SHANGHAI, July 25 .- Advices from Seoul say the Japanese military commander at that place is concentrating his troops with the intentian of a ttacking the Chinese and Corean troops, who are encamped just out-

side the city.

London, July 25.—A vaguely worded cablegram from Yokohama states that the Japanese troops in Corea are marching against the Chinese position, and that a battle is imminent. The Japanese legation here say there are only about 200 Chinese troops in Seoul, while there are between 5,000 and 6,000 Corean, and about 6,000 Japanese soldiers there.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 25 .- The Novoc Vremya say Russia cannot remain indifferent to the fate of Corea, and ought to side with China against Japan, or else localize the war, the results of which show what measures it will be necessary to take to strengthen Russia's political and commer-

cial interests in the east. LONDON, July 25 .- In the Foreign Office the absense of information that hostilities have begun in Corea is regarded as ground for the hope that the report has been exaggerated. The members of the Chinese legation profess to believe that the reported encounter was merely an isolated street fight. Both the Japanese and Chinese Ministers affirm that they have received no advices, but it is known that voluminous cablegrams have been coming to both

throughout the day.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Central News says: "Numerous rumors of the further fighting at Seoul are current here, but none can be confirmed. The Coreans continue to menace the Japanese of the Seoul garrison. Intelligent native opinion here is there will be an amicable settlement, in which the Europeans will have no share. The Chinese arsenals and arms factories are busy night and day. The officers of the Chinese gunboats are filling the numerous vacancies on the vessels with seamen attracted by generous bounties.

There is a strong impression at the Japanese legation here that fighting is in progress in Corea, although no official notice to that effect has been received. Officials at the Chinese legation have

heard nothing of the reported sinking of a Chinese transport by a Japanese vessel. They say that their information indicates an important improvement in the situation, and they are hopeful that peace will be restored if it has been broken.

It is reported that 12,000 Chinese troops, who sailed on July 20 with eight warships, have been landed in Corea. This report is unconfirmed, but has been received with satisfaction by the foreign residents of

Shanghai. ST. PETERSBURG. July 25 .- The St. Petersburg Gazatte comments today on the haste with which Sir Frank Lascelles, the new British ambassador, assumed office after the Corean imbroglio took on threatening proportions. The editor says: "We hope that he will pursue the same peaceable policy as did Sir Robert Morier. It behooves him to use his best judgment and tact at the present moment to maintain and improve the friendly relations between Russia and Great Britain. The outcome of the present difficulties in Corea depends largely upon him and the Russian Foreign Office.



### WORLD'S FAIR PRIZES

For Canadians-Will Be Distributed Later Than Expected. OTTAWA, July 26.—World's Fair Commissioner J. S. Larke got word yesterday that the prizes won by Canadian exhibitors at the World's Fair would be available for distribution about the latter part of September or early in October. This information rather upsets Mr. Larke's plans for a public presentation of the prizes at the forthcoming Provincial exhibitions,

as the fairs are mostly over by the last week in September. There will be at least 1,163 World's Fair medals to be distributed among exhibitors. In all 250 prizes were won by Canadians, but in the case of cattle and sheep the prizes were mostly cash. The total of the premiums won by exhibitors of live stock from the Dominion was \$21,000.



THE WAR IN THE EAST OVER A

QUEER LITTLE KINGDOM. Corea, the hard-beset monarchy, in which a war is now in progress that bids fair to be participated in not only by China and Japan, but by interested European countries, is a peninsula adjacent to the great Chinese Empire, situated exactly opposite Japan, and but a short distance from that enterprising eastern nation. It has been well characterized as a backward, barbarous survival, around which international ambitions and rivalries center. Its population of 11,000,000 are almost entirely professors of the Buddhist faith, and they are strongly opposed to the introduction of Christianity. Corea is an eminently mountainous country, and is plentifully supplied with rivers. It has a fairly fertile soil, but the land is tilled according to the most primitive methods. There is little division of labor, each peasant makes what he wants, and the "jack-of-all-trades" system | the Toronto Empire said: of supply results in the usual crude, if not only manufacture is that of paper. The Coreans are tall and well-formed. They hold that they are virtuous because they love their children so ardently that they will neither slay nor expose them to danger. As a return, if a son meets a father in the street, he makes obeisance, and if a father is imprisoned. the son must tarry around the prison door to render aid at any time when it is in his

The Corean king is a grand fellow. He is known as "Son of Heaven," "King of Ten Thousand Isles," and so on, but with pay heavy annual dues. Among his own people, however, the Corean king is held to be so holy a personage that it is sacrilege to mention his name. Really he has no known name till he dies, and then his successor gives him one! To touch the king with an iron weapon is high treason. Any person touched by the king must always wear a brass plate to commemorate the event. Though the king is a hermit to the outside world, and as invisible to the populace as is the Emperor of China, he has not shut his eyes entirely to medern improvements. He has introduced the electric light into his palace.

Corea's troubles at the present time have their origin in the treaty between China and Japan, made in 1885. That agreement | to publish. China has only 2,000. The corruption of the Corean officials, the agression of the Mikado's subjects, and the failure of the Hermit Kingdom ruler to give reasonable guarantees that an improvement shall take place are the avowed reasons for the descent of the Japanese troops upon Corea. After the Japanese ships and troops had been in Corean waters and on Corean soil for a short time China insisted that justice had been done, and demanded that the Japanese troops and ships should be

Japan, following the precedent set by Britain with regard to Egypt, refused to withdraw her forces until order was restored, and guarantees given that her subjects should in future not be oppressed. In securing this, Japan expressed her willingness to co-operate with China. China has refused to cooperate, and practically takes the side of Corea. Hence the war now in progress.

The Japanese press watches with great ealousy the doings of China, and insists that the Japanese Government has a greater right to occupy Corea. The Yiji Shimbun, Tokio, says: "The Corean Government has asked China for troops, and 10,000 men have been dispatched by the Pekin Government. As these are far too many for the proposed work, we may expect to see great international disturbances. This is all the more the case as Russia also has dispatched some troops."

If numbers were all that counted, Japan, with her 40,000,000 people, would be nowhere as against Corea with its 11,000,-000 inhabitants and China with between 300,000,000 and 400,000,000. Japan, however, has a well-trained army and a navy equipped with all the modern improvements. Even before she opened her ports to western commerce, Japan sent soldiers to England for expert training.

The most alarming report is that Russia has a hand in the trouble. It is contended that Russia desires to possess Port Lazareff, in Corea, as a coaling station for her Asiatic fleet, and that she has entered into a secret treaty with the Chinese Emperor to have Corea partitioned. Great Britain is watching the developments closely. She leans to Japan in this struggle. If there is any attempt to partition the Hermit Kingdom, we may be sure that Lord Rosebery will be heard from.

Let no citizen of London selfishly suppose that the improvement of London's natural surroundings is a matter which does not interest him. The improvement of the river, the construction of a boulevard drive and an electric railway to the waterworks, the making of London a great picnicking center for the people of the West, will benefit every one who earns his or her







### ANOTHER OFFER.

The Street Railway Company Bids Again for the Electric Franchise.

The City Council's Proposition Not Accepted But Compromised-The Company Will Supply Labor and Material for Paving and Give Cheap Rates for Workingmen-Virtually Last Year's

The London Street Railway Company late last night placed in the mayor's hands buttermilks; \$3 to \$4 for fed calves and mixed a copy of their very latest offer for the the City Council at its last regular meeting was not accepted by the company. In it the council asked that the company supply labor and material for paving and repairing, named their own extensions and asked for a cheap fare of eight tickets for 25 cents, from 6 a.m. until 9 p.m. Yesterday's offer, which will be considered at to-night's meeting of the City Council, is a compromise on the council's proposition and is virtually the same offer as that made by the council last fall. In the compromise the company agrees to do its own paving and repairing and to supply material and labor. They also agree to accept some of the extensions proposed by the city but do not propose to give cheap fares all day long. Instead they will give eight tickets for a quarter, good between the hours of 6:30 and 8 a.m. and 5 and 6:30 p.m. Fare at all other times six tickets for a greater and 25 tickets for \$\frac{1}{2}\$. quarter and 25 tickets for \$1. If the city wishes to buy the road and plant at the expiration of the franchise the question of value is to be left to arbitration. Then there is a compromise on the snow clause. The city proposed that the company should remove the snow from sidewalk to side walk throughout the whole of their system. The company agreed to remove the snow from off their entire track allowance whenever ordered, and in the business portion of the city, within a radius of one-quarter of a mile from the corner of Richmond and Dundas street, and on Dundas from Adelaide to Rectory, they agree to remove the snow from sidewalk to sidewalk. A clause provides that ten hours shall constitute a working day. On a two-thirds vote of the council the company will lay down new lines or extend their present ones, and no such extension shall render the proportion of track mileage to population greater than one mile of single track to every 2,000 inhabtants in excess of the present population of 35,000. The company wants the privilege of crossing any of the bridges.

London South under the new offer would enjoy a belt line on York street, the Wharncliffe, Askin street and Ridout street south. A spur extends south to Briscoe street. No. 4 ward would also have the benefit of a belt line without using the dangerous C. P. R. level crossings. It would run on Adelaide from Dundas to Central avenue. Central avenue to Waterloo street, Waterloo to Pall Mall and thence to Richmond street. A line throughout the length of Oxford street would provide for the citizens living north of the track. The Richmond street track will (in case the offer is accepted) be extended northward to the city limits, and the Hamilton road line from Adelaide to Egerton streets, and Wellington south to Clark's bridge. The central portion of the system could then be operated in the shape of a gigantic figure eight, with the fourth and sixth wards forming the circles. The long lines south and north could be operated together.

The aldermen will consider the question at tonight's special meeting of the council, be dealt with.







following is clipped from the article: "In Blenheim, Ont., and publisher of the Blenheim News, lives a graduate of the London ADVERTISER office. Born in London, in 1856, of sturdy Scotch parents, Andrew Denholm entered the ADVERTISER office in 1873. Leaving there in 1880, he engaged in outside work for two years, and in 1882 took control of the Kincardine Standard. After putting some life into this paper, he sold it in 1885 to Joseph Lang, now of the Owen Sound Plaindealer. In February, 1886, Mr. Denholm started the Oxford Standard, Woodstock, a paper which boomed with the town in 1886 and 1887. In 1889 Mr. Denholm went to Blenheim Mr. Denholm, while in London, was president of the Typographical Union. While in Kincardine he was one of the high school trustees. Woodstock he turned out the first daily the town ever saw, and a proud moment it was both for the town and the publisher. Here also he was a leading society man and president of a co-operative factory.
