SWISS RECOGNIZE CZECHO - SLOVAK AND POLISH STATES

Diplomatic Relations Will Be Established Between the Countries at Once.

Berne, Tuesday, March 11.-The Swiss Government decided today to recognize the Polish and Czecho-Slovak states and to establish diplomatic relations with them. Poland has already appointed Baron Modzelewsky minister at Berne.

Suggestion Is Made That German River Be Placed Under Control of Special Body—Kiel Canal To Be Used by All Nations in Time of Peace.

Paris, March 12.-Recommendation that the navigation of the Rhine be opened to all nations without discrimination, was made in a report to the peace conference today by the commission on the international regime of waterways, railways and ports. It was suggested the Rhine be controlled by a commission similar to the Danube commission. The status of the Kiel Canal has been settled by the commission on the basis of the freedom of use for all nations for merchant vessels or warships in time of peace. The canal would continue under German ownership and operation. The question of the fortification of the canal is left by the commission to the decision of military and naval experts.

The report of the commission was not favorable to allowing the Bel gian claim that special duties be imposed on German vessels. The report further recommended that a general conference be held within a year to deal with all questions pertaining to the navigation of international waterways, which are regarded as too intricate or complex to be settled finally within the limited life of the peace conference.





QUORUM LACKS

Second Time in History of Canadian Parliament.

TO RESUME UNDER NEW RULE

Hon. Mr. Rowell Talks on Canada's New Nationhood -Is Oft Interrupted.

(Special to The Advertiser.) OTTAWA, March 11 .- For the second Parliament the House adjourned tonight for lack of a quorum. 





A War-Savings Certificate with 10 W-S.S. affixed will be redeemed by the Dominion of Canada on January 1st, 1924, for \$50.00, for at that date the W-S.S. are worth \$5.00 each. War-Savings Stamps cost \$4.02 in March; \$4.03 in April; \$4.04 in May, and they may be purchased at any place displaying the Beaver-Triangle sign.
