There is no certainty that there will be an engagement at all in the immediate future, the main purpose of the American expedition being to seize and hold some suitable Spanish territory in the Philip-

pines as a base of operations in Asiatic It is learned from what is considered excellent authority that the United States has no present intention of holding the Philippines, although it may be necessary to do so in order to force Spain to indemnify this country for the cost of the present war. 

Kingston, Ont., April 28.-The formal convocation of Queen's University last night was marked by a large and brilliant gathering. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was unable to be present, but was honored in absentia.

In presenting the name of Sir Wilfrid for the degree of LL.D., Prof. Shortt, of Queen's University, made an address which called forth vigorous cheers from the audience. Prof. Shortt eulogized Sir Wilfrid's fine personal qualities and public services. He concluded thus: "While yet unknown to fame, occupying the comparatively obscure position of a party leader, even St. Thomas, April 27.—Wheat, per bu, of this vast Dominion, Queen's may claim the merit of having discovered Sir Wilfrid Laurier's intrinsic fitness for academic or other distinctions. More than a year ago we proposed to do him the honor which I now claim for him. That he bears his laurels well is obvious to all, while he still continues to give proof of his eminent qualities, and of the many charming features of his personality. His position as a Canadian politician and statesman is unique, not the least evidence of which is his wholesome optimism that this country may yet attain to some individuality among nations on the basis of her own achievements, rather than seek to extract a precarious renown from the mistakes and shortcomings of neighbors.

Lyman Abbott's Cordial Remarks in Toronto-Angle-Saxon Unity Desired.

Toronto, April 28.-Dr. Lyman Abbott, pastor of the Brooklyn Plymouth Church, delivered a careful and thoughttion in Religion" at Association Hall of the present war. Canon Low, of Almonte, for the honorary degree of D.D., remarked that Queen's followed the spirit of the founders by enrolling members of various churches among its honorary members. Then he said: "Like Dr. Samuel Johnson, we deny that there are any fundamental differences among Christians. While, nowever, we honor all churches, we feel that none is more truly one with us in spirit, aims and national sympathies,

than the Church of England. Therefore, he offered the Canon of Ottawa diocese for a degree. "Canon Low," said the principal, "recognized the necessity of the church adapting itself to the soil of Canada, and becoming assimilated to the nation, if she would have influence in moulding the national life. 'Let us learn to Canadianize the church,' has been his constant cry. 

Wilson's report stated that a number of farmers had become so partial to Talbot street as a stand that he was unable to persuade them to back their wagons up to the sidewalk on the north side of the square. Something had to be done in the matter.

Ald. Hunt said a petition was now in circulation for presentation to the council to allot certain spaces to farmers. This, he said, had been his contention all along. Ald. Jolly, Stevely and Wilkey were opposed to the scheme.

The clerk explained that it was decidedly impracticable. This matter will be taken up when the deputation who visited Guelph, Hamilton and Toronto to gather pointers on markets shall present their re-

The market clerk was instructed to carry out the bylaw respecting obstructions on the market, and prohibit the hardware merchants whose premises abut on the square, from placing barbed wire coils on the side-

walk and square. The tender of Hinton & Rumball, for burying the dead of the city poor, was accepted at the following prices: Persons over 12 years, coffin with hearse, \$11; coffin without hearse, \$9; persons under 12 years, coffin with hearse, \$8; coffin without hearse, \$6. Ald. Stevely brought up the matter of watering the asphalt. He said it was being watered and yet the citizens received little benefit. He cited the system as worked in New York where the pavement was flushed every morning and scraped with a rubber scraper. No dust gathered on it. He didn't see why some such system could not be adopted here. Ald. Jolly explained that the system, to begin with, was too expensive.

Two rubber scrapers would be worn out in a day. The street cleaners were out one steel scraper per day. The matter was laid over. Frank Robertson, recently appointed to the city fire brigade, was instructed to secure a second report as to physical condition from Drs. Hutchinson and Moorhouse, the one obtained having been handed to the city clerk instead of Chief Roe. He will begin work at once if the report is satisfactory, and if not the matter will be referred to the council.

Irwin & Geldart, city, were awarded the contract to supply hose couplings expansion rings, complete, at \$2 15 per set. The committee considered the case


