RURAL MAIL DELIVERY

The plan for rural mail delivery will be to utilize the present delivery system between railway points and interior postoffices. It is expected that this will cover 50 per cent of the rural population. For instance, in going from the railway centre "A" to postoffice "B," not connected with a railway, the mail-carrier, instead of keeping the mail in bulk, will distribute each farmer's mail at the box in front of his farm that borders on the direct route to postoffice "B," just as a city letter-car-

For those on side lines, not on the route to "B" postoffice, their private mail boxes will be arranged at the cross roads, perhaps a dozen or twenty of them at one point. The carrier, reaching there, will distribute the mail in each box in turn, and the farmers will come here for it, instead of having to go two or three, or perhaps four, miles to postoffice "B."

Thus those living on the route of the carrier, which will be so arranged as to cover as much territory as possible consistent with rapid delivery, will have the mail brought to their The other "side lines" will go to one of the central points where boxes are grouped, perhaps half or one and a half miles away. Registered letters will be taken to postoffice "B," but a notice of this will be left in the owner's box, so that he







The plan to be followed in carrying out the pension law may be thus outlined: In the first place the applicant for a pension will be required to fill up a form which may be procured at any postoffice. The application must show that the applicant is 70 years old or over; that he has for at least 20 years been a British subject; that his yearly income, earned or otherwise, is less than \$155; that he has not within a year received poor law relief, and that he has always worked according to his ability, opportunity and need. If in this latter respect his record is lacking, he may make good the deficiency by showing that for ten successive years before he reached the age of 60 he has paid dues in a recognized benefit society. He must, moreover, be of law-abiding character, and to me. be able to show that he has not within ten years been imprisoned without the option of a fine or been convicted of drunkenness:







The position of the box on the arm can be easily changed from lengthwise to crosswise.


Bay Have Been Checked.
