





AN ELECTION

It is now generally conceded that Hon. "Bob" Rogers Minister of Public Works, will be unable to work the public to the extent of bringing on a general election in June. That is the latest report from Ottawa.

The Observer had it on the direct advice of W. F. McLean, M. P. for South York, Ont., that there would be an election on June 28. Later advices from Ottawa declare that there will no election until September at least. The minister of elections seem to be buried beneath the protests that come to him from all over Canada.

Liberals must not let themselves be caughtnapping however. Hon. Mr. Rogers is astute enough to know that it is a case of now or never with the government. The Observer has reason to believe that election preparations are going on quietly and that disolution will take place the last of this month and an election sprung on the shortest possible

In response to a telegram sent, to mayors of town all over Canada by the Toronto News, asking if an election should be put off long as possible, six New Brunswick towns answered emphatically in the affirmative, while three were willing to leave the matter in the hands of the government. The Woodstock Press siezes upon and publishes the opinion of the latter three, but ignores the overwhelming majority. It looks as though the flag-flapping Press, backed by Patriot Fleming would like to see an election during the empire's crisi's. If J. K. will be patient he will get his all right Evidently he still holds to his expressed theory that "there is no way to get votes like waving the old flag," and that now is a good time to go to it.






