HE BOARD OF EDUCATION of the Town of Simcoe is gratified to be able to announce that the year 1886 has been the most successful in the annals of Simcoe High School, as regards both the number in attendance and the educational results.

The steady increase in the attendance during the last three years is shown by the following figures:—

Number enrolled	104	127	149
Average	59	73	88

The wide disparity between the number enrolled and the average in each year is accounted for by the fact that many pupils leave in July, and many begin their High School course in September.

The character of the work done is, it is believed, keeping pace with the increase in attendance, as the following table will show:—

This gratifying increase has been made notwithstanding the raising of the standard of the Teachers' Examinations in 1885, and again in 1886.

Simcoe High School claims, in the results of the Second and Third Class Teachers' Examinations of 1886, the ELEVENTH PLACE among the hundred and six Schools of the Province, thirty-five of these having four or more Masters.

In general, the School is in a most satisfactory condition. The University Class is on the increase, the moral tone of the School is excellent, and numbers of intelligent and industrious pupils are giving unmistakable evidences of the energy and skill expended upon them.



### HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

This Examination is held half-yearly, in July and December. The subjects are the following, as far as is prescribed for the Fourth Form of the Public School course:—Reading, Literature, Dictation, Writing, Geography, Grammar, Composition, Drawing, History and Arithmetic. For full particulars as to limit of studies apply for circular to D. S. Paterson, B.A., Simcoe, or to Alex. Marling, Esq., Educ. Dept., Toronto. At Simcoe, sixty-six wrote at this examination in December, 1885, and thirty passed, and in July, 1886, seventy-five applied and thirty passed.

#### THE TOWN AND ITS ADVANTAGES.

Simcoe is a prosperous County Town, pleasantly situated in the midst of a rich, rolling, agricultural country, and drained by the river Lynn. It is six miles from Lake Erie. Unlike a city or a large town, it does not abound with those attractive but questionable resorts which not unfrequently beguile the young student to his ruin. The town contains a stately Court House, five large, handsome churches, two newspaper offices, two railroads, telegraph and telephone systems, numerous factories, large and well-stocked stores in every line of merchandise, and a Free Library and Reading Room. Its well-shaded streets, its pretty Lake George, its good roads and beautiful country, its pleasant situation, and the sociability of its people, combine to make it an agreeable place of residence.

#### THE SCHOOL BUILDING AND GROUNDS.

The building is favorably situated and is justly celebrated for the beauty of its grounds; the artistically arranged walks, lawns, shrubbery, trees and flower-beds, etc., being under the skilful care of the Janitor, Mr. Vernal Pettit, who lives on the premises. The ventilation and heating of the building are carefully attended to, while the class-rooms are furnished with every comfort and requisite for facilitating school-work. The rare beauty of the approaches to the school cannot fail to have a refining and elevating influence, and to produce lasting impressions upon the susceptible minds of the youthful academians that frequent this "grove of learning."

#### APPARATUS.

There is a valuable collection of chemical and physical apparatus, and the sciences are taught experimentally.

#### CLASSIFICATION.

The pupils are strictly graded according to aim, ability and scholarship. The special wants of individual pupils receive due consideration.

### REPORTS AND EXAMINATIONS.

Perhaps there is nothing in connection with the internal work that receives more laborious and careful attention from the teachers than the preparation of the pupils' reports and the system of frequent written review and practice examinations. These reports are issued at stated intervals and contain all details concerning the work and deportment of the pupils, their position in every class, rank in form, success or failure in examination, etc. The frequent written examinations not only necessitate careful review but also afford the pupil practice in putting his thoughts on paper, while the answers are not only valued but subjected to a rigid criticism, all errors and defects are marked and the papers returned for correction. An original essay is required from each pupil every fortnight or every three weeks.

# HONORS AND DIPLOMAS.

The Education Department awards a tastefully engrossed Diploma to each pupil that passes the Second Class Teachers' Examination or the University Matriculation.

Pupils that pass any Departmental Examination or the University Matriculation have their names inscribed in gold letters on the wall of the High School Assembly Room. Those that excel in class-examinations receive "thonorable mention" in the annual circular.

### THE LITERARY AND MUSICAL SOCIETY.

This Society holds its meetings fortnightly from 3 to 5 p.m., and has for its objects the training of the pupils in public speaking and reading, in 'essay writing and music, and in the proper modes of conducting a public meeting or deliberative assembly. A piano has been purchased by the Society, and music—vocal and instrumental—always forms a part of the programme. A Girls' Glee Club and a Boys' Glee Club have been formed and discourse before the Society sweet melodies.

The Society's work is conducted under the immediate supervision of the teachers, and every pupil attends, and takes part by rotation. A sprightly Journal in manuscript, entitled "The Mirror," is

issued fortnightly and read at the regular meetings.

Lectures or addresses from Clergymen and other prominent gentlemen of the town are contemplated.

### DISCIPLINE AND MORALE.

The discipline is firm but not severe, and the school does not harbor the indolent and indifferent. The general demeanor of the pupils has been and is most creditable to the school, and most agree-

able relations exist between teachers and pupils. All suitable efforts are employed that may tend to the highest moral and intellectual culture and to the development of such qualities of mind and manner as become young ladies and gentlemen.

### BOARD.

Parents who are obliged to send their sons and daughters from home to receive an education will find Simcoe High School very desirable from an economical point of view. Every necessary accommodation may be obtained in private homes at rates varying from \$2 25 to \$3 00 per week. When parents or guardians wish it, the Principal will exercise a kindly surveillance over students and will assist them in selecting suitable boarding-houses.



#### CONCLUSION.

This announcement is respectfully addressed to the Parents and Teachers resident in those parts of the county not included in the districts of the sister High Schools of Ports Dover and Rowan. The Board feels that it can, with perfect confidence, invite and urge parents to send pupils to Simcoe, where, under the care of an efficient staff of teachers, they will receive every attention, assistance and encouragement in the prosecution of their studies and in the development of character. A year or more from home spent at school amongst one's equals in age and attainments has proved in the majority of cases to be invaluable.
