
FOR NATIONAL **IDEALISM**

Canadians Should Set Definite Standard as to What They Read, Says R. J. C. Stead.

(Montreal Gazette.) "Idealism in Canadian Literature," was
the subject of an address by Robert J.
C. Stead, Canadian poet and author, delivered before the Montreal Women's
Club yesterday afternoon. Mrs. T. de

"The question often arises as to the possibilities of an eventual merger of Canada with the United States, and how the average Canadian feels about it," said Mr. Stead. "My occupation takes me to all parts of the Dominion and gives me an opportunity of getting in touch with Canadian sentiment, and I find that the popular idea throughout Canada is to pursue a course that will eventually lead to a national status." The greatest factor tending to this goal in Canada is through natural idealism, and national idealism comes from the literature of the country. "So long as Canadians depend upon outside literature they are preventing such development.

There are usually three mediums for the distribution of national idealism; magazines, daily and weekly papers, and book publications, and of the three the book publication is the most important. Today Canadian publishers are producing Canadian books for Canadian people, but not enough. Undoubtedly the most popular books of today are those of international interest, but the best books for the Canadian people are those of national interest.

Mr. Stead referred to the rather difficult position that today faced the Canadian author. In writing a book, if he confined it to Canadian interests, through patriotic motives, he was tied down to a strictly Canadian market with a small demand. On the other hand, if he wrote for the American people he had a demand from a market of a hundred million people, and from the author's point

of view, it was a temptation not easily resisted.

He also stated that poetry would be a great help in furthering a Canadian idealism. There were a good many associations in Canada terming themselves literary clubs the members of which usually confined their poetical selections with few exceptions, to the works of poets of the Victorian era, and forgot that there were Canadian poets. As a donsequence there was comparatively little demand for the works of Canadian poets, with the result that publishers poets, with the result that publishers would not undertake to publish books for an unknown author without preliminary payments being made. Mr. Stead read a few selections from his writings.

That is for Visitors Who Can Get Mark for One Cent-Best Hotels at \$5 a Day-Elaborate Dinner for Eight,

r. R. Ybarra, a well-known American newspaperman, now in Berlin, calls attention to a newly-coined word, invented in Germany to describe a condition which the Germans are not enjoying, but which many visitors are now delighting in for the first time. The word is "valutastark," and means literally exchange-strong. It describes the position of those visitors to Germany who find the their own money is worth so much more than the German money that they can live like millionaires in Berlin on sums that would hardly keep them comfortably in a city like New York. A short time ago the German mark declined to a point where it was worth just one American cent, instead of the twenty-five American cents which it represented before the war.
