## ON GRAND TRUNK NEAR KOMOKA

Old Man Struck by a Train and Probably Instantly Killed-Remains Unidentified.

· An unknown man was killed on the Grand Trunk Railway, near Komoka, some morning. All attempts to identify him have so far failed.

The stranger was about 70 years of age and was poorly dressed. It is thought he tracks when he was struck by an east or west bound train.

The man was struck in the back and was probably instantly killed. One leg had been run over.

Dr. Mitchell, coroner, of Komoka, was notified, but after an investigation decided that an inquest was not necessary. The remains are being held at Komoka by the Grand Trunk, in the hope that they may be identified.

## HAS HIT NAIL

bishop Ireland's Analysis of the Church Question.

Paris, Jan. 6. - Archbishop Ireland's sermon on the French situation has been largely published here since the arrival of the last mail. The Temps and Journal des Debats both comment upon it this evening.

While the papers hold different beliefs on the church question, both indorse Archbishop Ireland's perspiculty in grasping and pointing out a common French fault, namely, failure to understand, and therefore failure to attain liberty because the people are dominated as in monarchical times by the idea of the omnipotence of the state.

The Temps says: "Archbishop Ireland has laid his finger on one of our national sores, the absolute principle, now exercised only in another sense. Louis XIV. employed his power to externate heresy. The anti-clericals. today his successors, employ it to de-

stroy religion. "It is exactly the same abuse, namely, the state's power is put at the service of the religious or philosophic opinions of those who would hold back, and the liberty of individual belief is suppressed by the weight of a doctrinaire state."

It adds that France never will know true liberty until the state and people understand that going or not going to mass is a matter of conscience, with whatever to do. The whole matter lies which the Government has nothing in the education of the French people. The Journal des Debats refers to Ahchbishop Ireland's ready perception of the great flaw in French public life. and says that, unfortunately, there being a small number of citizens having the taste or the sense of liberty, the parties in power always encourage this motion. It adds: "There has been an attempt to separate church and state, but separation, which in the United States means liberty, signifies servitude in a country where the state tolerates no rival."

#### COUNT IS HORSEWHIPPED

Gems Has Grim Revenge.

Paris, Jan. 6-The Blue Diamond case in which the Count de Rodellec du Porzic accused M. Greger of stealing the gem from him at a country house near Brest, was dramatically brought before the public again yesterday.

The count was riding in the Bois de Boulogne, when M. Greger rode up and, witnesses state, struck him three or four times across the face with a horsewhip. The count turned his horse and rode away, but M. Greger galloped after him, whipping as he rode.

### ATLANTIC BUFFETS LINER ETRURIA

Terrific Seas Batter the Big Ship and Bring Death and Injury to the Crew.

New York, Jan. 6 .- One of her crew were killed and six others seriously infured when the Cunard liner Etruria was fighting her way through a severe storm Friday. The body of the man killed was buried at sea. The injured were in her hospital, when the steamer arrived today from Queenstown.

Early Friday night, while the Etruria was encountering heavy head seas and big waves were breaking over her deck,

watchers were changed, it broke loose again. Without waiting for orders the watch of nine men once more started forward to secure the lashings.

Just as they had completed their task a huge wave swept over the bow, knocking the men right and left. Jas. Walker, able seasman, was swept the full length of the forecastle deck, and down the stairway leading to the main deck. He struck squarely on the banister rail at the foot of the stairs and his spine was broken. He died in the arms of his brother George who, himself slightly injured was staggering with his burden toward the ship hos-

Others of the crew were summoned to the forecastle deck which they found strewn with unconscious men. The most esriously injured was William Newell whose leg was broken and whose head was crushed. He was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital when the ship reached port and it was said he would probably die.

When the storm was at its height a girl was born in the steerage. The mother is Mrs. Jacob Goldstein and after a collection amounting to \$50 had had been taken up among the cabin passengers, the baby was christened Rachel Etruria Goldstein.

During the greater part of the voyage the passengers were kept below and none of them knew that an accident had occurred until they were summoned by Captain Potter to attend the burial service for Walker on Saturday. Captain Potter said today that he never before in his many years at sea experienced such rough weather.
