrease in the demand for tramp tonnage to carry coal.

VOTE RESULT IS SEEN AS AID TO BUSINESS

Bank of Montreal Summary Refers Optimistically to Trade Prospects

MONTREAL, Sept. 22—Whatever the adverse influence of a political campaign upon business, and that which coded on the 14th instant, was inconceivable, it has ceased to be, says the monthly summary of the Bank of Montreal. The incoming government has secured a majority sufficient for its purpose, one giving reasonable assurance of stability during the ordinary term of office, and a factor favoring continued improvement in trade.

DEMAND FOR SPACE

"There is a constant demand for space on regular liners. The rates quoted for this space are not as high as for that in tramp steamers, between 18 cents and 21 cents, having been given as the approximate range for most of the western United Kingdom ports. At present there is said to be a better demand for grain coming from the continent than from Great Britain and several liners are now having their schedules altered to include one or more of these ports."

FIRE RAVAGES RESIDENCE OF MRS. W. J. BEARD

Outbreak in Hampton Village Locked Serious - Pandenac Camp Burned
The residence of Mrs. W. J. Beard, Hampton Village, was severely damaged by fire early this morning. An alarm was sounded about 1 o'clock and the volunteer fire department turned out in response. There was considerable excitement as the burning building was situated close to the Baptist church, and if the latter edifice had caught, it was thought much of the village would have been destroyed. The fire started in the walls of the building and considerable cutting away had to be done before the blaze was extinguished. Many of the firemen were at the scene most of the night, for as soon as the fire was put out in the morning they would break out in a different portion of the house. Much damage was done by water and smoke, but it was said to be covered by insurance.

CAMP DESTROYED
Camp Paradise at Pandenac was totally destroyed by fire yesterday, with its contents, including a fine 5-kw. radio set, belonging to Frank Thorne. The building was owned by George Hamm, Grand Bay, and leased by several young men as a summer home.
Mr. Thorne was in the camp Monday evening, leaving there about 9:30 p. m. and at that time everything was all right. The fire was first seen about 10 o'clock yesterday morning, but had gained such headway at that time that it was impossible to save the building or contents.
Mr. Thorne said the contents of the building were valued at \$1,000 and there was \$300 insurance.

ATTACK ON TOM MOORE FAILS AT CONGRESS

Attempt to Abolish Salary of President is Defeated at Session

MONTREAL, Sept. 21—An attempt on the part of John W. Bruce, organizer of the United Association of Plumbers, Gas and Steam Fitters at today's session of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, now assembled here to do away with the regular yearly salary for the president of Congress, ended after much debate in a whole-

sale endorsement of President Tom Moore.

Only Mr. Bruce himself voted for his motion. In the course of his speech, which also urged that there should be a part-time president at the rate of \$12 a day and expenses employed, Mr. Bruce criticized President Moore, but delegate after delegate rose to eulogize the work of the president.

An effort on the part of Delegate Armand to have expunged from the record of Congress the entire matter raised by Delegate Bruce caused much discussion of technicalities and was defeated, the convention holding that the resolution brought in by Mr. Bruce did not contain slanderous or scurrilous matter.

Warning to labor men that they should not rely too much on aid from agencies outside their organizations, was given to the congress. The advice came from A. O. Wharton, president of the International Association of Machinists of America. He urged every effort be made towards restoring the "kick" and "punch" to the organizations, because to take these qualities out meant that little would be left to the organizations.

YOUTH KILLED IN FALL FROM BATHURST ROOF

Arthur Hachey, Repairing Paper Mill, Drops 50 Feet to Floor

BATHURST, Sept. 21—A distressing accident occurred at the Bathurst Company Limited Paper Mill at 7:30 o'clock this morning when Arthur Hachey, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hachey of West Bathurst, was instantly killed in a fall from the roof of the building to the concrete floor about 50 feet below.

GAME AND FISH—AND POLITICS

New Brunswick is naturally a much better game country than the state of New York, but from that state we may learn something about the conservation of game fish and game birds.

Recently the New York authorities made a survey of the game birds in southern New York, which showed that there has been a great increase in numbers and that the English pheasant particularly is flourishing beyond expectations.

Cheap politics is responsible for the destruction of much game and for the waste of a great deal of money, and the association is fully justified in contending that it is both foolish and wasteful to appoint game wardens as a matter of political patronage.

Political game wardens—and some of them are honest—are too heavily handicapped under the patronage system to be really useful. No man should be appointed for such work unless he is fitted to do it and unless he can depend upon holding his position irrespective of political influence until he has given good ground for his own removal.

THE IMPERIAL CONFERENCE. The Imperial Conference is due to open in London on October 19. Will Canada be represented? It is highly satisfactory to note that Mr. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King has denied authority for the statement casting doubt on Canada's representation at the conference.

Any idea spreading through the Empire that Canada does not take Empire affairs seriously and as her vital personal concern would be most unfortunate. It must be granted that domestic matters amply need straightening out but that would hardly be a reason acceptable to the rest of the Empire were Canada to send no delegation to the Conference.

It will be remembered that Mr. Bruce, premier of Australia, declared that he would not attend the Conference unless Canada were represented there, and Archibald Hurd writing in the Fortnightly Review says:

The Imperial conference might well be regarded as being in the nature of a consultation of specialists who have been called together to examine the health of a patient whose well-being is of vital importance to the world. The British Empire is the great exponent of liberal civilizations, and its ill-

are apt to affect the destinies not of one state but of every state. Consequently, the British peoples, if they were not so characteristically casual and illogical, would ask that the Imperial conference should diagnose the case of the British Empire, and frankly state, not in ambiguous phrases, but in words which every one can understand, exactly what is the matter with it, and how its ills can be cured, and its vitality stimulated.

Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania in replying to the Moral Welfare Society, gives the very best of reasons for refusing to stop the Dempsey-Tunney fight. He intends to see it himself.

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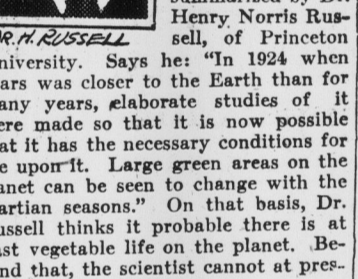

Why the Wife Who Divorces Her Husband is Seldom Better Off—The Silly Young Girl Who is Jealous of Her Fiance's Business—The Happy Wife of Twenty-two Whose Husband is Seventy-nine.

DEAR MISS DIX—I am thinking of leaving my husband, but before doing so, want your advice. He is thoroughly selfish. For years I have done everything I could for his happiness and comfort, but he never gives me a thought. He is miserably what I can run the house on, and he grows over the price of everything. But he boasts of how much he gives to charity, and what he gives to his friends, and how he helps boys and girls through school.

He allows his secretary to open my letters and read them, and this secretary treats me as earnestly before she takes the letter as she does when she returns it. She finds that she is not wanted, and that they resent having to take care of her. If she goes among strangers, they lift an eyebrow, and have for her none of the sympathy that they have for the woman who is a real widow.

And she does not find it very easy to get married again, because she has made a failure of her first marriage, and that disqualifies her as a wife in many men's eyes.

No man can succeed whose wife is always fighting his business, who is always putting obstacles in his way and whining and complaining because he attends to his job, instead of running around with her to places of amusement.

If you want to be a good wife, take an interest in his business. Get him to talk to you about it. Encourage him to give the best that is in him to it. In that way you will help him to succeed, and he will adore you because you are part of his success.

NEW YORK is an old town, as places in America go. When the clock sounds 10 o'clock a crowd of bareheaded children appear at the feet of St. Luke's.

THAT'S why the "bread dole" of St. Luke's is one of the city's oldest institutions. Bread and charity become synonymous in the French Revolution.

Want is felt by those who lived in 1792, quite as much as by those alive today. The pinch of hunger has not been an exclusive privilege of any generation.

And so for 124 years bread has been handed out down on Hudson street. Hudson street is an old street, a far-away street in the days when the Dutch cluttered the Battery; a street that became sinister through gang warfare; a street that gave name to one of Manhattan's most notorious gangs, "the Hudson Dusters"; a street beyond which no man with a criminal record may pass without courting arrest; a street of busy markets that have overflowed from the East Side as prosperity gradually set in.

BACK in 1792 there lived a man named Leake—John Leake—a wealthy merchant. When he died he left a will with a curious clause. It specified that 1,000 pounds was to be put out at interest "to be laid out in the annual issue of six-penny loaves of wheat bread to be distributed every Sabbath morning to such poor as shall appear most deserving."

When the clock sounds 10 o'clock a crowd of bareheaded children appear at the feet of St. Luke's. They go away with bread for hungry families.

ST. LUKE'S is an old church. It came into being when Greenwich Village was little more than a series of farmyards. It stands on the fringe of a fashionable and wealthy section, but its yellow brick, dingy air is rather a symbol of the economic state of it.

It is a fitting place for the perpetuation of Manhattan's oldest charity—a charity that has gone on for 200 weeks. In contrast is the more modern method of aid, as demonstrated by Greenwich House, which stands nearby, exuding an efficient, modern atmosphere.

Here the children and parents alike are taught to bring in their own bread. There are school rooms, medical clinics for the ailing, the teaching of trades, all the machinery of modern settlement work that would have set poor John Leake's head in a whirl.

Menus for the Family

Breakfast: Cantaloupe, Prepared Cereal, Bran Flakes, Scrambled Eggs, Fresh Grape Jelly, Coffee.

Luncheon: Creole Green Corn, Whole Wheat Bread and Butter, Sliced Peaches, Cup Cakes, Milk.

Dinner: Broiled Steak Smothered With Onions, Boiled Potatoes, Eggplant, Lemon Dessert, Coffee or Tea.

TODAY'S RECIPES: Creole Green Corn—Six ears corn, one tablespoon olive oil, one small onion, two sweet peppers, two ripe tomatoes, one-half teaspoon salt, dash of red pepper, one teaspoon sugar. Cut corn from the cobs, and put into frying pan with olive oil. Cook 10 or 12 minutes, add the sweet peppers chopped and the onion, then the chopped tomatoes, salt, sugar and dash of red pepper. Cook a few minutes and then serve.

Eggplant—Peel the eggplant, then slice it in quarter-inch thick crosswise slices. Let stand for 20 minutes in salt water strong enough to hold up an egg. Wash in clear water and drain. Cover entirely with sifted cracker crumbs, dip in beaten egg and then again cover with crumbs. Sauté quickly in hot fat, or if preferred fry in deep fat until golden brown.

Lemon Pudding—Two cups of water, one cup sugar, two tablespoons cornstarch, dissolved in water, juice of one and one-half lemons. Cook in double boiler. Whip into whites of three eggs beaten stiff.

Orange Egg-Nog—This is good when the appetite flags on a warm day. Beat a fresh egg until light but not foamy. Add to it a quarter of a saltspoon of salt, two teaspoons of sugar, a half cup of orange juice and a small half cup of rich milk. Mix well, dust with a tiny bit of nutmeg and serve strained into a cold tumbler. The ingredients should be cold before mixing, as the drink cannot be used for a child.

Hearty Milk Toast This is an excellent luncheon dish. Toast six slices of crusts. Put a cup and a half of rich milk into a saucepan and add a saltspoon of salt, a teaspoon of sugar and a heaping teaspoon of butter. When hot, thicken with a heaping teaspoon of cornstarch dissolved in a tiny bit of milk. Stir until thickened slightly, then turn upon the yolk of an egg that has been beaten. Dip each piece of toast in the milk and place in a hot dish. Then turn the remainder of the milk over all and serve at once. This is sufficient for two small children or one larger child.

A delegation of the Canadian Clubs will approach the new government when it is formed.

The question of the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee has been under consideration and at the convention held in Ottawa, two weeks ago, the carrying out of the scheme was left to the executive. The conference, representing Canadian Clubs throughout

the Dominion was strongly in favor of a fitting observation of the day.

COMMITTEE SOUGHT.

The delegation from the National Association of the clubs will urge the government to set up a committee, presided over by the Prime Minister or other member of the whole of Canada. This committee will have full charge of organizing the celebration. Members of the Canadian Club executive felt that it had to be taken up by the government and be given a national aspect, with celebrations in every part of the Dominion and at the capital.

Among the suggestions made to the Canadian Club members from different parts of Canada are: Invitations to the King and Queen, the lighting of the beacon fires across Canada, the holding of pageants in each city, the distribution of pictures of the fathers of the Confederation and other matters. The delegation, headed by C. G. Cowan, of Ottawa, chairman of the executive committee, and composed of the committee representing the whole Dominion will seek an interview with the Prime Minister as soon as he is in office.

SOME CHANGES ARE ANNOUNCED AT POST OFFICE

Sunday Mail Affected—Several Appointments and Resignations

Commencing next week there will be no incoming American mail on Sunday. Mail which would have been carried on the summer train from Boston will not arrive in Saint John until Monday morning and will come in on the train due to arrive at 6:15. Sunday mail from Saint John for the United States will be forwarded on the 4 p.m. train and will be transferred at Greenville Junction. This mail will close at the local post office at 8 p.m. on Sunday. The Sunday mail baggage train will cease with the inauguration of the winter train schedule and Atlantic standard time.

POSTAL CHANGES

A number of changes in postal service were announced yesterday and these include the opening of a new post

office at Kedgewick River, Restigouche, and the extension of the Hoyt Station Rural Route No. 1 to include the territory previously served by the post office at Juvenile Settlement, where the postmistress has resigned. Juvenile Settlement post office, it is expected, will be closed on Oct. 1. Mrs. Isabel Broderick has been appointed the new postmistress at Kedgewick River.

There are no less than 1,142 post offices in New Brunswick at which postal notes and stamps are sold and mail matter received and dispatched, and there are also 261 offices at which money order business is transacted. The rural routes and mail boat services carry the mails to every remote section of the province.

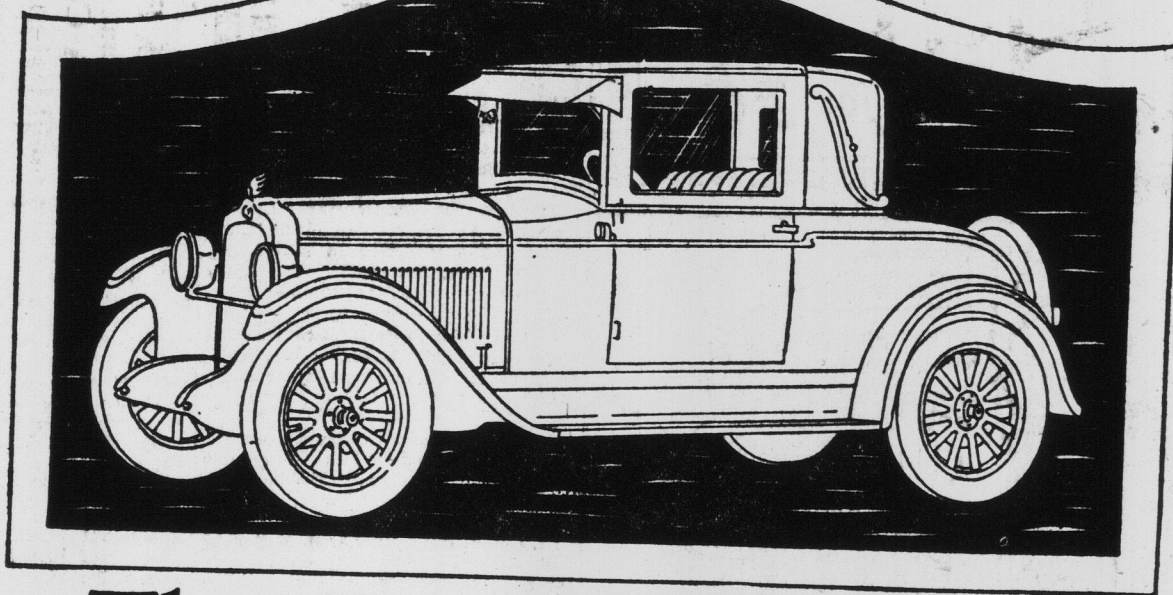

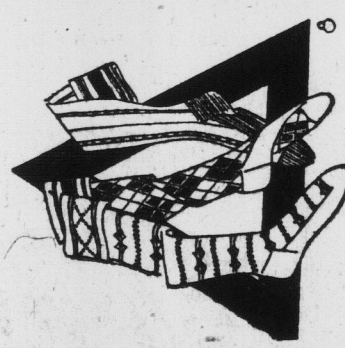
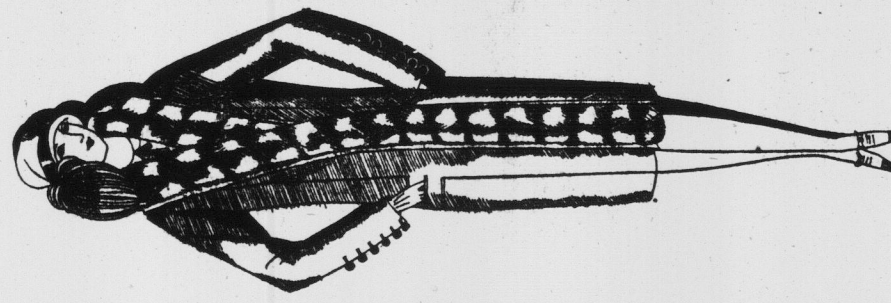

Pair, Possessing 3 Eyes and 3 Legs, to Leave From Paris

British United Press.

PARIS, Sept. 21—Just one month from the day that Captain Rene Fonck's huge plane crashed to earth at Roosevelt Field—on October 21—two hardy French air veterans plan to take off for Paris for a non-stop flight to New York.

It is a curious fact that Francois Coll and Paul Tarascon, who several weeks ago chose the tentative date of their departure selected on which was to be just a month after disaster had come to Fonck's New York to Paris enterprise.

Coll and Tarascon have only three eyes and three legs between them. Coll lost an eye in an airplane crash and Tarascon lost a leg during the world war.
