A communication from S. W. Dimock, making enquiry re his proposition to build an opera house was laid on the table.

The annual statement of receipts and expenditures of the Board of School Trustees was referred to the Educational Com.

The salaries of the Secretary and Sanitary Inspector of the Board of Health \$50 and \$75 respectively were ordered paid.

A communication from C. S. O. Crockett protesting against the action of the Council in ordering supply of water shut off, was laid on the table.

Coun. Miller from the Assessment Com. submitted report recommending that rebates of poll tax for three years be granted E. Guidry. Report adopted.

Coun. McLellan from Electric Light Com. submitted annual report for the fiscal year. The report shows a surplus of nearly \$2000.

This report together with the annual reports of the Public Property and Street Com. and Poor Com., submitted by Coun. Joudry, will be published next week.

Mr. Dimock's proposition re opera house was then discussed and it was the feeling of the Council that it would be unwise to grant exemption of taxes without plan of building being first obtained from Mr. Dimock. The Clerk was instructed to write Mr. Dimock to this effect.

The Electric Light Com. were given power to purchase the supply of fuel for the season and meeting adjourned.

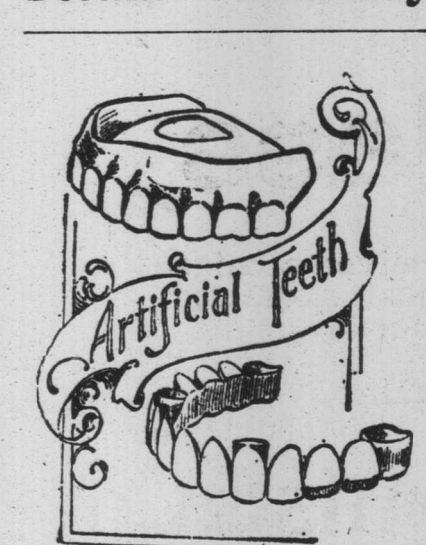

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I. C. R. PENSIONS

It is expected that in the near future there will be many changes among the I. C. R. trainmen and employees generally all over the road, as the result of the railway pension bill, which is expected to come into force on the first of next month. The number of employees, who will take advantage of the pension allowance is variously estimated at from one to five hundred. If the scheme works out as railway men understand it, the number who will retire from service will probably be nearer five hundred than one hundred. The maximum allowance to a retiring employee is understood to be two thirds of the salary he is drawing when he leaves the service, and the minimum sum is fixed at twenty dollars a month.

It is stated that many conductors and drivers will take advantage of the pension. There are a good many conductors, especially on the road at the present time, who have passed the age limit specified in the pension bill and many of them have been waiting for the retiring allowance they will now receive to quit the service. A large number of employees it is said, have already filed their applications for the retiring allowance, while on the other hand, old men, still active, are showing a disposition to remain in their positions as long as possible. Several well known conductors, running into Moncton and resident there, will retire from the service. Some of them have been in the service thirty-five or forty years and have reached the age at which employees will be allowed to retire.

There is as yet much speculation among railway employees as to just how the pension scheme is going to work out, and information from officials having instructions with regard to the working of the bill is being largely sought after.

There many employees from every branch of the service eligible for the maximum amount allowed. Naturally, the younger men in all branches of the service, after the bill, are looking forward to promotion in view of the anticipated retirement of so many of the older employees.

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Government Standard Seeds

Purchasers of red clover, alsike and timothy seeds who want a good clean article should see to it that the seeds they buy are clearly represented by a reliable person or firm to be of first quality, by being marked "No. 1," "Prime," "Fancy," "XXX," or such other designation for which a special standard of purity is fixed in section 4 of the Seed Control Act.

"Government Standard," is a term coined by seed vendors and may be misleading unless clearly understood. Section 4 of the Act timothy, alsike and red clover seeds are not allowed to be sold for seeding, either by farmers or seed merchants. This standard allows of the weed seeds named in the Act about 90 in one ounce of red clover, 200 in one ounce of alsike or 400 seeds. It is to seeds that will pass this lower standard, but are not sufficiently clean to grade "No. 1" that the term "Government Standard" was attached last season.

Some seed vendors have advertised seeds under "Government Seal." No Government Seal is used on any seeds offered for sale in the trade. Some reliable seed houses sell grass and clover seeds sealed by them and for which they alone are held responsible so long as the seal remains intact, but not after it is broken.

To avoid the provisions of Section 3 of the Act, which applies mainly to seed grain, some seed vendors represent to farmers that, on account of the Seed Control Act, they are offering their grain for sale for milling or feeding purposes. If offered for sale for seeding, such seed vendors are required to make clear to intending purchasers that the seed contains wild oats, wild mustard, cockle and such other noxious weed seeds when they are in the seed. The object of the Act is to protect farmers who want to protect themselves against such weeds. It provides the means for farmers to buy seed intelligently. Farmers who deliberately buy feed grain and use it for seed can scarcely hope for legislation that will protect them from loss on account of noxious weeds.

UNFAIR TREATMENT.

The Tribune of Saturday, March 30th published a three and a half column article on the unfair treatment it has received at the hands of the Town Council and endeavors to prove certain things but to our mind fails miserably. Brother Crockett should know enough about business transacted with corporations to understand that verbal agreements do not count. Suppose Coun. Taylor did promise the Tribune water power for eight years and suppose he (Taylor) does not seek re-election, is defeated, moves away from town or passes over to the great majority, how in the name of common sense is the Town Council to know anything about the agreement which the editor of The Tribune says was merely a verbal one between himself and the chairman of the Water and Sewerage committee.

Mr. Crockett should have made arrangements for other motor power when the first notification that all motors would be shut off was given. He had the same chance as the publishers of Events and should have availed himself of it. When we received the said first notification, steps were immediately taken to install a gasoline motor and we would right here contradict certain statements made by Bro. Crockett.

No. 1. He says that "We will not deny that Couns Taylor and Andrew had no knowledge of Events having installed a gasoline engine, but the other member of the committee H. McLennan, certainly had good reasons for knowing same was installed because machinists usually do that class of work."

In reply to this we may say that Coun. McLennan or the firm of Duncan & McLennan had nothing whatever to do with the installation of our gasoline engine. The concrete base on which our engine stands was built by Mr. John Dickie. The engine was placed in position by ourselves and the pipe connections were made by workmen in the employ of W. P. Forbes and under our personal supervision.

No. 2.—"In regard to their statement that Mr. Anslow took no steps to install a gasoline engine until after being notified water would be shut off, we will not contradict it, inasmuch as Mr. Anslow was notified before the Tribune was established that water would be shut off. Mr. Anslow has received three notices whereas we have only been favored with two."

We can say in reply to this that we have received but two notices, both within the last four months. There may have been some discussion in the Town Council re the shutting off of all the water motors prior to our coming to the Town of Campbellton, but we only received the two notices.

No. 3.—"It may seem rather surprising to the water committee, or for that matter to the Town Council, when we state we can positively prove under the sworn testimony of three of the most respectable residents in this town, that the proprietors of the Events put in their gasoline engine for the reasons already mentioned by Mr. Crockett."

The reasons referred to in the above clipping appeared in a former issue of Tribune. Mr. Crockett said that the proprietors of Events installed their gasoline engine because their water motor was not furnishing enough power.

This is ridiculous. If we want more power, would we go to the expense of putting in a gasoline engine which cost nearly four times as much as a water motor? No, certainly not. We would have installed a larger water motor. But knowing the water situation we

knew that sooner or later the inevitable would come and when we received the first notice we made the necessary preparations, but Bro. Crockett like the foolish virgins of the parable came to meet the bridegroom without oil in his lamp, consequently Tuesday's issue of the Tribune was turned out by "man" power.

We are sorry that Bro. Crockett has been so short-sighted in the matter and should be get tired turning the crank on publication days we tender him the use of our press and gasoline engine. We may add in conclusion that we do not consider that The Tribune and Events have been unfairly dealt with in this matter. We both had the same chance. One took the hint, the other didn't. That's all.

MARCIL'S SPEECH.

(Continued from last page.)

that when a Canadian becomes an American citizen you will never find a better citizen. [Applause.] You will never find a man that is more loyal and is more devoted to your flag. Circumstances are changing, Providence has smiled upon your efforts for a century. For 100 years you have attracted the attention of the world. America is being filled with the youth and the manhood of all nations; the world has seconded your efforts to make of this country what it is today.

But Providence seems to think that the time has come when some attention must be given to the northern part of this continent and the result is that a new nation is rising in the western hemisphere—a friendly rival of the United States. We are beginning on a small scale, but last year 50,000 American settlers crossed into Manitoba and into Alberta to take up farms in our Canadian dominion.

They came from every part and every state of the American continent, but largely from Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Montana, Washington and other northwestern states. They are welcome. We do not wish in Canada, with our small population, to undertake to assimilate the races of Europe, but we are always glad to extend the hand of fellowship to an American who feels in his blood and in the marrow of his bones that spirit that builds a nation upon the basis of the principle of government and equal citizenship and equal rights for all.

We are beginning today that great work in earnest. We are beginning to give to America its second great nation. The president kindly said that I was not a prophet in this country though I might have been a prophet in my own country, which I deny, for a man is never a prophet in his own country. You have heard of annexation between Canada and the United States. What the future reserves for us no man knows, but I can say this. Ladies and gentlemen,

men, with perfect sincerity, that no matter what the future may have in store for us we shall always try to maintain in the northern part of this continent the great ideas of the mother country from which we come. [Applause.] We are the sons of Great Britain and in Great Britain we find the English, the Scotchman and the Irishman. In all of these we shall find men that are able to build other nations.

You have here present with you tonight men allied with your industries. You have Senator Edwards, of the Canadian senate, one of the premiers of lumber industry in Canada, a man who knows all about tariffs, who will tell you that the Canadian people have been told to go beyond the ocean to find a market which was refused to them in the United States. We have heard a great deal of tariffs, and I have no intention of speaking on that now, but I may say that Canada as small as it is today is your third customer. Your first is Great Britain, your second Germany and your third customer is Canada. We are buying today from the United States \$200,000,000 worth more than the whole of South America combined. We send here less than \$100,000,000, and we are sending three times that amount across to the mother country where we found a free trade market which was denied us here. Instead of going north and instead of going south we have had to reverse the lines of geography and extend our trade from east to west, and today Canada extends from the Atlantic on one side, the Pacific on the other, and the north pole on the north, and at all times, for every good cause, we are all prepared to extend to you Americans the hand of good fellowship. [Applause.]

My last words, ladies and gentlemen, will be an apology to the ladies for having kept them so long, but that will be easily explained when I tell them that I am a Canadian—I am of French and Irish origin—and that we in Canada our national anthem always sing first and above all about the glory of womankind, and on the behavior of our Canadian woman, if I had that power I would extend to the magnificent representation we have here tonight the spirits of friendship that I have extended to our fellow guest tonight. [Great applause.]

the St. Alexis bridge, with power to have and perform hereafter, all necessary work and repairs required for its maintenance at the cost of the two municipalities which such bridge divide.

Moved by Dr. Martin seconded by Mr. Arseneault that having heard the reading of a letter from the Attorney General's Department Quebec in reference to the report of Mr. Duhamel the Inspector of Registry offices, relating to the necessity of having a fire proof vault built for the use of the Registry Office of the second Registration Division at Carleton. Be it resolved, that such vault will be built as soon as possible in the house of James Verge Esq., the present Registrar with the understanding that the said Registrar will furnish such local and maintain the said office as formerly.

Moved by Mr. Arseneault seconded by Mr. Mill that Public Tenders will be asked for the building of a fire proof vault for the use of the Registry Office of the 2nd Registration Division at Carleton, in the house of James Verge Esq., the present Registrar and that Dr. H. J. Martin, Mayor of Carleton be authorized and empowered to issue said Tenders and to receive and accept the same also to accept the one that he considers the most advantageous to the said division to conduct and oversee the construction of said vault and to accept same after construction if it proves satisfactory, the whole to be done according to the plan 4 specifications furnished, in a workmanship manner by the contractor, to the satisfaction of the said H. J. Martin Esq.

The specifications to be as follows: To be built of stone, brick or concrete as considered most desirable, with double iron doors similar to the vault in the Registry office at New Carlisle.

The width of the interior from wall to wall to be 3 feet 6 inches, the length 5 feet 3 inches, and 7 feet high from flooring to top of vault, and the walls to be eighteen inches thick, the foundation to be at least four feet in the ground or until such vault rests on a solid bottom. Approved of.
It being now twelve o'clock at noon the meeting adjourned until 1.30 p. m. for lunch.

The hour of 1.30 having arrived and all the Mayors being present the Council then resumed business.

Moved by Mr. Arseneault seconded by Mr. Clement that seeing the position of Mr. Philip Ferland and others of the south east part of the Township of Restigouche asking to annul and rescind the erection of the said municipality made by this Council in March 1906, do lay over until next meeting, as the formalities by law in such cases have not been carried out.

Moved by Mr. McPherson, seconded by Mr. McRae, that the petitions and other documents now laid on the table and explained by the Secretary and Treasurer, relating to the division of the Township of Nouvelle and Thoribred and signed by Joseph Doherty and others do lay over until next meeting on account of the required notices, not having been given, owing to delays, but the Secretary was requested to give the necessary notices in time for the September meeting next.

The Secretary Treasurer then laid on the table notices from the Quebec Oriental Railway Company and the Bonaventure and Gaspe Telephone Company, Limited asking their incorporation by the Federal Government of Canada, which were unanimously approved of by the Council and adopted and the Secretary Treasurer was requested to accede reception of such notices to the proper parties interested.

Moved by Mr. Clement seconded by Mr. McPherson that the Secretary Treasurer do enquire from Mr. Marcell, our Federal member, the reason why the Railway from New Carlisle to Fort Daniel has not been in operation this present winter.

Moved by Mr. McRae, seconded by Mr. Clement that hereafter the Mayors attending the meetings of this Council will defray their own expenses, or such expenses to be paid by the municipalities which they represent and not to be borne by a tax on the County as last year.

Moved in amendment by Mr. McPherson seconded by Mr. Richard that the County Corporation will pay the actual travelling expenses of the Mayor attending the settings of this council, under the following tariff: Viz.—Travelling by Railway 3c per mile and travelling by horse and vehicle where no train is running to cents per mile and \$1.50 per day for expenses. The amendment being voted upon was carried and main motion lost.

Moved by Mr. Landry seconded by Mr. Doreche that the account of expenses of the Mayors attending the last September meeting as well as the expenses of this meeting be sent to the Secretary Treasurer before the 1st of April next ensuing to enable him to

include such amounts in his general collection Roll on the County this year.

Moved by Mr. Chapdelaine seconded by Mr. Clement and unanimously resolved that seeing the increase of work pertaining to this Council yearly that the Secretary Treasurer's salary be fixed at the sum of \$90.00.

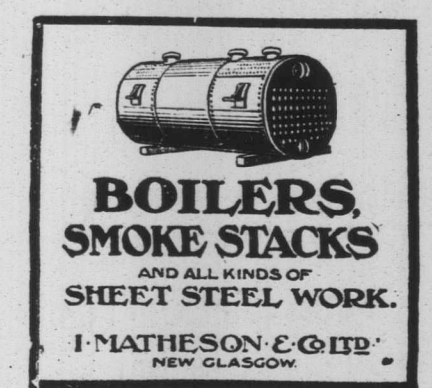

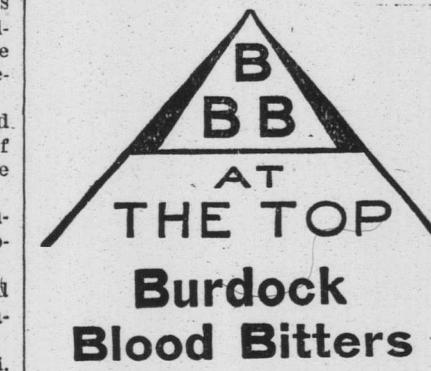

B., March 22.—In the legislature this afternoon Premier Pugsley gave notice of the following resolution: "I stated yesterday that a proposal was before the government with regard to the construction of a railway down the valley of the St. John river from Woodstock to St. John. The government have reached a conclusion in regard to this matter and I rise to give notice that when bill No. 11 is before the house I will ask that it be amended so as to give assistance to the Canadian Northern Railway Company—McKenzie & Mann—to construct this line to the extent of a guarantee of bonds bearing four per cent interest at \$15,000 a mile."

The above mentioned bonds are to be first mortgage bonds. In the municipalities committee, the St. John bill was amended so as to decrease the proposed number of alterations to seventeen. There will be no plebiscite on the question, but the City Council will be authorized to let the people pass on any future change.

Fredericton, March 23.—On the order of the day being called, Hon. Mr. Robinson made his maiden speech as a member of the government. He said in part:—

"A great deal is being said by the opposition in regard to the debt of the province but after all is our debt such a burden? It amounted to just \$10.20 per head of the population as compared with \$37 for British Columbia; about \$60 for City of Montreal; and \$116 for City of St. John. If we consider what our assets are there is certainly no portion of Canada that is in a better financial condition. There is no better test of the prosperity of the people than the amount they have in the government savings bank and in this respect New Brunswick stands ahead of every other province. In 1904, which is the last return I have, the people of New Brunswick had in the savings bank and postal banks \$10,310,511 or \$93.87 for every man, woman and child in the province. This is nearly double the amount held by the people of Nova Scotia, who have in the savings banks \$7.49 per head and more than double the people of Ontario, who have \$12.29 per head. The average over all Canada is \$12.72 per head."

"I believe there is no province in Canada in which the average condition of the people is as good as it is in New Brunswick. Let us take a glance at the resources of the province. We have 10,000 square miles of well timbered land on which there is an average growth of 300,000,000 superficial feet every year, while the amount

MAJORITY OF PATIENTS WOMEN

square annually is considerably less than half that. It follows therefore that our crown lands are constantly increasing in value and surely some credit is due to the policy of the government which has conserved our forest wealth.

A former government of this province gave away 1,600,000 acres of our crown lands worth at the least calculation \$3 an acre, while this government pursues an entirely different policy and keeps the crown lands of the province in a constant state of improvement.

There is another matter and a very important one in regard to which I wish to speak. This \$130,000 which we are to receive from the dominion government may be applied as to greatly reduce our interest accounts and in the end wipe out our entire indebtedness. This province has \$40,000 worth of six per cent debentures falling due between now and the year 1911. There are other debentures falling due within the same period amounting to \$2,652,000 on which we pay \$125,181 interest. It is the intention of the government to set aside this sum of \$130,000 a year for the payment of special debentures to be guaranteed by the government of Canada. We hope to negotiate these debentures at three per cent or near it and this sum will save us at least \$50,000 in interest, which sum will be set aside as a special fund for the repayment of the debt. In fifty years this sum, principal and interest, will amount to \$3,483,000 or considerably more than the net debt of the province. I think that this measure will commend itself to every member of this house."

Fredericton, March 23.—The house met at three o'clock. Mr. Pugsley said: It will perhaps be proper for me to indicate the course of procedure. We will adjourn the house from Thursday evening to the following Tuesday, so as to enable members to go home for the Easter holidays. After that I think we will, by holding night sessions, be able to dispose of the public business in about ten days or so. I do not think that anything will be lost by adjourning over the holidays.

Among others, the following bills were agreed to:—

The bill to amend the act to authorize certain of the inhabitants of the parish of Bathurst to assess themselves for lighting purposes.

The bill to incorporate the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu, Tracadie, N.B.

On the consideration of the bill to amend the Consolidated Statutes respecting the protection of sheep from dogs, Mr. Pugsley explained that the bill was brought in at the request of the New Brunswick Farmers' and Dairymen's Association. The law as it is at present was that dogs should be taxed, but that on the petition of 15 ratepayers in parish the council might pass a by-law rendering the act inoperative, and this power had in most instances been acted upon. It was now thought desirable in the interests of sheep raising that the council should have the power to bring the act into operation and that the bill was to enable it to be done.

Fredericton, March 26.—Premier Pugsley submitted the following correspondence between himself and McKenzie & Mann re Valley Railway.

Ottawa, Ont., March 20, 1907. Hon. Wm. Pugsley, LL. D., Premier of New Brunswick, Fredericton, N. B.:

Would suggest you take legislative authority to make arrangements guaranteeing our bonds to exceed fifteen thousand dollars per mile. Will promise to have matter thoroughly investigated by our engineers and will enter into contract providing we find route satisfactory from engineering and traffic standpoint. The contents of this message can be used at your discretion.

WM. PUGSLEY.
The enquiry under oath into the charges which have been made in connection with alleged irregularities at Balmoral in the recent by-election in Restigouche county will open in Fredericton before the Committee on Privileges of the Legislature on Wednesday of next week.

A scheme to provide a pension fund for teachers has been brought before the members of the government by the American Company of Canada, and should the company's proposals be viewed with favor by the teachers it is likely that the government will adopt the scheme. Both the government and the teachers will contribute to the

scheme. G. W. Lovell, of Winnipeg, managing director of the company, and A. E. Will, of Halifax, maritime province superintendent of the company, have been here interviewing the government. Their plan, it is understood, carries with it a pension for teachers giving up the profession at sixty, a gratuity retiring allowance, and insurance and disability allowance. The government will not take action until the matter has been brought before the teachers' institute.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced his motion to guarantee bonds for \$15,000 a mile if the Canadian Northern Railway Co. (MacKenzie & Mann) would construct a railway from St. John to Woodstock through the valley of the St. John River. He said:

We shall not guarantee these bonds until we are sure that the proposed line will form part of a transcontinental system. We could not expect the house to support us otherwise. As a local road it would no doubt have considerable traffic, but I would not be justified in guaranteeing it to such an extent in a mere local road. It will be our duty to see that it is part of the transcontinental system and also to see that the bonds are guaranteed by the C. N. R. Their obligation must stand in front. We must have first of all a mortgage on the rolling stock and other franchises, tolls, etc., then we should have the guarantee of MacKenzie & Mann and the bonds would come next to them. There will be no guarantee of bonds unless the C. N. R. is ahead of them.

Mr. Hazen—Do I understand that the C. N. R. would be primarily liable?

Hon. Mr. Pugsley—The C. N. R. would be held liable and the government would have recourse against them. A great deal has been said in this house about doing business by telegrams, but I would inform the gentlemen that the C. N. R. and MacKenzie & Mann carry through most important business by telegrams. The fact is MacKenzie & Mann are the C. N. R., and whatever they say is final. There are no stockholders or directors to call together and they are therefore enabled to conclude immediately very important undertakings.
