



ELECTRIC GRILL

Anthracite Operators' Exhibition.

New York, Feb. 22.-The "electric furnace man" machine which feeds coal automatically into the furnace and which also removes the ashes, is a principal object of attention at the anthracite exhibition of the general committee of Anthracite Operators here. The exhibition, designed to show domestic consumers of anthracite how to use the cheaper and smaller sizes in present installations, will continue until April 1.

The automatic furnace feeding m The automatic furnace feeding machine consists of a large hopper which may be filled with about 250 pounds of coal. A revolving worm-driven carrier conveys the coal to the furnace. A blower gives alr to the grate and makes a forced draught. The machine can be adjusted to burn as little as two pounds of coal an hour. Gravity is responsible for the dropping of the ashes to another worm-driven carrier and the residue is dumped into the sale. and the residue is dumped into the ash

The machine does away with hand-firing and the removal of ashes. The amount of coal fed to the furnace is regulated from the kitchen or dining room by means of an automatic attachment.



A SCHOOL FOR COMEDIANS.

Two actors hitherto unknown to the metropolitan stage have appeared lately with success' of such a decided nature that they are destined to hold their places so long as the playwrights afford them such ample means to display their talents, says the New York Herald. Walter Huston and Louis John Bartell both come from the stage of the so-called two a day. They are, in other words, the product They are, in other words, the product

of vaudeville.

It did not need the rise of these two players to suggest that the American theatre today offers no training school equal to the variety stage. Perhaps tragedians may not learn in the best manner there and the opportunity for the emotional actress may be slight. But for the lighter fields of drama variety fully equips its representatives. The two comedians that have been seen this winter are new evidence of the thoroughness of the school.

school.

In variety the actor must learn for himself. He has no famous director to transform him by a series of rehearsals into a finished performer. Of course no director ever made an actor, whether man or woman, the same finished player that time and experience do. The most they an accomplish with raw material is to produce the semblance of skill, which is in its final analysis no more than mimetic.

with raw material is to produce the semblance of skill, which is in its final analysis no more than mimetic.

The artist who has already learned some of the rudiments of theatrical technic may be helped by the intelligent control of a stage director. Yet this important stage figure cannot convert the beginner into the artist, whatever opinion on that subject may be today. The vaudeville player has no such vicarious means of acquiring experience. He must learn for himself how to make his points surely and promptly in the brief time that is allowed to a dramatic act on a variety programme. He must learn to use the most effective symbols and thus select the best. This is to be acquired only by his experience with his audience. He is, moreover, before a public that has come to the theatre to be amused and proposes to enjoy that pleasure or know the reason why.

The eminent George M. Cohan has always praised the field of vaudeville for its advantages as a means of learning the comedian's art. He is usually correct about matters of the theatre, and the frequent appearance of new players from that stage seems to offer proof that he is right again.



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


