

### BEWARE OF THE BERRIES

An Expert Says Strawberries Cause

Washington, D. C., April 21. — Do strawberries cause suicide? Clifford Howard, assistant secretary of the board of commissioners of the District of Columbia, says they do, and in this opinion he is backed by a number of others here who are considered experts on the subject. Mr. Howard himself is a student of suicidal mania. His opinion was given because of the fact that in the last two days five residents of Washington have killed themselves or attempted to do so. Speaking of the present epidemic, Mr. Howard said today:

"It is a strange fact, but the records show that suicides are more frequent in the spring than at any other time of the year, reaching their height in June. There must be some reason for this, and some time ago I hit upon the strawberry as a solution. A study of the subject has developed that the eating of the fruit invariably produces trouble and pain in the back. It is so mental depression. 


