GERMANY ASKED TO SUBMIT

Meeting in the British Capital Might Become Unnecessary Because of Ridiculous Offers of Berlin Government -Unless More Reasonable Plans Are Outlned by Germany, Allies May Deliver Ultimatum Demanding Acceptance or Rejection of Reparation Terms.

Paris. Feb. 17.—Germany has been asked by Great Britain and France to communicate to them the counter-proposals of the Berlin Government before the opening of the London conference, which is fixed for next Monday, says the Journal. The newspaper adds it "would not be surprising if the conference should become unnecessary because of the derisive character of the German offers." In this case, it is said, the Allies will notify Germany of their decisions and give the German cabinet a few days to make known if it accepts or refuses to execute them.

A Mayence dispatch to the Echo de Paris says the German proposals will be "intentionally derisive," to influence the plebiscite to be held in Silesia. Rumors that Charles Laurent, French ambassador to Germany, will leave the Berlin embassy after the London conference are denied.

TOLEDO BANDITS GET SIX SACKS REGISTERED MAIL

Hold Up the Clerks About to Enter Postoffice.

Toledo, Feb. 17.—Police have recovered a stolen automobile used by bandits in holding up four employees of the Toledo postoffice early this morning, and stealing six sacks of valuable mail.

Postal employees admitted that the loss may total nearly half a million dollars.

Toledo, O., Feb. 17.—Five armel bandits, one of them a negro, held up two clerks at the main postoffice at Madison tavenue and Thirteenth street at 2 o'clock this morning, seized six sacks of registered mail, and escaped in an automobile.

The mail had just been removed from an incoming train at the union station and was about to be carried into the postoffice a mile distant when the robbers drove up in their automobile and forced the clerks to lie face downward

forced the clerks to lie face downward on the pavement.

Four minutes elapsed from the time the robbers drove up to the postoffice until they had seized the sacks and were on their way.

The stolen mail was from eastern points and Cleveland, according to Post-sonal charge of the investigation.

Postmaster George W. Lathrop this morning was unable to give an estimate of the value of the mail stolen, but said he belleved it would reach a large sum. He asserted that it may be two or three days before the source of the mail and the contents of the sacks can be checked up

TWO ARE MURDERED BY MASKED BANDITS

DUTCH MUST BEAR EXPENSE OF KEEPING EX-CROWN PRINCE

The Hague, Feb. 17.—Because the Dutch Government insists that former Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany live at Wieringen, and at no other place in Holland, the Government will continue to bear the cost of his residence there. This statement was made today by Prime Minister Jonkheer Ruys de Deerenbrouck in answer to a demand made in a report by the second chamber that Frederick William should pay for his own upkeep.

The answer of the prime minister also revealed officially the status of the former crown prince in Holland. "The actual internment of the former crown prince ended a few days after his arrival in Wieringen," said the minister.

"In the meantime," the minister continued, "the island was fixed up as a place for his residence, and it was a matter of course that the expenses resulting from this Government order were paid by the treasury. The costs only amounts to the rent of a very simple house and the furnishings and maintenance of it."

SINN FEIN WILL **DEFY VATICAN IF** POLICIES CLASH

Official of Self-Determination League Assails Cardinal Bourne.

BECAUSE OF LETTER

Declares Pastoral Leaves Impression of Disgust in Minds of Irish Catholics.

London, Feb. 17.—Indignation was caused among Irish Catholics in England by the pastoral letter written by Cardinal Bourne, archbishop of Westminster, which was read in English churches under his jurisdiction last Sunday, said a statement issued here today by Art O'Brien, secretary of the Irish Self-Determination League. O'Brien incidentally declared that the Roman Catholics of the Sinn Fein inflection in Ireland would not accept political guidance, even from the Vatican.

Cardinal Bourne's letter, referring to recent Sinn Fein atrocities, warned people of his archdioecese not to allow themselves to become implicated "by active sympathy or even actual co-operation in societies and organizations which are in opposition to the laws of God and the Catholic church." In the course of the letter, the cardinal reference and outrage" in Irecourse of the letter, the cardinal refer-red to the "horror and outrage" in Ire-

red to the "horror and outrage" in Ireland.

Calls It Un-Christian.

"His eminence." the statement declared, "may rest assured the only impression left upon the Irish laity, as well as the Irish clergy in his archdiocese, by such letters, is one of disgust at his narrow and un-Christian attitude."

Mr. O'Brien referred to Cardinal Bourne's attitude toward Sir Roger Casement, who was executed for high treason during the war, and characterized it as "not only un-Catholic but anti-Christian." He also expressed displeasure because the cardinal has declined to aid the campaign of anti-British propaganda conducted by the Sinn Fein and similar organizations. The cardinal, he said, refused to allow his name to be used in repudiation of "British barbarities in Ireland."

"Cardinal Bourne may hope," the statement continued, "that his partisan political lecture will help the activities of his Government at the Vatican, which during the past year have been very vigorous, and which, it was hoped recently.

Paris, Feb. 17.—Madame Louise Thulier, a Belgian school teacher, who was awarded the insignia of the Legion of Honor and the War Cross during the war, has chosen suicide rather than face exposure as a spy and a betrayer of patriotic friends, it is declared by today's newspapers. The woman, about whom revolved one of the most stirring tragedies of the war, swallowed rat poison at her home in the village of Wiheris, near Monsy yesterday, when called to appear before a magistrate.

BOLSHEVIKI TRYING TO GET INDIA TO REVOLT

London, Feb. 17.—Armed invasion of the Pamir region of Central Asia, on the thresholds of India and China, was begun by Russian Bolshevik troops last October, it is indicated by a communique just issued by the India office. The communique gave the text of an "order of the day" sent out on October 10 by M. Sokolinkow, chief commissioner on the Turkestan front, to a soviet division ordered into the Pamir. It stated the men should "make themselves at home," and carry on Bolshevik propagand a with a view to influencing the people of India to revolt against the British. "Comrades of the Pamir division," said the order. "You have been given a responsible task. The soviet republic sends you to garrison the posts on the Pamir on the frontiers of the friendly countries of Afghanistan and India.

The Pamir tableland divides revolutionary Russia from India, which, with its 300 million inhabitants, is enslaved by a handful of Englishmen. 

Canadian companies transacted nearly half of this business.

There were 134 fire insurance companies doing business during the year, and of these 39 were Canadian, 40 British and 55 foreign.





Sir George passed quickly from discussion on merely domestic matters, and entered the field of international politics. He regaled the members with a highly-interesting disquisition upon the League of Nations, explaining at length the duties and functions of the assembly, the council, and the international court of justice. But Government members either had known all about it before, or were not generally interested, for before Sir George was half way finished the treasury benches were emptted of all save himself, and the Government attendance to a score or so.

The war in South Africa struck yet another note and gave impetus to the development of that spirit within the empire.

In the great war, Sir George went on, Canada entered not simply with a desire to dethrone certain crowned heads but to procure the liberty and peace of the world; and so doing, Canada had related herself not merely to the rest of the empire, to the allies, but to the world.
