HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FRIDAY, APRIL 14.

After recess on Saturday the third reading of the bill for the removal of the rails of the People's Street Railway Co. from Prince William street, St. John, was opposed by Hon. Mr. WILKS, and the bill was defeated.

The House voted into Committee of Supply and voted \$4,500 for mining purposes and \$5,000 for the codification of the laws.

Dr. Palmer's bill relating to the Great Marsh, the bill relating to public works, a bill to defray the expenses of the Civil Government, and a bill authorizing the sale of certain lands, were agreed to.

Progress was reported on the bill to incorporate the Industrial School of St. John.

To-Day's Proceedings.

The Secretary introduced a bill providing for compulsory vaccination in cities and towns, which was read a second time, committed and passed. It provides for compulsory vaccination in such districts as the Governor in Council may deem expedient, and that all expenses to be either wholly or partially a local or a provincial charge according to circumstances.

The Secretary, answering Gough, said he was not at present solicitor of the New Brunswick Railway Company; also that no formal negotiations have taken place between the local and Dominion Government to place the late Clark upon the superannuated list of the Dominion.

The House then rose till after dinner. There are ninety-six bills to be assented to, and the House will prorogue at 5 o'clock.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

On Saturday a bill to incorporate the Alma Lumber Co., and a bill to establish additional terms of the Westmorland County Court for the return of writs, were thrown out, and fourteen other bills agreed to.

To-Day's Proceedings.

The Council has been in session since 9 a. m., and a large number of bills have passed. Hon. Mr. Seely asked the Government if any provision had been made for the amount in the contingencies of last year for the Clerk's salary. Hon. Mr. Young replied "none."

The Revival.

Messrs. Clark, McLean & Co., lumber dealers in Boston, have failed. Their liabilities are from one to two millions. The failure is supposed to seriously affect many Nova Scotia and New Brunswick lumber shippers.
