The changes that had been effected were indeed important. The great fire had, of course, wiped all the old buildings of the grounds and nothing had been restored as it was before.



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while its weight must have been not less than 1,000,000 tons. It was grounded in water nearly half a mile in depth. What, then, must have been the thickness and size of the glacier from which this mass had become detached.

A remarkable solar prominence was lately observed by M. Thollon at the Paris Observatory. The protuberance rose vertically as a thin luminous jet, moving at the rate of about twenty miles per second, to a height equal to one-fourth of the sun's diameter, or about 215,000 miles.

A very curious proof of the identity of animal and vegetable protoplasm has been supplied by Claude Bernard, who has shown that both are alike sensitive to the influence of anaesthetics. Exposed to either, a sensitive plant no longer closed its leaflets when touched. Assimilation and growth, as well as germination, are arrested by chloroform.

The distance required for stopping railroad trains increases very rapidly with the increase of speed. In experiments made in England, the Westinghouse brake stopped a train moving at the rate of 41 miles an hour at a point only 485 feet from the place where the brake was applied, but as the speed was increased to 61 miles an hour the distance ran after the application of the brake was 1185 feet, and at a speed of 97 miles an hour, the train ran 2005 feet after the brake was applied.
