Pitcher, desires to express its hearty sympathy with the work of the Society; rejoicing that God has so signally honored the Society in the past, we pray that richer blessings may attend its labors in the future. We would also affectionately urge upon our ministers

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and members the duty of co-operating with the agents of the Society as they may have opportunity, believing the Society to be in every way worthy of their support and confidence.

The chief details, showing the comparative merit of each candidate in the several subjects throughout the course, are fully disclosed in another document now laid on the table of Conference; it will, therefore, only be necessary to make a few brief observations of a more general character.

It has been the aim of your Committee, since assuming the important responsibilities which this work imposes, to elevate the standard of proficiency, not by too abrupt and sudden a transition, but by reasonable degrees, so that each succeeding examination may, if possible, be more thorough than its predecessor. Your Committee have a lively appreciation of the fact that we exist in a community whose facilities for enlightenment and mental culture are very great, and whose Christian teachers must, in consequence, be men of fair intelligence and reasonably well prepared for their We therefore ardently desire to see every cannoble work. didate for our ministry, as far as may be, a close and faithful student, a diligent and persevering worker in the mine of truth, and a man whose persevering toils will not be expended in vain in replenishing his mind with stores of useful knowledge. A close inspection of our work will disclose the fact that great prominence is given to Theology and strictly Biblical knowledge-portions of the course which, in our judgment, should be made even more extensive and thorough, if We have been much gratified with the strong evidence which the examination has afforded, that the brethren have, on the whole, been very diligent in their studies, and with a success, in many instances, highly creditable to them-Over twenty have passed in the various years of the selves.

Failures are, on the whole, but few, and not a single total failure has occurred; so that your Committee has the honor of recommending that in every instance the brethren be passed on in their probation. An instance or two have occurred requiring some degree of clemency from the Conference, which we would respectfully recommend, and which we think the Conference may safely grant, since the the brethren concerned have evinced a most satisfactory progress in their application to study and consequent success.

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ADDRESS TO THE CANADIAN CONNEXION.

DEAR BRETEREN,-

In the good Providence of God we have been once more permitted to assemble in our Annual Conference.

The greetings of the brethren were many and cordial; and we are thankful to note that not one of our number has been called away by death during the year.

It now becomes our cheerful duty to address, as a representative body, a few words of greeting and counsel to you, our constituents, to whom we are inseparably united by the endearments and bonds of the Gospel.

We came together with earnest desires that we might faithfully discharge our duty to ourselves and to you, so that, while we possess a good conscience, the whole church may realize a lasting benefit from our deliberations. We have been most hospitably entertained by the good people of Dunnville, and every respect and consideration has been shown to us as the messengers of the churches.

The question of union between our body and the Wesleyans was brought before us in the report of our Union Committee, and although a great deal of strong feeling was manifested on the subject, and a debate of nearly four days took place, yet we are happy to say that a spirit of brotherly love and Christian courtesy prevailed, and such arrangements were made as for the present are regarded by all as a satisfactory solution of the question.

We were agreeably surprised by the appearance of our old friend, the Rev. J. H. Robinson, amongst us, as a deputation from the English Conference. He was received by the Conference with every mark of respect and esteem which was due to him from his intimate acquaintance with, and former relation to us as a connexion.

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The Rev. John Medicraft, our respected General Superintendent, although known to many of us during the year, for the first time appeared before the Conference, and was, by resolution and in other ways, respectfully and cordially welcomed. And it is due to these brethren to say that through their council and influence we were enabled to arrive at a harmonious decision on the union question.

The 110th resolution of the minutes, you will observe, refers this question to you for final settlement, through your Quarterly Conferences; and, dear brethren, we most earnestly pray that Divine wisdom may so guide you in this matter that the church of Jesus may be benefitted and God be glorified.

The religious services of the Conference have been seasons of great refreshing; and a feeling of brotherly love and supreme desire for the glory of the Master has pervaded all

the business and devotional exercises.

The Evangelical Witness, we are happy to tell you, is still highly appreciated by us, and the work of the editor, the Rev. D. Savage, is regarded as very satisfactory. We commend to your notice this valuable paper, and hope that every effort will be put forth in order to extend its circulation amongst us. No family of our church should be without it. In subscribing and canvassing for it you are helping forward the work of God. It will be of great service to you, brethren, in everything. Its matter is instructive and edifying, and we are thankful for such an auxiliary to the work of God. Bro. Savage has been re-appointed editor, and the same general arrangements as last year were made.

The reports from our Circuits are, for the most part, encouraging, and yet the decrease in our membership is a most humiliating aspect of the work, and should certainly lead to serious searchings of heart. Brethren, if we all live aright, and work faithfully, we should not have a decrease in our membership. We may to some extent account for the decrease in the large number of removals which have occurred, and also by noticing the list of members on trial, yet if we all—ministers and members, local preachers and leaders, and all—really felt the force of full responsibility in leading souls to Christ, there should not be this sad result.

Suffer the word of exhortation, brethren, and this we

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take to ourselves. Souls must be converted;—through special services, the ordinary means of grace, in the Sabbath Schools, the congregations, or in our homes; on the Sabbath or the week day, any time, any where—but, brethren, they must be converted!!

We must push forward this work always in the spirit of holy desperation and with Divine enthusiasm. Do not depend upon the minister, and let not the minister wait for the members, but let each man work as if each were alone responsible for the results, and with God's blessing we must

succeed.

To fit ourselves for this holy and God-like work we must attend strictly to personal religion. Inward heart devotion—deep, unreserved consecration—will lead to abundant labors for Jesus and for souls. Nothing, however, can present a sadder spectacle than a man whose life will not bear the careful scrutiny of the world, enthusiastic after the salvation of men—a blind leader of the blind. On the contrary, there is no nobler object for the universal gaze than an humble, consistent man, with soul fired with the love of God, seeking everywhere the erring and sinful.

Let us not assume ourselves better or holier than others, but with a zeal that could wish ourselves accursed for our brethren, let us press hard forward to the rescue. Dear brethren, if such be our conduct, the result will be right, and we humbly submit that if we are more devoted, not in name merely but in heart and life, that next year we will not be compelled to mourn over a decrease in the membership of our beloved church.

"There is work to do for Jesus,
And the harvesters are few:
There's enough work for all to do."

During the year a resolution was submitted for your sanction, respecting an advance of \$100 in the salary of the ministers in full connexion, and by a large majority you have acceded to the request. For this we are grateful, inasmuch as the reasons set forth in the resolution submitted to you made it as desirable by the ministers as the granting of the request was honorable to you.

Two Acts of Parliament were procured during the year—one for the incorporation of our Conference, and

another for the Superannuated Ministers' Annuitant Society. These Acts were a necessity—in the former case to remove disabilities to the sale of church property, and in the latter to put the interests of the Superannuated Ministers upon a more permanent basis. The Rev. W. Tindall was appointed to procure the legislation for us, and the Conference approved of his labor, and presented him thanks and a small monetary consideration for his able services.

Four young men have passed their final examination, and have been received into full connexion and ordained.

The work of our Educational Board has been conducted with the utmost satisfaction to us, and the brethren of that Board have received the hearty thanks of the Conference, and have been re-appointed. The Stationing Committee having finished its work, the brethren appointed to your circuits are now sent forth. Receive them as the servants of Jesus; and "Esteem them highly in love for their work's sake."

And now, brethren, in conclusion, let us say that we most earnestly pray that the Divine blessing may rest upon you, your families and your churches this year, and may we all be especially prospered in the in-gathering of souls.

Your interests are our interests, and ours yours. "We are laborers together with God," let us do a good work. We are conservators of truth, let us "keep the faith." We are warriors, "let us put on the whole armor and fight a good fight." We are runners on the stadium of life, let us lay aside every weight, every besetting sin, and run with fleetness and patience towards the goal. After a while the labor will be over, and the Master will reward us; the battle will be fought, and we will have gained the victory; the race will be run, the goal reached, and we shall obtain from the hands of Jesus a welcome to the freedom and glory of the City of God.

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ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE CANADIAN CONFERENCE

TO THE ENGLISH CONFERENCE

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHERN,-

Grace be unto you, and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ, who gave Himself for our sins, that He might deliver us from the present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

We rejoice to learn of your undisturbed peace and unity throughout your connexion, and particularly your advancement and prosperity in your foreign work—where, among the teeming millions of that ancient and wonderful nation, China, your devoted missionaries, regardless of danger and death, are prosecuting their labors in proclaiming a religion older than the mythical superstitions of heathenism—a religion which ensures true freedom; emancipates the slaves of sin and hell; dries up the fountain of human misery, and makes "the days of heaven upon earth."

We, in this country, recognize your paternal wisdom in the appointment to the General Superintendency of the Canadian Mission of the Rev. John Medicraft, who, immediately upon his arrival last autumn, entered upon his duties, and in visiting the circuits and stations has been "in labors more abundant." His eminent pulpit abilities, his dignified and gentlemanly bearing, his kind and genial disposition, as well as his administrative ability, have already won for him a high place in our esteem.

One of the most unexpected and interesting events of the Conference was the appearance amongst us of an old and tried friend and brother, the Rev. J. H. Robinson. When we gazed upon his familiar face, as he entered the Conference church and passed up the aisle, a thrill of emotion ran through the assembly, and many tears were shed as one after another of the ministers and lay representatives greeted As your special representative, he was formally introduced to the Conference, and the most respectful attention given to the official communications he bore from you to us, as well as to his own statements on the subject of his mis-He will convey to you our Christian salutations.

During the past year our ministers have, with more than accustomed earnestness, prosecuted their great work. In many fields of labor "the Spirit has been poured out from on high; the wilderness and the solitary places have been glad for them, and the desert has blossomed as the rose." The day of God alone can reveal the full extent of our successes, for in a new country like this, removals annually place hundreds of our converts in sections where we have not as yet been able to plant our standard; and though we hope they find spiritual homes in other branches of the great Methodist family, yet numerically they are lost to us.

Our Conference now closing has, we believe, been one All the means of grace were of great spiritual blessing. God was graciously present in His Word, well attended. and in all the ordinances of His house, and to this we attribute the power of Divine love which eminently characterized our lengthened and exciting debates, during which not an unkind word was uttered, and to the conclusions of which

we were led with such perfect unanimity.

Though in the union of the two bodies in 1841 which now constitute the Methodist New Counexion Church of Canada, the Canadian Wesleyan Methodists furnished the great bulk of the membership, and perhaps all the church property with which the present body commenced its united efforts for the salvation of this country, yet we cannot be insensible of the fact that your missionary society has, from time to time, granted liberal aid to our Canadian missions, not only in money, but in the years that are past has sent out many excellent and devoted missionaries, numbers of whom are an ornament to our ministry-nor can we ever forget your paternal care during the many years of our present relation to you. With us, you will also rejoice in the wonderful advances our Scriptural principles of church-government have made in

this part of the empire.

When the heroic founders of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist Church raised the standard of liberty for the Methodist laity, the government of the Methodist church in this country was vested exclusively in the ministry, while the New Testament rights of the laity were almost ignored. Indeed, so little were our principles known, that it required almost superhuman courage in the few who asserted them—their motives being misunderstood, they were generally regarded as disturbers of the peace of the church, their names being cast out as evil, and themselves subject to obloquy and reproach, and in some instances persecution, for righteousness sake.

At that time this country was politically enthralled. A "family compact" of irresponsible persons controlled the destinies of the state, while a state-church, transplanted from the mother country, was the only Protestant denomination which enjoyed the privilege of administering the ordinances of our holy religion, and the most strenuous exertions. were made for the permanent and exclusive endowment of this sect from the public domain. Our church has lived to see all this political injustice removed; responsible government, on the basis of the glorious British Constitution, guaranteeing equal rights to all subjects, established; the abolition of all church monopoly, the entire separation of church from state, and the equality of all denominations of Christians in the eyes of the law. In the struggle to obtain all these great reforms, the benefits of which are now universally admitted and enjoyed in this land, our community was always found true to its principles, and yielded, we think, no little substantial aid to the friends of liberty. It

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might not seem vanity in us in this narration, to say that a tribute has been paid to our principles by their adoption, in a modified form, into the constitution of the disestablished church in this country.

Methodism has grown to be a vigorous and influential community, taking second rank only, in numerical importance, in the Dominion; while in other Methodist bodies which, like ourselves, have seceded from the parent denomination, lay representation is more or less recognized. So potent has been the influence of this principle upon the intelligence of our Canadian people, that the Wesleyan Conference has at intervals made important modifications of their system—from time to time extending the privileges of their laymen, until the church to-day could scarcely be recognized ecclesiastically as the body whose polity the sainted

Ryan and Jackson opposed.

Meanwhile, this country has grown from a few isolated colonies, with a sparse population, to a territorial extent of which the largest empires in Europe fail to give a just con-The now consolidated Dominion stretches across the entire continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, a distance of more than three thousand miles, embracing at present seven Provinces, some of which are larger than Great Britain-the area of the Dominion being one-third more than that of the United States. Over a large portion of this country the climate is almost as mild as Southern Europe, and our boundless forests and rich prairie land will furnish homes for scores of millions of our race. While most of our soil is superior, and our climate healthier, than that of the neighboring Republic, our political institutions being more stable, law and order more secure, the tide of emigration already turning to our shores is destined to increase every year-leaving upon the church of God a heavy burden of responsibility for supplying this in-coming people with the ordinances of Christianity. The Church of Rome, ever true to its instincts, is using all its agencies with unscrupulous zeal to establish its baleful dominion over the populations of these new territories. Protestantism, weakened by its divisions, finds itself unable to successfully cope with this anti-Christian heresy which presents a united front, and utilizes every grain of power it possesses. 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terian brethren have, within a few years past, succeeded in effecting a union of several branches of their church, and those hitherto comparatively insignificant sections now compose two large and influential denominations. It is, we think, no exaggeration to say, that by this union already effected, their influence for good has been augmented to a manifold degree, and negotiations for the consolidation of these two

denominations are now approaching completion.

It is our opinion that no system is so well adapted to win these populations to Christ as Methodism, with its glorious doctrines of a full, free, and present salvation by faith in Christ, its earnest and self-denying ministry; while its connexional and itinerating system seem to especially qualify it for its work. But alas, its denominational divisions weaken and neutralize its efforts for good. in this Dominion no less than five different denominations of Methodists, in many localities of this Province occupying the same ground, so that in such instances there is a superabundance of ordinances; families are, in many cases, divided in their membership between two or three denominations, and, not to refer to the alienation and bitterness sometimes engendered, resources are so weakened that missionary money is sometimes necessarily employed to meet the stipends of ministers in the old settlements and towns, and while this is the case no one Methodist denomination can supply the ever-opening fields which are ripe unto harvest, and, if not sooner occupied by Methodism, will be taken possession of by infidelity, Popery, and the less spiritual forms of Protestantism. So seriously has this aspect of the work of God in our country pressed itself upon the minds of earnest and godly men, that, with a view of economizing our resources, the subject of Methodist union has been prominently entertained, and committees have been appointed by several of the Methodist bodies during the past few years to confer with each other, and see if a basis could be found upon which they could unite. The result of these deliberations reveals the fact that, while in all the minor bodies there are numbers who earnestly desire union, the Wesleyan Methodists are almost unanimous in its favor. Their Committee and ours have been again in session for six days during the past year, and have succeeded in elaborating a plan, which, we believe, recognizes the great distinguishing

principle of our denomination. Providing as it does for equal numbers of lay and ministerial representatives in the District Meetings and General Conference, which latter court alone is to possess the power of legislating for the whole church, while we concede the withdrawal of lay representation from the Annual Conference, at the same time divesting them of the functions of legislation, and also securing an equal number of laymen in the composition of all financial committees, both in connection with the work of the General and Annual Conferences. The concessions in this arrangement are, we think, largely in favor of our principles. The basis, as contained in the resolutions of the United Committees, occupied the earnest consideration of this Conference for nearly four days, in presence of your special representative, as well as the General Superintendent; and after the subject, in its various relations, had been discussed, and with the concurrence of your representatives, it was resolved to adopt the United Committees' Report, subject to ratification by a majority of the Quarterly Conference We also agreed to send in their November sessions. deputation from our Conference to visit you next Conference, present our fraternal greetings and grateful acknowledgment and give full information relating to this movement to our fathers and brethren in England. We commend our belove brethren and their mission to your cordial reception and dis passionate consideration; and praying earnestly that the Great Head of the Church may guide the meetings to whom are remitted this important question, and that their decision may be in harmony with the Divine will and the highest interests of Christianity in the land. We greatly desire that, whether the present organic relation with you remain, or that we, in the proposed union, become a separate an distinct community, to be always united with you in tra Methodistic doctrine and zeal, and that fraternal love an sympathy may grow stronger between the two bodies We, dear fathers and brethren, entreat the time advances. aid of your intercessions at a throne of grace, while w shall continue to pray that upon your efforts to convert the world to Christ, and to spread Scriptural holiness, may re the rich blessings of FATHER, SON and HOLY GHOST, I TRIUNE GOD.
