Perished in New York Apartment House Fire Jerome's Advice Monday Night.

New York, Dec. 11—A mother and her five children were burned to death in a lying about her.

The Thomasons lived on the fifth floor and the mother had heard the cry of fire, but in some manner the door leading to the hall became caught and the mother and ambulance surgeons. The de d are:

Mrs. John Thomason, the mother; her three-year-old twins, John and Anna, and her three sons, William J., aged nine years; Thomas, aged seven years, and Samuel, aged seven months.

Mrs. Thomason was found in her room,

The bodies of her little ones, badly burned, lying about her.

The Thomasons lived on the fifth floor and the mother had heard the cry of fire, but in some manner the door leading to the hall became caught and the mother and children were penned in.

The fire started on the first floor of the building and spread rapidly, cutting off egress by the stairs for the eight families occupying rooms on the upper floors. Policemen hurried up rear fire escapes and dragged women and children to safety.

The loss is estimated at \$40,000.


