# MURDERER TELLS OF ESCAPE RODE RADIALS TO AVOID POLICE

Electric Car Lines Took Him To Conneant, Where He Shipped On the Shenango for Port Stanley

IS CONFIDENT THAT NO JURY WILL CONVICT HIM

Still Says He Is Glad He Killed His Father-in-Law-Sneaked Up Behind and Shot Him in the Back-Taken To Pittsburg on Wednesday Night.

Detective Cole, of the Pittsburg police department, arrived in the city last night and took John Scott, the negro murderer, captured here by Detectives Nickle and Rider, back with him.

A couple of local men accompanied Detective Cole and his prisoner to the station, and while they were waiting for the midnight express, the detective gave out the story of the murder,

STORY OF THE MURDER.

"Scott is well known to the Pittsburg police," he said. "But not in any criminal capacity, for I have never known him to be in any trouble. "He was a regular attendant at the policemen's gymnasium, and was

known as one of the best rubbers in the city. "He was most popular with all the men and no one ever thought he would be guilty of such a cold-blooded crime.

SHOT IN THE BACK "As far as we can learn his stepfather, Davis, had him arrested, and when liberated, Scott procured a revolver, and went to his home.

"He was told that Davis was upstairs dressing. "When Scott entered the room Davis was standing in front of a mirror, arranging his tie, and Scott approached him unawares, and before he could turn placed a revolver against his shoulder and fired. The bullet plerced his heart, and Davis died instantly."

GLAD HE MADE A GOOD JOB Scott listened to the recital unmoved.

# WANTS PUNISHMENT \$1,224,031 IN REAL ESTATE CHANGED HANDS IN PAST YEAR

## Dealers Say They Regard the Figures as Most Eucouraging-Slight Falling Off Is Noted, However.

The real estate returns for the year are in, and while they are somewhat lower than last year, both in amount of consideration and in number of transfers, the returns are most encouraging.

The year 1906 was a phenomenal one in real estate deals. In 1907 there were but twelve less transfers than in 1906, and the amount of difference in the considerations for the properties amounts for

In 1906 there were 1,259 transfers, the largest number in the history of the city, of an assessed value of \$1,147,882, which sold for \$2,033,485. Last year there were 1,247 transfers, with an assessed value of \$1,224,. 031, and the consideration was \$1,883,200. This is in itself a splendid re-

A HEALTHY ACTIVITY.

The year was not particularly noticeable, because of the movements in real estate, but showed rather a healthy activity along these lines. "It is most encouraging," said a prominent real estate man this morn-

ing. "The returns are but little less than in 1906, which was one of the best ever known in the city. "Leaving 1906 out of consideration, 1907 is the best, so the report is most

"This city is growing with a strong, healthy growth.

"Values are healthy everywhere. If you will notice the percentage of assessed value to the consideration is less than for some years, showing that the price of property is good-in fact, just as high as it has ever been in

BUSINESS CHANGES.

The business changes during the year amounted to only 42 - 19 less than last year The difference in the consideration amounted to \$145,494, but even at that

it is much higher than in other years. During the month of December, 1907, there were 60 real estate transfers, with an assessed value of \$37,773, for a consideration of \$64,751-a percent-

In 1906, there were 79 transfers in December, with an assessed value of \$100,130, for a consideration of \$149,462-just 67 per cent.

In choosing the secondary electors the primary voters are divided into three classes according to taxation, the largest taxpayer firming the first class, the next largest the second class, and the rest of the people the third class. One-third of the electors to which the original district is entitled are chosen by each of these classes separately and by majority vote. The secondary electors thus chosen then meet and elect the representative, an absolute majority being necessary for a choice.
