London, April 12.-Algernon Charles April 5, 1837, being a son of the late Admiral Charles Henry Swinburne and Lady Jane Henrietta, daughter of the third Earl of Ashburnham. He was educated in France and at Belliol Col-1860, without taking a degree, he travelled for a time on the continent, visiting in Florence. Walter Savage Landor, whom he entertained a great admiration. In 1862 he settled in London, in the house of Dante Rossetti. Within the first few years of his leaving they revealed little metric talent and to make Huckins' eyes gleam with joy was in 1865 that he published "Atlanta and Calydon," which is looked upon he displayed for the first time the magical mastery of metrical form in which, at once a figure of national and inter- germs. national note, and the centre of a hurricane of criticism. In these poems he sang of themes abhorred by Anglo-Saxon morality in a manner undeniably thorough. He was a prolific writer for years, but the taint of Ana-

creontism lingered in his reputation, and was possibly the most salient as in his poetry, vehemence, imagery, and lack of self-restraint. His posi-tion in English literature was assigned to him as a master of form and poetic rhetoric. "With no special profundity of thought, with no definite theory of life, with no deep insight into human character, he stands pre-eminent as a molder of exquisite melo-dies."



Finance Committee Was Unable to Get the Figures of Estimates Down.

## NIAGARA POWER COSTLY

### IMMENSE ICE PACK **GOES OVER THE FALLS**

If Gorge Again Jams Incalculable Damage Will Be Done.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 13 .-- Early oday the wind shifted to the southeast and blew up a 50-mile gale, sending immense fields of ice from Lake Erie into Niagara River. Below the Falls the mild weather and a warm rain had freed the ice jam from the upper steel arch bridge to Lewiston, but the pack held solid from that point to Lake Ontario.


